

CAMDEN AND VICINITY.

A Brakeman Fatally Injured—Another Dividend for Gloucester Savings Bank Depositors.

Harry Davidson, aged twenty-five years, of No. 844 Clinton street, a brakeman on the Camden and Amboy Railroad, fell between the rear car and the engine, at the Camden and Burlington Junctions, near Passaic, early last evening and was so fatally injured that he died at out one hour later at his home.

Charles H. Peters, a porter man in the South ward, formerly a saloon-keeper, was tried and acquitted before Mayor Pratt last night for selling liquor without a license.

The body of the woman who was supposed to have been murdered near Homesteadville will be buried at Morgue keeper Powell to-day. No one has claimed the remains.

Horace Hufty, of the defunct Gloucester City Saving Institution, is about to declare a second dividend of 25 per cent. He has disposed of the \$22,000 worth of Gloucester City water bonds, which were part of the assets, to Townsend Whedon & Co., of Philadelphia.

The Camden police have been notified of the mysterious disappearance of Emily Tins, a demented woman, living near West and Washington streets. She has been missing since the 6th inst.

The seven-year-old son of Jacob Craft, of No. 510 Kalgan avenue, was badly bitten about the arm by a large bird dog yesterday. The wound was promptly cauterized, but it is thought the dog was not mad.
