It is in this edition that we wish to express our gratitude to Miss Cioffi for the help she has given us in keeping our ship running smoothly.


We, of the staff, sincerely hope that you will derive as much pleasure from reading this yearbook as we have had editing it.



The girls, under the management of Janet Ellis, spend long hours practicing the old cheers and working out new and original cheers.






MAJORETTES

COLOR GUARD


The colorguard of S.S. C.H.S. perform at the same functions as the majorettes, but are responsible for displaying the ship's flag and the nation's flag.










