Mother and Daughter Shot Down by a Burglar Who Had Aroused Them From Their Slumbers.

A Crime That Seems to Be as Unfathomable as the Wilson Murder-Mayor of Camden Offers a Reward of \$500.

The third occupant of the house was Eli Shaw, aged 23 years, son of Mrs. Shaw, who saw his mother shot and summoned the police.

These and the unknown assassin or assassing were the actors in the fearful drama. The scene was the secondstory of the dwelling house No. 242 Line street. The time of the double murder has been fixed at within five minutes of 4.30 o'clock yesterday morning.

The house where old Mrs. Zane, her daughter and her grandson lived is an old-fashioned, three-story frame dwelling, severely plain in front, its rooms small, with low cellings, the rooms simal, with fow couldness, the ballways rather narrow and he stuff-ways steep. There is a side alley, and a good sized yard in the rear. Mrs. Zane owned the house and had lived there many years. Her haus lived there many years. Her haus about two years ago. The door to the second-story back room opens on the hallway at the extreme southern end of the room. and the eatirs that lead to the first floor are directly opposite.

She lighted a match as she proceeded along the hallway, and as she peered into the side room the burglar was able to easily make out her outline by the dim light.

Evidence of the burglar's manner of faining an entrence to the house was found in marks on the rear windows and doors.
