PATHER SHOOTS HIS SON THEN SUICIDES.

CAMDEN. N J., Jan 8-Joseph Caskey, a teamster, aged 69 years, of 820 Mount Vernon street, Camden, shot and instantly killed his son. Joseph, a weaver, aged 50 years, of 928 Chestnut street, Camden, in a stable sard in the rear of William Sultzbach's galoon, at the southeast corper of Ninth and Walnut street, about half-past seven o'clock last night The father afterwards put the pistol in his mouth, pulled the trigget and fell a corose at his son's feet.

Joseph Caskey, Sr., was one of the settlement, and his son was equally well known Sunday they both attended a Polish christening and were apparently on good terms.

Last night the father was observed to drive into the stable yard shortly after seven o'clock with a team nartially loaded. He was seen and heard by seveial neight ors in and about the barn.

About half-past seven the housekeener a Sultzbach on whose premises the stable is located, came to him in a state of fright and occlared there was a man on the tool To satisfy her he lighted a lantern and went out on the roof, but found no one. As he flashed the lante n he discovered the street gate and barn door open.

He came down and fastened the gate and started for the barn door and four ? the bodies of both men.

The son was lying in the stable door with a bullet wound in his temple. The father, a few feet away, was found with a wound in the roof of his mouth. The revolver, a 32-calibre, was clutched tightly in his right hand

Mr. Suitzbach immediately notified the authorities, and Captain Stapley and Sergeant Reeder took charge of the bodies until the arrival of Coroner Litchfield.

Both men were married. The father leaves a wife and three grown children and the son a wife and two little girls
