## **PRISONERS SHOOT GUARDS AND ESCAPE**

One Turnkey Killed, Another Mortally Wounded at the Camden County Jail.

WOMEN INVOLVED

Supposed to Have Furnished Revolver and Planned Escape of Alleged Murderer.

CAMDEN, N. J., July 17. - Isaac Hibbs, a turnkey, was murdered and Joseph Ellis, another turnkey, mortally wounded when two prisoners escaped tonight from the Camden County Jail. The shooting was done by Wilson Ashbridge, who was awaiting trial for wife murder. and George E. Thompson, charged with forgery. Both men have so far eluded the police.

Two women, one of whom is a friend of Ashbridge, are believed to have provided the revolver and planned the escape. Neither of them has been found, but the authorities hope to arrest them before many hours.

Supper had been served and the prisoners were being ordered into their cells by Hibbs, who stood outside the locked door of the cage. Ashbridge approached the door of the cage, saying:

"Ike, here is something I want to give you."

Hibbs apparently thought it was a

letter to mail and opened the door. As he did so the paper Ashbridge held over a revolver fell to the floor and the prisoner ordered Hibbs to throw up his hands. At this moment Thompson ran up, calling on Ashbridge to shoot. For moment Ashbridge hesitated, 8 and Hibbs put his hand to his hip pocket to draw a revolver.

"Shoot quick or the game's up!" shouted Thompson.

Angered by Ashbridge's hesitation, Thompson seized the weapon and shot Hibbs in the chest, then in the stomach. By this time Hibbs had drawn his pistol, but before he could shoot he fell dead.

Calling to the other prisoners that the first man who gave an alarm would Ashbridge and shot, be Thompson be shot, Ashbridge and Inompson searched the clothing of the dead turn-key for the keys to the outside door, but failed to find them. Running down the corridor to where Ellis, the second and only other turnkey, was sitting in the jailer's room, Thompson salled upon him to open the sutside door. "Kill him!" shouted Ashbridge to Thompson, who had the revolver, but Thompson had received numerous kind-nesses at the hands of Ellis, and ap-parently did not want to injure him.

parently did not want to injure him. "If you don't open the door, I'll shoot," Thompson said, but Ellis started to grapple with him. Snatching the pistol from Thompson's

Ashbridge shot three times hand, at Ellis. One bullet entered his shoulder, a second his hip, but still Ellis tussled for possession of the weapon until the third bullet penetrated his stomach and

he fell to the floor, calling for help. Ashbridge and Thompson took the key and escaped, taking the precaution to lock the door to prevent Ellis from fol-lowing them. This also probably prevented a general jail delivery.
