

HONORS TODAY FOR CITY'S HERO DEAD

Veterans to Participate in Funeral Services for De- parted Comrades

France's War Graves Give Up Tenants for Reinter- ment in Native Heath

Funerals for more than a score of Philadelphia's hero dead will be held today and tomorrow, and several others whose bodies have been returned from the war graves of France will be buried with full military honors later in the week. Three funeral services were held yesterday from the late homes of the dead.

The services yesterday were for Stanley H. Berry, of 187 Weaver street; Frank Yearsley, of 5609 Baynton street, and Earl Horsey, of Kensington. Yearsley and Berry were killed on the same day, July 15, 1918. Berry receiving a citation for bravery.

Funeral services for Yearsley were held in his home and in St. Michael's Church, High above Morton street. The Sergeant Edward Yearsley Post No. 231, Veterans of Foreign Wars, conducted the services at the grave. Members of Private Berry's former battery, D of the 76th Field Artillery, attended his funeral, and the Houston Post, American Legion, officiated at that of Private Horsey.

Posts of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and of other patriotic organizations will participate in the ceremonies to be held over the graves and at the church services for these soldier dead. Several of the men included in the list were cited for bravery in action and many of them went through a half dozen major engagements before being wounded.

In many instances the very comrades who marched with these men into the withering fire of the German machine guns, yet who came through unscathed, will be in attendance at the funeral services. Some of the posts of the Legion are named after the heroes in the foregoing lists.

Tomorrow's Services

The body of Lieutenant Thomas Massey, killed in action in the Argonne, was brought over from New York yesterday, and will be buried tomorrow from 2039 West Ontario street. He was with Company G, 110th Infantry, and at the time of his enlistment was a junior at the University of Pennsylvania. Services will be at 1820 Chestnut street and the burial will be in West Laurel Hill Cemetery.

Trebing, of 508 North Fifth street, Camden, Company D, 309th Infantry; Harry W. Anderson, of 1619 North Front street, Company H, 60th Infantry; Harry R. Henz, 3175 Belgrade street, Company H, 60th Infantry; George D. Koch, 235 Pine street, Company C, 109th Infantry; Michael J. The body of Elwood J. Jones, who was killed in France, October 30, 1918, has been received at the home of his parents, 6220 Vine street. He was a member of Company D, 314th Infantry. Jones sailed for France, July 7, 1918, and went into action after a short period of training. The funeral services will be held Wednesday with burial in Arlington Cemetery, Lansdowne.
