

NEWS OF A DAY IN THE CITY OF CAMDEN

Jumping from a rapidly moving trolley car at Fifth and Federal streets, Camden, Bessie Willmeyer, 10 years old, of 1705 Fillmore street, was severely injured yesterday. The child was picked up unconscious by Detective Harry Curtis, of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and taken to the office of a physician. The girl's body was badly bruised and her head and face lacerated.

Three girls and a boy were reported missing to the Camden police yesterday. The first girl is Lillie Janda, 17 years old, of 43 State street. She has been gone several days. This is the third time she has been reported to the police as missing. The other girls are Teresa Stanley, of 2332 Harrison avenue, and Maggie Smith, 22 years old, of 324 Fitzwater street. The missing boy is Wesley Burdall, 16 years old, of 1819 Vine street, who is believed to be on a farm near Camden.

Camden women have organized what they term the Exchange Club, whose laudable object is to elevate the members of the sex. One of the principal features of the club will be to exchange ideas with women of other cities on matters relating to the household. Especial attention will be given servants, and these will be exchanged along with other necessities.

William McCauley, who was reported to have been badly stabbed Monday night at Fifth and Ray streets, has not yet been located. The ambulance was sent after him, but when it arrived McCauley had escaped.

Thieves made an attempt to enter the home of Mrs. Ella Naughton, Fourth and Jasper streets, early yesterday morning.
