CAMDEN PRIMARIES

REPUBLICANS ELECT DELEGATES. TO THE STATE CONVENTION.

There were contests at the Republican primary election in Camden last night in the First, Fourth, Eighth and Ninth wards. In the last two wards the fight for ward leadership was hotly contested. The result in the Eighth could not be ascertained at a late hour last night. There were several fights around the polls in this ward. The police took a hand and some of the participants are nursing sore heads.

All the delegates to the Gubernatorial convention, with possibly two or three exceptions, will be for Senator Rogers on the first ballot and for John Kean, Jr., on the final vote. Dr. A. H. Lippincott seems to have se-cured a majority of the delegates to the Coroner's convention, defeating Charles N. Robinson, the colored candidate.

In the First ward the First Ward Republican Club named a ticket asainst the leaders, but polled only about forty votes out of over 280. The Gubernatorial delegates elected were George A Frey, W. H. Tice, Jacob S. Justíce, F. F. Patterson, Jr., W. J. Browning and John B. Adams.

The Williams faction defeated the Lee-Dease combination in the Fourth ward by a majority of 225 out of 425 votes polled, and elected as delegates George W. Johnson, C. E. W. Moore, John Baker and William D. Hart.

The contest in the Ninth ward was spirited. The Lee ticket was defeated by the faction lead by Tax Receiver Husted by a majority of 117 votes, The delegates elected are William Ire-The delegates elected are windari he-ton, A. J. Millette, Charles Preusch and Dr. P. W. Beale. Stockton Republicans elected W. W. Mines, Jr., Harry Davis and D. W.

Pierce as delegates to the State Convention.

Camden Democrats last night made nominations for Gubernatorial delegates and will elect next Monday night. There are no contests.
