Walls Left of Handsome Building Erected at Woodbury Only a Short Time Ago

Believed Blaze Originated in Boiler Room by Joists Taking Fire. Pride of County Seat

J., Dec. 19.-The William Milligan High School, a practically new institution that has been occupied just about a year, and cost, including the lot, about \$\$\$,000, was burned early this morning, and the build ing, with all its handsome furnishings, is a wreck. Only the walls are standing, and it will be necessary to tear the greater portion of these down to rebuild, which will be done at once. There is an insurance of about \$60,000 on the buildings and furnishings.

From what can be ascertained the fire originated over the boiler in the engine room, which was on the extreme northwest end of the basement. The first floor joists were in close contact with noor joists were in close contact with the clumer, and it is supposed, according to Fire Chief A. W. Cattell, that sparks got on the wood work. It is also be-hered that the fire had been hurning for about three hours, as when the fire-men attempled to go in the front doors, the whole was so thek that they were driven back.
