

THE BUDD LINE

The Budd family were early settlers in New Jersey and their history is well documented. The earliest Budd that can be traced directly is listed here:

1 ISAAC BUDD (1) was born near Mt. Ephraim and was an agriculturist of pioneer times. He was an upright, God fearing man who was highly respected in his community. He was active in the Methodist church, acting as preacher occasionally. He lived all of his life in Mt. Ephraim and was over 80 years old at the time of his death. Whom he married is unknown. One child known born of the marriage: (1)

+2. John Wesley (2) Budd b. 1806 New Jersey

2. John Wesley (2) Budd, b.1806 in Mt. Ephraim, N.J., d. 1914; son of Isaac Budd and was an agriculturalist like his father before him. He was brought up on the family homestead in Mt. Ephraim, N.J. and received the education appropriate for the day. On 1 Sep 1831 he married Christianna Epright, b. 1812, d. 1890, dau. of Randolph Epright of Philadelphia, Pa. She, like her husband, was a life-long Methodist. They had eleven children, of whom eight are mentioned here:

8. Isaac Walter (3) Budd, b. 30 May 1847 in Mt. Ephraim, N.J., d. 29 Sep 1917, bur in Hedding Methodist Churchyard, Mt. Ephraim, N.J.; reinterred 19 Nov 1929 in Harleigh Cemetery, Camden, N.J.; son of John Wesley Budd and Christianna Epright, was representative of the men of Camden County. Coming from a long line of successful and respected men, Isaac became a brickmason and by 1886, with his brother Hiram Budd, he formed Budd and Bros., with offices located in Camden, N.J. at Front and Federal Streets, selling flour, feed, grain, lime and cement. In the early 1900s, Isaac and Hiram established Budd Bros. Brick Co. in Camden, N.J. This firm provided all of the brick used in the RCA and Campbell Soup buildings in Camden. When the clay used to make bricks ran out, they set up City Line Lumber Company, Camden Lime Company and Sitley Hardware. These two industrious men are responsible for building over 100 brick row houses in the Parkside section of Camden. On 24 Dec 1870 at the residence of the Rev. On 27 Apr 1892 at the Chews Landing Methodist Church, mar. Frank Judson Hine line b. 15 Mar 1867 in Washington, D.C.; d. 29 Apr 1933 at 316 Chews Landing Road, Haddonfield, N.J., bur. 2 May 1933 at Harleigh Cemetery, Camden, N.J., son of William S. Hine line and Elizabeth Pechman, by whom she had two children b. in Camden, N.J.:
