

OVER THE RIVER.

Church Affairs.—Last Sabbath a deep religious interest was manifested in the Broadway M. E. Church, Camden, Rev. H. M. Brown, pastor. During the week the eldest son of Marvin E. Clark, superintendent of the Sabbath school, had died, and his decease was made the occasion of an address by the father, and extra services by the pastor, which resulted in presentation at the altar of about thirty persons. There is a prospect of an extensive revival in the church. In the Centenary M. E. Church, on Sunday morning, twelve persons were admitted into membership.

Soup House.—The project of opening the

soup houses in Camden for the coming winter begins to attract public attention. It is believed that much suffering and destitution will prevail among the laboring classes, and the philanthropists are starting early in the work of preparing to feed all the aid they can.

Admitted to Bail.—Committing Magistrate Atkinson, has admitted Constable E. G. Hann, who was charged with being implicated in the murderous assault on Robert Todd, Jr., to bail, the wounded man being much better. The other two are still locked up in default.

Chosen Freeholders.—A stated meeting of the Camden County Board of Chosen Freeholders will be held to-morrow in the court house. Considerable business is to be transacted, at which it is probable a county physician will be chosen.

Aiding a Sunday School.—A festival, under the auspices of the Young People's Association, will commence in the Third Street M. E. Church to-morrow evening, for the benefit of the Sunday school attached to said church.

Camden Shipyards.—Work at the various shipyards in Camden is beginning to be more active. At Cooper's Point a number of vessels are being thoroughly repaired, and at Kalghn's Point the yard is busy.

Recovered.—The horse and wagon which were stolen from David Parker, in Mount Holly, on Saturday night, were recovered at the Federal street ferry on Sunday night. The thief escaped.

Station House Matters.—During the past week there were one hundred persons accommodated at the Camden station house with lodgings, and the police made twenty-five arrests.

Committed.—Ellen Staunton, was before Mayor Jones' Camden, yesterday, for being drunk and disorderly. She was sent to the county jail for thirty days.
