Ed. Stratton, wearing the blue and gold colors of the Twelfth Ward Athletic Association, proved the "dark horse" in the annual Christmas Day marathon conducted by that association in East Camden yesterday morning.

Stratton ran a beautiful race from start to finish and was a triple prize winner, capturing the three leading trophies offered in the event. In addition to outdistancing a field of 28 runners and crossing the line first, Stratton won the time prize and also the trophy offered by Twelfth Ward A. A. to the first club member to finish.

Harry Winter, of the newly-organized East Camden Sporting Club, finished second, thirty-five seconds in the rear of Stratton. J. Forrest, of Den Mar A. C. raced home three seconds behind Winter and won third place and prize. Al Stratton, brother of the winner, finished fourth.

John Winter, winner of the recent Moose run, crossed the finish line number seven, while Charley Verdeur, the only scratch man, was fifteenth. Both Winter boys and Verdeur gave Stratton a close run from the time prize.

Team Prize For Twelfth Ward

Twelfth Ward A. A. captured the team prize and the handsome silver loving cup offered by Mayor-elect Victor King. The Twelfth Ward team total was 59 points. East Camden S. C. was second with a total of 40.

Ed. Stratton, who had not been considered among the likely winners prior to the start, set a terrific pace all the way. He took the lead as the runners were speeding on Maple ave. Merchantville, and maintained the lead until the finish.

Forrest was running second as the runners were returning on Federal st. at Thirty-sixth street, but H. Winters gradually overtook him and the pair ran almost neck and neck until the finish. Winters flashed over the line three seconds ahead of the Den Mar star by a spurt in the last 100 yards.

The actual time of the winner was 30 minutes and 10 seconds. J. Winters' time was 30-15, while that of Verdeur was 30-36 and that of H. Winter, 30-45.

Last year Verdeur won the time prize in 30 minutes and 45 seconds, but the course was about one square shorter this year.

Youngsters Feature

One of the outstanding features of the run was the performance of R. Burr, Den Mar A. C., and "Choke" Kelly, East Camden S. C., two 13-year old lads. Neither stood over four feet high, but both finished the course in good shape. Burr, who is a pupil at Liberty school, finished 14 while Kelly, a Cramer school student, finished number 21.

Although they failed to finish among the prize winners, Billy Van Raun, manager of the Broadway Cycle

With one or two exceptions all the other men finished in good condition.

Traffic Mares Finish

The race proved a tremendous success but the finish was marred to a certain extent by traffic conditions. Despite the fact that Captain Albert, traffic officer John Potter and Policeman William Bootcher and John Christy had the street roped off, the fact that inbound traffic was permitted to proceed unimpeded from Twenty-sixth street, resulted in considerable congestion and offset the good work done by the police. Several scores of spectators also crowded into the street, but the condition had no effect on the manner in which the boys finished, with the possible exception that it may have affected the actual running time. Many of the boys were forced to pick their way through a mass of trolley cars and autos for nearly three squares at the finish.

Mayor-elect Victor King, Councilman-elect Robert S. Burns, John Tischner, Camden Times; and Peter Jackeama, Twelfth Ward A. A. were the judges at the finish.

Bernard Tracy was the official starter. He was assisted by John Trout and Harry Jetter, East Camden S. C.

4 MATMEN SEEK STATE 'Y' CROWN

"Doc" Purvis, Meshanic, McIlvaine and Glazer to Compete in Elizabeth

Entrants From All Parts of New Jersey to Gather March 27

Four Camden wrestlers, representing the local Y. M. C. A. will enter the New Jersey State "Y" championship meet which will be held at the Elizabeth association's gymnasium, Saturday, March 27.

Charles "Doc" Puff Purvis, who is a husky veteran in the mat game, will compete in the welterweight division and is looked upon as a probable winner in the event. He is a former middleweight champion of the Marino Corps. Johnny Glazer will also enter his claim for the welter title.

Camden will be represented in the heavyweight division by Jesse "Jumbo" Meshanic, a big fellow weighing 182 pounds, who can step around with lightning-like rapidity and grapple with the best amateurs in his class.

This city's sole entrant in the middleweight division is Gene McIlvaine, a newcomer in the game, but a lad with a prospective future.

Training for Weeks
For several weeks this quartette has been training for the up-State classic at the gymnasium of the Camden Y. M. C. A., Federal street near Broadway. Each has trained down to razor-edge proficiency and expects to make his presence felt at Elizabeth.

The team is being coached by Max Younger, assistant athletic director, of the Camden Y. M. C. A.

The Elizabeth meet, which is sanctioned by the Amateur Athletic Union, will draw applicants from Y. M. C. A.'s all over New Jersey. Trenton is the only other South Jersey organization that will send representatives.

The bouts will be of only six minutes duration, and if a fall is not accomplished in that time, the victor will be designated by the referee. H. Van Arsdale, chairman of the wrestling committee of the New Jersey State Y. M. C. A., is in charge of the meet.

Burke and Kilroy Finish First and Second—Also Capture Team Prize

"TIME" FOR STRATTON

Running in the face of a biting wind, George Burke, of Den Mar A. C., flashed over the line an easy winner in the first annual marathon of the East Camden Sporting Club in East Camden Saturday afternoon. Burke covered the five-mile course in 28 minutes and 33 seconds, finishing 27 seconds ahead of the second man, W. Kilroy, also of Den Mar.

Ed Stratton, who won the Christmas Day run of Twelfth Ward A. A., carried off the time prize, when he tripped over the course in the fast time of 26 minutes and 30 seconds. Stratton, who was the only man to start from scratch, finished number 21.

Den Mar A. C. also carried off the team prize with a total of 31 points, with East Camden Sporting Club second with a total of 33 points. Den Mar had but eight men entered, seven of whom finished within the first 17 men. Three of the first four men to finish carried the Den Mar colors. The team prize was a silver loving cup donated by the employees of the American Dredging Co. as well as Lou Millman, East Camden Sporting Club, who finished third, were in the group that answered the starter's gun with a four-minute handicap. Burke ran a steady race all the way, leading from the start and was not pressed at the finish. Burke's prize was a silver cup offered by Mayor Victor King, while Kilroy received a similar trophy donated by the East Side New Year's Association.

Three Prizes For Millman

Millman, a newcomer at the running game, was a triple winner. He won the cup donated by Councilman Robert S. Burns for third place as well as a cup given by the East End Republican League to the first resident of the Twelfth Ward to finish, and a sweater offered by the East Camden Sporting Club to the first club member to cross the line.

D. Martin won the Post-Telegram cup by finishing fourth.

Two other cups were awarded. Henry Thinnies, representing the East Camden Sporting Club, finished fifth, took the Twelfth Ward cup, while H. Franks, of the Twelfth Ward Club, won the Tischner cup.

Other awards were as follows: W. Wilson, bathrobe, donated by William Murray; W. Starck, running shoes, donated by the Iola Social Club; C. Ackerman, \$5 in merchandise, donated by the Broadway Cycle Co.; L. Curran, cuff buttons; P. Thompson, stickpin; H. Humphries, \$2.50 in merchandise offered by M. Teitleman; Al Stratton, silk hose, donated by H. S. Beech. The prizes will be awarded at the headquarters of the East Camden Sporting Club next Sunday.

Despite the frigid weather conditions, 41 of the 55 runners entered participated in the marathon and 38 finished. The course was from Twenty-third and Federal streets to Merchantville and return. A squad of police were detailed to keep the finish line clear and, while the crowd pressed close when the runners hove into sight, they were not handicapped as in previous runs. More than 2,000 spectators lined the course of the run. The runners finished as follows:

Nativity Star Outspeeds Classy Field—Jordan Finishes Second

TIME PRIZE FOR RAMSEY

As a well-earned climax to two years of perseverance in the running game, Johnny Meller, flying the colors of the Nativity C. C., trotted home an easy winner in the annual Y. M. C. A. street run conducted Saturday afternoon over a three and a half mile business street course. Meller not only won the large, handsome silver loving cup for first prize but copped an equally large trophy for being the first "Y" man to finish.

As was expected, George Ramsey, Middle Atlantic A. A. U. champion, running for Meadowbrook, copped the time prize and won third place. He covered the course in 20 minutes and 20 seconds. The time was exceptionally good considering the fact that the runner was forced to dodge many autos and trolley cars through the heavy traffic on Broadway and Haddon avenue.

Charles Jordan, an unlauded youngster of the Y. M. C. A., pulled the surprise of the event by finishing second. Jordan and Ramsey each received silver cups for places while Ramsey was awarded a special trophy for time prize.

Gold medals were awarded William Murphy, of Shanahan; Thomas Neild, Shanahan; and A. Demarest, Shanahan, for fourth, fifth and sixth places. George Williams, Ed Stratton and Francis Neild, all of Shanahan, received silver medals for the next three places while W. T. Morrison, Shanahan, and George Burger and John Glazer, Y. M. C. A., received bronze medals for the remaining prize winning places.

Team Prize Went to Shanahan

The cups and medals were donated by "Billy" Morganweck. Leon A. Goff, Bert Cowgill, J. Robley Tucker, E. M. Nelson, Frank G. Hitchner, Charles Wagner, McClelland Fulton, Howard Bottomley.

Shanahan Catholic Club won the big team trophy. Shanahan had seven men entered and with Bill Murphy, who won fourth place, leading the other six men who finished behind him, monopolized everything down to and including tenth place. Nativity, although it won the race, finished second in the team standing.

Meller, winner of the event, is but a young lad and ran his first race two years ago, Christmas Day. Although he did not win any sensational victories, he plugged along and has recently been taking part in national amateur events in Philadelphia. It is his undying grit, pluck, and "stick-to-it" disposition which has gained him such prominence and recognition in South Jersey.

The winner set a steady pace at the start, gradually creeping up on his opponents and finished seven seconds in the lead.

George Ramsey, the star of the race, was the last man to start, being handicapped four minutes. Ramsey took it easy at the start and did not pass the first straggler until he reached the High school at Forest Hill Park. He took advantage of the hill going down Kaighn avenue and with a spurt, went up among the leaders.

As the champion neared the finish he saw but one man ahead of him and thinking that the distance was too great to overcome in such a short space, took it easy. But the irregular line of people had hidden Jordan, the second man, from his view, and Ramsey saw him too late. But with a sensational burst of speed he finished three seconds behind Jordan.

Out of the 26 men entered, three of them did not start. They were Russell Evans, Shanahan; William Henschel, Y. M. C. A.; and E. Norris, Shanahan. But two runners, Clarence Burns and John Fisher, both of the Y. M. C. A., did not finish.

TANKOVICH LEADS PACK ACROSS LINE

Takes Front Position at Start and Holds Advantage to Finish in Annual Nativity Run; Mullen Takes Time Prize

THE Shanahan Catholic Club cross-country team for the second consecutive year won the annual modified marathon through the streets of Kensington, held under the auspices of the Nativity Catholic Club yesterday morning over a six-mile course.

Last year the harriers wearing the Purple and White jerseys won the team trophy with a score of 27 points. Yesterday morning the Shanahan athletes totaled 29 points to win. They not only received the usual team trophy, but they also got the first leg on the Father E. I. Barkens trophy. This must be won three times to become the permanent possession of a club.

The members of the winning team were Charles Tankovich, who was the individual winner of the contest; Frank Carney, Dumphy, Morrison and Bill Meyers.

The Nativity Catholic Club took second team honors with a score of 46 points, while Meadowbrook Club finished in third place with a total of 47 points. Enterprise Catholic Club was the fourth team to finish, with 88 points.

Charlie Tankovich was the first athlete to cross the finish line. He was sent off at go, and found little difficulty in maintaining his lead throughout the distance and finished comparatively fresh. The Shanahan runner was timed in 37 minutes and 43 seconds, and at the finish had a lead of more than 150 yards on the second man. Eberle, representing the St. Joan of Arc Club, was the second runner to cross the line, closely followed by C. Brownholtz, of the Germantown Boys' Club.

Ken Mullen retained his championship form of a week ago when he captured the senior cross-country championship race, and yesterday demonstrated that he is the monarch of local harriers by winning the time prize, covering the course in 33 minutes and 30 seconds. This is not fast time, but considering that the runners competed under trying conditions, it was good time.

Gray Handicapped by Weak Leg

The record for the course was made three years ago by Johnny Gray, when he traveled the distance in 33 minutes and 4 seconds. Gray was troubled with his leg again yesterday and his performance was not up to expectations. Jimmy Morris was the individual winner and also the winner of the time prize last year, and he ran faster than the winner did yesterday. In the 1923 race Morris was timed in 33 minutes and 27 seconds.

Frank Carney had the second best time for the event, going the distance in 34 minutes and 1 second. The majority of the Meadowbrook runners found difficulty in moving fast enough to overhaul the other athletes who received substantial handicaps. While the store team was strengthened by the appearance of the two of the Penn State cross-country stars, they were set back near the scratch man, Gray, and they found this handicap too much for them to overcome.

behind these men. The scratch runners did not close in on the limit men much in this lap, for this is when the limit harriers run their best.

Shanahan Made Sure of Title

It was in the second and third laps that the more experienced runners started to forge ahead. Tankovich stretched his lead to 150 yards when he passed the starting point for the second time. Shanahan had a team in the first fifteen men, and it was evident at that time that the Purple and White again would reign supreme. Meadowbrook had but three runners in the first fifteen, and all the scratch athletes were too far back to be able to break through far enough to bring down the team score.

Bill Miller made probably the fastest time on the first lap, but had a stitch in his side and was forced to slow up his killing pace. Carney, Mullen, Worthington and Meyers were all running about even, with little to choose between them. Johnny Gray was far behind at the end of the second lap, but he managed to uncork a sprint in the last mile and passed many of the staggering athletes.

BROWNOLZ FIRST IN ENTERPRISE RUN

Germantown Boys' Club Harrier
Leads Field in Annual Five-
Mile Street Marathon

TIME PRIZE FOR J. GRAY

Frank Brownholz, of the Germantown Boys' Club, captured the annual five mile street marathon of the Enterprise Catholic Club over the streets of Germantown this morning. The elapsed time of the winner was 32 minutes 29 seconds and his actual time 30 minutes 59 seconds. Johnny Gray, of Enterprise, copped the time prize in 27 minutes 35 seconds.

Vealy, of Enterprise, who came in second, was about twenty-five yards behind the victorious harrier. Then came Nolan, a teammate, and Platt, of Germantown, and fifth in line was the veteran blond-haired Johnny Gray.

The race was the most exciting. There was no question about the winner, but the next eight or nine men were so closely bunched that they were missed by the A. A. U. officials assigned to compile the runners, and it was only after a long consultation, in which the participants were questioned, that the list was finally completed.

Engelhart, of Nativity, was in the lead when the event was half over, with Johnny Gray running fifty-one.

When the runners hit the hill on Washington lane Gray had jumped to fifth place, but was unable to better his position.

The event last year was won by Tizzi, of Meadowbrook, and the time prize was copied by Gray, who repeated again this year. His time was three seconds better than last year, when he covered the course in 27 minutes 38 seconds. The course mark is held by Albert Stederoth, of Meadowbrook, who one year made a mark of 27 minutes 26 seconds.

The team honors were captured by Enterprise, with a total of 30, getting four of the first six barriers to finish. Nativity led last year, but the best the Port Richmond team could do was to land the runner-up position, with 60 points or just double that of Enterprise.

Germantown Boys' Club landed first and fourth places to gain third-team honors, with Shanahan fourth, Meadowbrook fifth and Kensington Boys' Club sixth.

The showing of Meadowbrook was a decided disappointment. None of the stars, including George Ramsey, Bill Rittler, W. A. Miller and H. Clark, competed.

SAM KUHN SHOWS WAY IN FIVE-MILE GRIND

Finishes Twenty Yards Ahead of Pat Bradley, of Shanahan, in Broad Street Run, Nativity Harriers Capture Team Prize

THE first annual cross-country run held under the auspices of the Marquette Council of the Knights of Columbus was won yesterday afternoon by Sam Kuhn, Enterprise Catholic Club athlete.

Kuhn's actual time for the five-mile course on North Broad street was 24 minutes 52 seconds, starting in front of the Knights of Columbus clubhouse at 1324 North Broad street, north to Erie avenue and returning to the starting point.

Pat Bradley, of the Shanahan Catholic Club, was second, 20 yards behind the victor. Both athletes started from the back marks. Kuhn gave handicaps up to 3 minutes and 40 seconds, while Bradley conceded advantages up to 3 minutes and 20 seconds.

Bradley was about 20 yards in front of Charles McKee, another Shanahan runner. Jack Barnsclough, of the Germantown Boys' Club, was fourth, a stride behind McKee.

Tommy Reiff, of Nativity Catholic Club, was in fifth position, with Blundin, Enterprise; Gunzer, Nativity, and Wilson, Meadowbrook, all close on his heels.

It was one of the closest races held in this city for several years. Not only were the athletes closely bunched at the finish, but in the team score count a re-check was necessary to make sure no error had been made.

Nativity Wins Team Prize

Nativity's harriers surprised by coupling off with the team prize. The Blue and White runners managed to have a team among the first fifteen men across the finish line which gave them a total of 47 points.

Enterprise was second with 50 points, and Meadowbrook was third with a total of 51 points. Shanahan brought up the rear with 62 points. Kensington Seegar, and the Germantown Boys' Club did not have a full team to finish.

Meadowbrook had its five men among the first thirteen, but the first one did not show up until seventh position, while Nativity and Enterprise had a couple harriers across the line before a store runner put in appearance.

It is unusual at this time of the year for the long distance runners to show good form. Yesterday, Sammy Kuhn's performance was a revelation. He maintained a steady fast loping pace that carried him along the rough course.

He did not seem to be in a hurry to get away, but once started, he soon picked up on those ahead of him. It was not until on the way back that Kuhn showed any signs of catching the leaders.

Kuhn Wins Two Prizes

While Kuhn won two prizes, his individual and the second time prize, there were others who were also double winners. Pat Bradley won a gold medal for placing second in the race and also received a cup for being the first Knights of Columbus man to finish.

Johnny Gray went home with a silver cup for first time prize and a bronze medal for placing thirteenth in the race. Gray, by the way, ran a fine race to work himself up front like he did.

Johnny started from scratch, allowing handicaps up to four minutes and thirty-five seconds. At the finish he was the victim of a bad break. There was a group of six athletes all bunched and Gray was unable to get past them. He was slowed up and was forced to take a place in the rear.

The large silver cup won by Nativity is a three-year trophy, donated by the Knights of Columbus Athletic Association. It must be won three times before it becomes the permanent possession of a club. Nativity must defend it again next fall.

The back men also came up on this stretch, especially Worthington, Merembeck, Wason and Meyers. Worthington, who is low in weight, was hindered by the stiff gale that the hill-and-dalers faced, but managed to keep going.

Trailers Come Up Fast

It was in the last mile that Worthington, Merembeck and the other back men ran their best. Over this distance they came up fast to overtake the leaders and finished well up in front.

Russell Payne, of the University of Pennsylvania, who left the scratch work together with Bill Meyers, found a great difference between collegiate running and street running. He complained that he was not told how far remained to go whenever he inquired, and consequently could not judge his pace.

UPPER DARBY HIGH HARRIER FINISHES FIRST IN DELCO RUN

Tom Johnston Leads Pack
Home in Union League Cross-
Country Event

GRAY COMES IN SECOND, BUT TAKES TEAM PRIZE

Tom Johnston, running unattached and in his first race of open competition, won the first annual handicap cross-country run of the Union League of Delaware County yesterday afternoon from a fast field of sixty-one starters who braved zero weather to compete in the affair.

Johnston, who is a member of the Upper Darby High School hill-and-dale team, and also a member of the track squad, retained the title for his own county when he gained first honors.

Another notable triumph was scored by Johnny Gray, also competing unattached. Gray started from the scratch mark and gradually worked his way through the pack to finish in second place. He was 35 yards behind Johnston when the latter crossed the finish line.

In addition Gray also won the time prize with the actual time of 29 minutes and 38 seconds for the five-mile course. This mark goes down as a record for the veteran Gray as this is the first race over the course which wound through Upper Darby. Gray also took the prize for being the first man from outside the county to finish.

A large crowd of spectators lined the various streets in Upper Darby to see

the race. About 7000 people watched the barriers as they passed.

A remarkable performance was made by the Meadowbrook Club when it carried off the honors for team prize. The Shanahan Catholic Club, Senior Middle Atlantic champion, was expected to win the event but was nosed out by the storeboys by a margin of two points.

The Mercury-head athletes tallied 43 points against 48 for the Lancaster Avenue Club. Nativity was two behind with a total of 50, while Germantown Boys' Club and St. Boniface trailed with 66 and 115 respectively.

The winning team consisted of Bill Miller, third in the race; Bill Wilson, seventh; Joe Harvey, tenth; George Casper, eighteenth, and Al Roebuck, twenty-third.

Johnston ran like a veteran to gain first place and the gold watch that goes with it. Starting with a handicap of one minute, Johnston set out to make the best of his time allowance. He did not forge into the front until after the first mile and a half, but once in the lead he was never seriously threatened.

Johnston Sprints to Win

In the last half mile he ran with added speed when he saw Gray coming up from the pack. However, a sprint in the last 300 yards enabled him to stave off Gray, who was quickly closing the gap that separated him from Johnston. At the finish he was 35 yards ahead.

Gray also ran a heady race. He left the scratch mark with Roger Fouracre, Shanahan Catholic Club representative, and a member of the championship Penn State Intercollegiate cross-country team. Gray and Fouracre ran together for the first mile, but when the runners reached 69th and Market, Gray went ahead.

Up until this time he had been running stride for stride with Fouracre, content to wait for an opportunity to go out in front. His chance came when the harriers had to climb a long hill soon after passing 69th and Market.

Gray, with a stride more suited for hill climbing, started to pull away from the Nittany flash and when he reached the top had gained a 15-yard advantage. From here on he kept pulling up and passing the other heavily handicapped runners. He did his best work on the hills when he was able to make up much distance.

Fouracre finished in twenty-ninth place.

Bill Miller, of Meadowbrook, showed a reversal of form after a rather poor showing last week to finish in third place and made the second best actual time. He negotiated the five-mile course in 30 minutes, twenty-two seconds slower than the record established by Gray. Bill Meyers, of Shanahan, won third time prize with 30 minutes and 23 seconds.

CARNEY SETS NEW RECORD IN WINNING GERMANTOWN RUN

Clips 7 Seconds Off Mark
Made Two Years Ago by
Johnny Gray

MEADOWBROOK CLUB WINS TEAM HONORS IN MARATHON

Frank Carney, youthful Shanahan Catholic cross-country runner, ran the best race of his career yesterday afternoon when he not only won the annual open handicap run of the Germantown oBys Club but also broke the existing record for the distance.

Carney ran beautifully to negotiate the four and one-eight mile course over the streets of Germantown in twenty-one minutes and 43 seconds dipping seven seconds off the time of 23 minutes and 50 seconds established by Johnny Gray two years ago.

This race marks the first in which the Shanahan runner ran from the scratch mark. Johnny Gray was also scheduled to leave from scratch along with Russell Payne, University of Penn. runner, but Gray reported in poor condition and did not compete.

Payne finished in twelfth position, but ran well enough to win the second time prize. Sam Kuhn running unattached made the third best time.

The Meadowbrook Club won the team honors with a total of forty-six points. Nativity was second with fifty-six followed by Shanahan with sixty-two, Germantown Boy's Club with 91, St. Boniface with 97, and Kensington with 113.

Bill Rittler, Ben Merembeck, J. Armstrong, Bill Wilson and Bill Monahan composed the winning team, finishing in sixth, eighth, eleventh, fifteenth and seventeenth positions, respectively.

Carney ran a heady race in winning. He kicked his time, allowing the handicapped runners to set the pace while he slowly cut down their lead.

J. Armstrong, running for the Meadowbrook Club, with a ten-second handicap, jumped into the lead at the start and held the pace-setting position for three-quarters of the way.

Keeping close on the heels of Armstrong were Streiff, of St. Boniface, and Rothermel, of Kensington, both of whom started from go.

At the halfway mark, Carney was running in twenty-fifth position with an easy stride that seemed to carry him over the ground without any effort. Payne was about fifty yards behind the Shanahan harrier, whose actual time at this point was 10 minutes and 35 seconds.

From this point on he began to pick up the leaders and pass them one by one. When at a point a half mile from the finish, Carney had jumped into fourth place and was running easily. He passed Streiff, Rothermel and Barracough. At the finish he had gained a fifty-yard lead over Reiff.

did not make an appearance, while Gray was among the spectators. Gray was suffering from a bad foot and felt that he must heed the advice of his doctor and refrain from running.

Roger Fouracre, Penn State star and representative of the Shanahan Catholic Club, was the other scratch man, and he was the last man to leave at 4 minutes and 50 seconds.

This race, which drew a record entry list of 121 and had a large field of starters, was capably handled by Pete Driscoll and Jim McGinley, of the Nativity Catholic Club, and A. A. U. officials. Much credit is also due to the police for the co-operation they gave.

Meyers Runs Fine Race

Meyers ran a wonderful race to finish first and win the time prize. Starting only twenty seconds in front of Fouracre, his machine-like stride carried him along so that he was able to pass the more heavily handicapped runners, and at the finish he led by about fifteen yards.

Bill Kennan, of the Nativity Club, starting from scratch gave the Port Richmond rooters something to yell about when he made good use of his limit handicap to take the lead and hold it until the last half mile, when Meyers passed him.

The Nativity course is laid out so that the runners pass the start three times during the race. The route leads around a circle, which must be covered, starting and finishing in front of the headquarters, Belgrade and Madison streets.

When Kennan and the other home runners passed the start they were cheered by the large assembly, made up mostly of Nativity rooters. Fouracre and Meyers, of Shanahan, also caught the fancy of the crowd and were urged on.

At the end of the first lap Kennan had gained a 100-yard advantage over Dudik, also of Nativity, who was running second. The rest of the field was strung out with only a few yards separating each man. The back men were still far in the rear, with Frank Worthington being the first back man to break through, and Meyers, who started at the same time, close on his heels.

When the second lap was finished Kennan was still leading, but his advantage had been cut down to fifty yards. Joe Harvey was second to the Nativity barrier, with Peterson and Glazer not far behind. Meyers had passed Worthington and was breaking away while the rest of the back men were slowly coming up. Fouracre was about sixteen seconds behind Meyers at this point.

On the last lap Meyers kept gaining, and when three-quarters of a mile from the finish was in second place, about fifteen yards behind Kennan. He caught him at a point a half mile from the finish, and from there on breezed in to win.

Kennan finished second, and Frank Worthington, of Meadowbrook, who had trailed Meyers after the latter passed him at the start of the third lap, was third. Following Worthington was Pat Bradley, of the Shanahan clan, who came in front of St. Clair, of Nativity, by virtue of a fast sprint in the last 100 yards. He nosed out St. Clair by a few feet.

Following Shanahan in the team scoring was Meadowbrook, with 42 points. Nativity was third, with 41, and Germantown Boys' Club fourth, with 20. St. Boniface and Kensington did not have enough men among the finishers to give them a team rating.

The winning team was composed of Bill Meyers, who finished first; Pat Driscoll, second; and Jim McGinley, third.

The Port Richmond harriers came through in the big feature by annexing the team honors and then also captured the individual laurels. The time prize went to the Shanahan Catholic Club.

The Nativity team walked off with the trophy with a low total of 29 points, far in advance of Meadowbrook, its nearest competitor, which registered 43 counters. Shanahan was third with 62 and Germantown Boys' Club last with 71.

Roger Fouracre won the only big prize for the Shanahan Catholic Club when he made the best time for the four and one-half mile course. Fouracre covered the course, which consisted mainly of three trips on Germantown avenue between Hunting Park and Wayne Junction, in 24 minutes 43 seconds actual time.

The other two time prizes also were won by Shanahan runners. Bill Meyers, who started from scratch along with Fouracre, made the second-best time when he was clocked in 25 minutes 10 seconds. Eugene Venske was third in time with 25 minutes 30 seconds.

The fine showing of the Nativity team was a big surprise. Shanahan and Meadowbrook were expected to battle between themselves for the team honors, and the fact that Nativity came through may be classed as an upset.

Jim McGinley, coach of the winners, brought his team up in first place by having five men in the first eleven to finish. With McKenna and Zachary taking first and second places, the up-townners won with comparative ease.

A large holiday crowd of about 4000 lined the streets of Germantown to watch the contestants. These large assemblages of spectators are becoming quite an ordinary occurrence.

McKenna wasted no time in getting to the front from his advantageous position given him when he was started one minute and twenty-five seconds after go. He went out right after the leaders, and at the end of the second lap he had overtaken Zachary, a team mate, who had led the pack until this point after starting with a thirty-second handicap.

McKenna slowly pulled away from Zachary, and at the finish led by sixty yards. Frank Messinger, a newcomer, representing Shanahan, trailed Zachary over the finish line by forty yards. The rest of the field came at frequent intervals.

Meyers and Fouracre conceded handicaps as high as four minutes and fifty seconds from their position on scratch.

Fouracre, winner of the time trophy, was the first back man to break through, finishing in twenty-third position. Meyers was thirty-first and Venske thirty-third. Ben Merembeek, of Meadowbrook, and the University of Pennsylvania, started at four minutes and twenty seconds and finished forty-fourth. However, he ran well to gain the fourth time prize with twenty-six minutes and two seconds.

The winning Nativity team was made up of McKenna, Zachary, Munday, Tom Clark and Meiller, finishing in first, second, eighth, tenth and eleventh positions respectively.

Roebuck Snatches Lead

The course covered by the athletes was a three-lap affair, starting in front of the Club House at Hancock and Diamond street, going up to Frankford and Kensington avenues and return. Three times the men passed the Club House, and it was not until on the last trip around that Al Roebuck managed to get out front.

Coming down Frankford avenue, Roebuck sought the shelter of the Frankford L. and wore his way in between the motors to forge ahead of the field. The former West Philadelphia High cross-country captain set a hard pace throughout, and finished strongly.

All the men had trouble in keeping their feet. Those having their shoes soled with rubber were the more fortunate. Many of the athletes fell, while others kept their feet, but slipped often. The streets were covered with a coating of ice, and it was the rubber-soled shoes that held better than the leather soles.

Johnny Gray, one of the most popular athletes in the city, a veteran of many races, started from the scratch mark, conceding handicaps up to five minutes. Gray tried hard, but was unable to overtake the field.

Gray captured the time prize, covering the course in the fastest actual time of 37 minutes flat. He finished in eighth place, passing about five athletes in the last hundred yards. It is possible he would have done better had he not been troubled with a slight stitch in his side on his last trip around the course.

Tom Detweiler, of Meadowbrook, finished in tenth position to get the second time prize. The former Central High athlete completed the four grind in 38 minutes and 17 seconds.

Meadowbrook Takes Honors

Meadowbrook won the team honors with a surprising low score of 25 points. The Germantown Boys' Club team did very well to take second place with 50 points, nosing out Nativity Catholic Club, which had 55 points. St. Boniface was fourth in the team rating, assembling a total of 80 points.

Starting behind the heels of 11 rivals, Johnny Meiler, sorrel-topped Camden marathoner, broke the course record in the seventh annual five-mile race of the Twelfth Ward A. A. yesterday morning.

Meiler gave handicaps ranging from 30 seconds to 5 minutes and passed all but seven runners who started ahead of him, finishing eighth to record the best time of the meet. His time was 28 minutes and 7 seconds, clipping 17 seconds off Frank Messenger's 28:24 record established last Christmas Day.

Mike Butler, one of the six runners who started with the full handicap, stepped out in front at the sound of City Commissioner Reesman's starting gun and set the pace throughout the match to Merchantville and return. This marked the first time Butler ever competed in a marathon and he ran a nice race. The grueling test, run in the face of damp atmosphere and uncertain footing, showed its effects plainly on Butler, as he collapsed just as he reached the tape at the finish line. His face was distorted and had it not been for the waiting arms which caught him as he toppled over the tape, he would have probably been injured painfully.

Meiler Strong at Finish

Meiler on the other hand finished strong. After a minute of bracing rest he donned an overcoat and watched other runners tumble down the home stretch. Meiler was the eighth straight Twelfth Ward runner to finish, clinching the Victor King team trophy for the Blue and Gold club. Murph, Murphy, Gallagher, John Han, man and Foley followed Butler across.

Bob Stone, the first East Camden Ace harrier to negotiate the distance, wore than two and a half minutes behind Butler. Foley, who started with a three and a half minute handicap, was clocked in the second best time and his mark of 28:22 also bettered Messenger's 1926 time. Foley, Meiler and Butler each carried off two prizes while six other awards were copped by Twelfth Ward and another by Stone.

Butler's feat in finishing first turned him the Courier-Post trophy and a traveling bag put up by the Twelfth Ward club for the first member to complete the course. The gold watch offered by Twelfth Ward A. A. was presented to Meiler for his record-breaking time and he also captured the Tischner sweater. Foley earned the M. Segal bath set and a pen-pencil set donated by C. M. Eichmann. The other prizes were: March, electric lamp; F. Murphy, Commissioner Reesman sweater; W. Gallagher, East End Republican Club cup; George Dehn, 1. Harman sweater, and J. Hoffman, "Top" Winters bath robe.

"Dick" Reesman Game

Little "Dick" Reesman, 15 year-old son of the City Commissioner, displayed plenty of pluck in running the race. He told his dad that he was aiming to beat Jim Jones, a teammate of the Ace club, and that he would not be home if he didn't finish.

As more than 25 of the starters had breasted the tape it looked as though a scouting party would be needed for "Dick," but his rosy cheeks plowed through the maze of vehicular traffic and he plunged into the throng at the finish eagerly asking if he had beaten Jones. Just as he was entering the clubhouse Jones, with the rigors of the pace clearly outlined in his features,

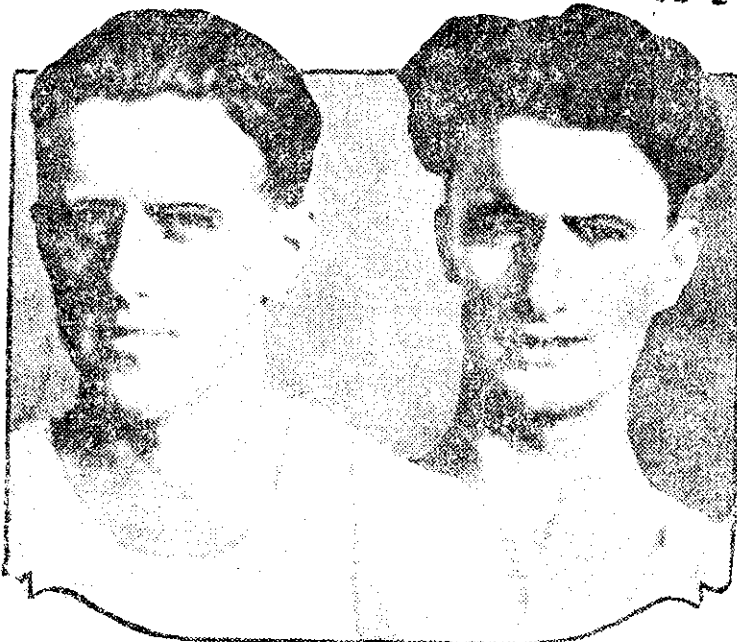

LOCAL RUNNERS ENABLE NATIVITY TO TRIUMPH

South Jersey Boys Carry Off Courier-Post Team Prize
Trophy in Y.M.C.A. Run; Johnny Clark Wins
Event; Mermbeck Has Best Time

It is fitting and proper that the Courier-Post Trophy, which annually goes to the team winning high honors in the Camden Y.M.C.A. street run, should be annexed this year by a club composed largely of local boys.

South Jersey marathoners enabled Nativity Catholic Club of Philadelphia to cop the team championship and emblematic cup over six other organizations Saturday.

The first five representatives of each club to finish are considered in the club analysis and three of Nativity's first five were Henry Melchert, of Haddon Heights, who ran third, John Glazer, of Camden, who was seventh, and Andy Foley of Camden, who was eighth.

The annual classic was won by John M. Clark, a fine-looking 20-year-old Philadelphia boy, representing Meadowbrook. Clark, who last year won the novice championship of Philadelphia for West Philly High School and who is now attending Drexel Institute, sped around the four and seven-tenths miles course in 26 minutes and 7 seconds, actual time. His handicap of 2 minutes and 20 seconds gave him an elapsed time of 28:27.

"I didn't expect to win over all those runners," modestly stated Johnny after the race amid the congratulations of his fellow-runners.

"This is the third race I ever ran. I didn't start running at all until last year. I'm sorry Meadowbrook couldn't have won the team prize, though."

Clark stepped into the lead only a half-mile from the finish. He held the advantage to the tape on Federal street opposite the Y.M.C.A. between Haddon avenue and Broadway.

Melchert Is Third

Sammy Nave, another "dark horse," who represented Nativity and was handicapped 1 minute and 55 seconds, took second, finishing six seconds behind Clark. Melchert was a close third, and the Haddon Heights boy earned the distinction of being the first South Jerseyite to come in.

But Mermbeck, the University of Pennsylvania flyer, and one of the scratch men, won time prize. Mermbeck finished fifteenth, but he had given away 5 minutes and 20 seconds to the "top" men and his actual time was 26 minutes and 55 seconds. Since Saturday's race was the first over the new course, the time is a record.

Gene Venzski, Shanahan star, came in twelfth, but his handicap was 2 seconds less than that of Mermbeck, so his actual time was 24:12, when gave him second time prize. Bill Ritter, of Meadowbrook, with a 4:59 handicap, had third best time 24 minutes and 45 seconds.

Shanahan won second team prize, with 59 points. Nativity's total was 28. Each runner to finish is charged with as many points as his position, that is the winner gets one point, runner-up, two; third man, three, and so on. Therefore the team with the lowest number of points wins. Only the first five for each club are considered.

Twelfth Ward A. C. the only local club competing, finished fifth, ahead of St. Boniface and Germantown Boys, neither of which had five men to finish.

Of the 123 men who had entered, only 76 answered the starter's whistle, the chill of the weather thinning the ranks. Such stars as Johnny Gray, "Blondy" Romig, Al Studenroth and others who were entered did not compete.

Charley McKee, of Gloucester, Shanahan (thirty-sixth); Bill Murphy, of Gloucester (forty-fourth); John Adams, of Hainesport, Nativity (forty-ninth); Bill Wilson, of Camden, Meadowbrook (fifty-sixth); Carl Jordan, of Camden, Nativity (fifty-ninth); and Harry Demarest, of Gloucester, Shanahan (sixty-eighth).

In addition, a number of local boys ran for the Twelfth Ward Athletic Association. Reynold Dilks, who came in eleventh, was the first of that club to finish.

The race started in front of the Y. M. C. A. on Federal street. John Flag, of Twelfth Ward, one of the novices, setting the pace as they struck Haddon avenue.

Bill Pfeiffer, of Nativity, a 15-second man, forged to the front and set a good pace along Haddon avenue to Park boulevard, where the long line of runners wound along Garden Drive, around Camden High School, across Baird Boulevard, on to Glen Drive and up the hill on to Baird Drive.

Glazer in Lead

John Glazer was in front at this stage, with "Bill" Gallagher second. Both are local boys.

As the runners turned onto Haddon avenue Venzski and Mermbeck, two heavily handicapped favorites, were moving down some of the others, some who had started before them, but Frank Butler, who was in the lead at this stage, was setting a good pace.

Butler stayed in front as Crescent boulevard was reached, and for several minutes after that, but Sammy Lave sprinted and passed him only to be passed by Clark less than a mile from the finish, as they passed the Sears-Roebuck store and entered the Federal street homestretch.

Kenneth E. Smullin, physical director of the local "Y," had general charge of the event, which he declared to be the finest ever held by the Y. M. C. A. here. The local police cooperated splendidly, keeping the course clear all the way.

Dr. J. K. Shell was referee while the judges were William P. Kennedy, William F. Riggs, Frank DelVecchio, Edward McKissick, Jr., John St. Clair, H. L. Berger and Leon McCarthy. Angus McBride and Dr. Shell were timers. J. J. Driscoll was clerk of course.

Of the 76 to start, however, 70 finished, quite a remarkable record in itself. Charley McKee, last year's winner, and Tom Crumlish, who won in 1925, both ran, but finished far down in the lists.

MEADOWBROOK JUST SNARES TEAM TITLE

Nativity Nosed Out by Margin of 27 to 29; Winner's Time of 33 Minutes and 20 Seconds, Although Good, Is Far Behind Record

GENE VENSKE, tall barrier of the Seaside Athletic Club, was the second fastest Middle Atlantic cross country this past Sunday afternoon when he led a pack of almost forty runners over the Fairmount Park course under the auspices of the Penn. A. C.

Although Venski ran away with the individual championship the real battle of the afternoon was for the team title. The Meadowbrook club nosed out the Nativity C. C. for the crown when it brought in a low total of 27 men and 29 for Nativity.

The running of Venski was the feature of the event. This athlete, who was not eligible for the team scoring, as he had played on a championship junior team in the past, set out to win the title from the very first. He covered the six miles of the wind swept course in the good time of 33 minutes 20 seconds.

This running although fast did not compare with the record. Fred Wachsenmuth, of the Miffline A. A., of New York, set up a record of 30 minutes 54 seconds for the same course when he won the junior national title here three years ago. Venski said he had to make a great effort to keep with the pace competitors that were entered from.

Joe Mundy, of the Nativity Catholic Club, was the second team runner, covering the finish line when he turned in the time of 34 minutes 4 seconds. Mundy was a good 200 yards behind Venski when the leader breezed in far ahead of the rest of the field.

One Second Advantage

Mundy's advantage over Al Roebuck, former West Phillie High runner, was just one second. In fact only a yard separated the two men when they came to the finish. As Roebuck went around the final turn about a hundred yards from home he began to sprint, but Mundy equalled this effort and Roebuck fell short by a yard of catching the Nativity runner. Roebuck did not count in the team scoring for the same reason as Venski.

After the first three men the runners began to come in closer together. Meadowbrook's team started to finish when G. O'Leary and Joe Semple finished in fourth and fifth positions.

Tom Rife brought Nativity back into the running when he finished sixth, but Joe Clark finished seventh for Meadowbrook and again made the race interesting.

After the thirty-seven men had finished and the checking was made it was found that Meadowbrook had won by its slender margin of two points. The members of the winning Meadowbrook team were O'Leary, Semple, Joe Clark, George Lane and J. Armstrong.

Nativity placed five men well up in the pack, but their fifth man was not scored until the eleventh. The members of the Nativity team that finished second were J. Mundy, T. Rife, George Clark and J. Miller.

Ben Merembeck, the University of Pennsylvania barrier, who also runs for Meadowbrook, was entered in the race, but he was ruled out by Referee Herman Meyer just before the start. Merembeck had won a senior mile championship and was therefore declared ineligible for the junior race. He went over the course in good time, however, and he might have easily won the race.

At the start of the race thirty-eight men lined up. After the six miles of

hard running in the cold won her thirty-seven passed the finish line, making it an almost perfect race. Several of the boys from the Twelfth Ward found that finished in third team place, finished far in the rear, but they all stuck it out to the tape.

Nativity Club Runners Win Annual Marathon

Frank Nordell First to Cross Finish Line, But Real Fight Is Waged Between Romig and Gray for Coveted Time Prize, With Former Victorious.

HANDICAP men carrying the colors of Nativity in the ninth annual Christmas morning A. A. U. handicap street run, sponsored by the Nativity Catholic Club, yesterday caused a startling upset when they came through to land the team honors with the low score of 29 points.

Frank Nordell, a native representative of the Kensington organization, was the first finisher in a field of 97 starters and 32 finishers. The place winner started 1 minute and 30 seconds from the rear.

Johnny "Bomber" Romig, of Meadowbrook, captured the first time prize from the scratch position after a brilliant battle with Johnny Gray, of Shanahan, the holder of the course record. Romig's time of 33.09 seconds for the 5 1/2-mile distance was one second better than Gray's.

Shanahan Catholic Club, with two wins on the Reverend F. L. Harkin trophy for the team winner, was battling to win the third leg and permanent possession of the trophy, but failed in its endeavor, as it placed second to Nativity with 64 points. Meadowbrook had 84; Kensington, 91; Twelfth Ward of Camden, 100; and St. Boniface, 110.

Shanahan landed the five-man honors three years ago when the trophy was first put up for the main prize. In 1925, Enterprise speeded in setting one mile on the coveted award, and last year the Lancaster avenue organization repeated. As Enterprise has broken up since, Nativity, getting its first leg on the trophy yesterday, is the only winner club besides Shanahan which has been able to win the main prize.

Former Olympic Athlete Clips Mark in Run Through Kensington Streets; Smashes Mark Set Up by Johnny Gray Two Years Ago

A NEW course record and a perfect team score resulted in the second annual cross-country run staged by the Kensington Boys' Club yesterday afternoon over the wet streets of Northeast Philadelphia. The Meadowbrook Club won the team prize with fifteen points. Lou Speller's charges finished first, second, third, fourth and fifth to earn this unusual number of points.

The new record was made by John Romig, a former Olympic athlete and track man of the Penn State University. He was handicapped six minutes and thirty seconds. He won the race, held over a six and three-quarter mile course in the elapsed time of 41 minutes and 30 seconds.

He broke the old record for the course which was made two years ago by Johnny Gray, a veteran runner of Shamahan Catholic Club, who did not compete in yesterday's run. Gray won this annual race in 1925, in the actual time of 37 minutes. At that time the course was somewhat shorter than the one over which more than eighty athletes raced yesterday.

In winning this race, Romig also won the time prize. He equaled the same honor in the Nativity run last Monday morning, when he defeated Johnny Gray in a thrilling race to cover a five-mile course in the best time.

Wet Weather Handicaps Athletes

More than fifteen hundred spectators witnessed the start of the event held outside the Kensington Recreation Centre at Frankford avenue and Berks street. This traffic and the poor condition of the streets over which the boys raced prevented several of them from giving a better account of themselves. A number of them lost their footing and sustained slight injuries by falling on the wet paving. Had the weather been better Romig would likely have covered the distance in considerably less time than thirty-five minutes.

The perfect score that Lou Speller's charges earned surprised to those who followed the race. Many of them figured that the Nativity Catholic Club, the Kensington Boys Club, Germantown and the Shamahan Athletic Club would give the Meadowbrook contestants a hard battle, but this was not the case.

Norris Williams was runner-up to Romig, his actual time being 41 minutes and 35 seconds. J. N. Harvey, likewise of Meadowbrook, was third, J. N. Clark, of the same club, fourth, and Al Roebuck, of Meadowbrook, was fifth. Harvey's actual time was 41 minutes and 53 seconds, Clark's was 41 minutes and 55 seconds, and Roebuck's was 42 minutes and 4 seconds.

As stated before Meadowbrook captured the premier honors with 15 points. Nativity's team was second with 60, Kensington third with 78, Twelfth Ward was fourth with 79, Shamahan, fifth with 102, St. Boniface, sixth with 140, and St. Adelbert's seventh with 151 points.

Kensington Boys Surprise

The Kensington Boys' Club representatives gave a better account of themselves than had been expected. Coach McInerney's charges were not picked to score better than the Shamahan, St. Boniface or the Twelfth Ward clubs.

This association was represented by some of the fastest runners of the northeast section of the Quaker city. It was only the greater endurance and speed of the Meadowbrook Club that spoiled their efforts to obtain greater glory.

Romig was in wonderful condition. In the closing blocks of the long race he flashed great power and stepped at a sensational pace. He was as fresh as a daisy at the finish, requiring no assistance to make his way to the club house.

During the first two-and-a-half miles, Romig trailed those who were fighting for the lead. But as the runners entered Womtain Park, the former Olympic barrier increased his gain, gradually closing the gap that existed between him and the few boys who were making desperate efforts to take the lead away from each other.

Romig Overtakes Leaders

Step by step, "Blondy," as Romig is called by his friends, continued to come closer to those he was pursuing. As the youths in front swerved southward on Kensington avenue, Romig, with a sudden burst of energy, came from behind to overtake the pack.

Thereafter, he stepped over the remaining distance in a manner that was a revelation to those local students of the sport who followed him in motor cars. A few squares before the finish, he flashed greater speed and finished more than a hundred yards ahead of Williams, who was second.

Coach Speller's entries were in extraordinary shape. In spite of the dense traffic and slippery streets, all of them raced in a manner that was a credit to themselves and their coach.

For winning the event, Meadowbrook received a handsome silver bicycling cup, which was presented to them by the Frankford Avenue Business Men's Association. A gold watch was awarded to Romig as his prize for winning first place. He also received a watch for covering the distance in the best time.

Williams was awarded a wrist watch, while J. N. Clark received a statuette of a runner.

ROMIG AND SHANAHAN WIN MARATHON RUN

Former State Star Leads Field by Thirty Yards at
Finish While West Philadelphia Harriers Take
Team Prize, Nosing Out Spealler's Charges

JOHNNY ROMIG, former intercollegiate cross-country champion, and the Shanahan C. C. hill-and-dale five shared premier honors in the annual Middle Atlantic A. A. U. long-distance run held yesterday over the regulation 6 1/2-mile national championship course through Fairmount Park.

The event was held under the auspices of the Penn Athletic Club, John Clarke managing the successful race. Romig, aspiring to a berth on the Olympic team, traveled over the course in fine time and had little trouble in giving the Meadowbrook Club first place. The Shanahan harriers took team honors when they nosed out the lads coached by Lou Spealler by three points. Shanahan totaled 27, Meadowbrook scored 30 and the Nativity performers were forced to take last place when they tallied 63 points.

To return to the feat of Romig, the former Penn State harrier used an effective, consistent stride to beat a field of thirty-three skilled long-distance runners. In the starting line were harriers who had gone a long way in establishing the popularity of the sport through their fine exhibitions. Johnny Gray, Eugene Venzke, junior Middle Atlantic A. A. U. champion; Al Roebuck, Benny Morenbeck and Billy McMyers were on the mark when the race got under way.

Buncher at First

For the first mile, as is the case in all meets where many entries perform, the men were fairly bunched. Then came the would-be leaders, who increased the pace and the gradual forging to the front of the strongest performers. Romig was among the leaders at the mile and a quarter mark. He was in the front by a good margin at half-way mark. Eugene Venzke, who gained the junior crown recently, was among the first five throughout the latter half of the run.

At the three-and-one-fourth mark, the return point in the race, Romig was running strong in first place. Venzke was not far behind in second place. Benny Morenbeck, who took third place in the recent intercollegiate, was giving Venzke a battle. Benny was followed by Francis O'Donnell, Shanahan performer, and Johnny Gray, that energetic veteran who can give them all a battle.

The leading five continued in the order mentioned, keeping practically the same distance apart until the four-mile mark. The pace started to tell on a number of veterans in the rear, but not on the leading quintette. A mile from the finish, Gray moved up to fourth place while O'Donnell was forced to take fifth. Romig started speeding, but Venzke valiantly attempted to hold the distance between the two.

Entering the final mile, Johnny gained twenty more yards on Gene, giving him a fifty yard lead. Morenbeck, who was finding the going none too easy going up and down hill in the return distance, put on a fast finish to keep behind Venzke. Gray kept ahead of O'Donnell, who was trying hard to overtake Johnny in the closing stages of the race.

Romig Holds 30-Yard Lead

The men entered the home stretch in the order named, Romig enjoying a thirty-yard lead over Venzke. Morenbeck came in about twenty yards back of Gene Gray moved up fast to finish about ten yards ahead of O'Donnell. Billy McMyers took sixth place while Al Roebuck was seventh.

Romig's time was fast but not good enough to threaten the record es-

O'DONNELL CAPTURES SAINT'S TEAM PRIZE

Yerkes Celebrates First Appearance in Fast Company by Defeating Select Field; Meadowbrook Team Prize Winner

BORRY YERKES, schoolboy hero, yesterday furnished a surprise by carrying the Purple and Gold of St. Adelbert's home to first place in the second annual cross-country run staged under the auspices of the St. Boniface Catholic Club. It was the first time that the light-haired lad had ever competed in fast company. His victory, though by no means a foregone conclusion, was secured over a field of experienced runners. His time for the seven and one-half mile course, which started and ended at the club's quarters, was 44 minutes and 43 seconds.

Frank O'Donnell, Shamahan performer, took the three prize after a fast finish with a showing of 40 minutes and 43 seconds. The prize time made by O'Donnell was but three seconds better than that turned in by Bill Meyer, a teammate. Bill Wilson, Meadowbrook harrier, was right on the heels of the leaders with his 40:52 performance. Thus nine seconds separated the first three battling finishers. O'Donnell started from scratch and gave away almost six minutes in his jumps.

Meadowbrook Team Winner

For Shamahan's Meadowbrook charges carried off the team honors with a total of 47 points. Joe Harvey added the cause of the store team by finishing second to Yerkes. Bill Wilson, one of the time prize winners, was second in the Meadowbrook score by taking fifth place. The other three men finished well up among the leaders in twelfth, thirteenth and fifteenth places.

The Shamahan C. C. took second team honors with a point score of 58. The West Philadelphia finished three runners among the first ten but the last two on the team were far back in the bunch.

St. Boniface, the home club, made a creditable showing by finishing in third place, turning in a 64-point record. Nativty runners took fourth place with 77, while St. Adelbert's, despite the fact that one of her performers came in first, was last in the team's scoring with 83.

Yerkes, a Frankford High student, who was runner-up in Public High League championships last season, and who has a year of schoolboy competition remaining, was off to a fast start. He started on "thirty" with a fast stride and kept the pace up for the earliest part of the engagement. He gradually drew away from the lads who had started at the same time, and at the one-quarter mark, B and Charfield streets, was holding a 200-yard lead over the nearest competitor. At this point he increased the pace and soon held a 250-yard lead as he made for the half-way mark. Incidentally, the clubhouse, which was the starting point, was also the half-way mark, the boys racing over the course twice.

Pace Starts to Tell

The pace started to tell on the light-haired runner as he few blocks away from the half-way mark. Second and York streets, to be exact, he showed down to almost a walk. However, he soon was back at his former pace after the slowdown, and headed the field by a good margin, coming into the crowded streets from which he had started. Paul Englehart, St. Boniface runner, trailed him by about 300 yards as the half-way mark was reached. W. Gallagher, Nativty harrier, was behind Englehart, with E. Sharpen, St. Adelbert's performer, in fourth place.

Leaving the half-way mark with a step that was none too steady, Yerkes seemed to gain his "second wind." His pace became a bit faster as he wended his way through Kensington avenue traffic with not a runner giving him any competition. Reaching the "B" and Charfield checking point for the second time, Yerkes had increased his lead to about the equivalent of three long blocks. Joe Harvey, Meadowbrook harrier, was the second to pass the three-quarter mark, with Charley E. Sharpen, St. Boniface man, hanging on in third place.

The final quarter of the race was easy for the St. Adelbert's boy. He was going ahead without any trouble and appeared in fine shape when he crossed Second and Somerset streets. At this point a man staggered out to the centre of the sidewalk in an effort to start a conversation with the advancing Yerkes. Yerkes brushed by first while the staggering one looked on in amazement. A second street and Lehigh avenue a small girl stopped her game of "jump rope" to make a courtesy to the leading Yerkes.

Yerkes came into the finish station with fast steps and traveled the last twenty yards in surfer fashion. After a wait, Joe Harvey came in second. He trailed by about 250 yards. Frank Messenger came up in the last quarter to wind up in third place, while Paul Englehart, Bill Wilson and Paul Hardy put up a fast end, finishing in the order mentioned.

It was a big day for South Jersey, and for Nativity. The boys who finished one-two-three all represented Jim McGinley's club, and all are local boys. Glazer and Gallagher live in Camden, while Henry Melchord, who was third, is a Haddon Heights resident.

Altogether, 14 South Jersey boys finished. Besides these three, Ed Stratton, of Camden, was tenth; Pat Quigley, of Grenloch, was twelfth; O'Donnell, of Mays Landing, was fourteenth; Urban, of Camden, was seventeenth; Johnny Meiler, of Camden, was twenty-first; Frank Messenger, of Gloucester, twenty-second; Pete Kraal, of Camden, twenty-seventh; Barker, Camden, thirtieth; Charley McKee, Gloucester, forty-sixth; Williams, Gloucester, fiftieth, and Hopke, Camden, fifty-fifth.

Seventy runners finished.

Glazer's elapsed time was 28 minutes, 49 seconds. His handicap of only 30 seconds gave him an actual time of 28.19. Johnny is a brother of Jess Glazer, former Camden High track captain and now at Franklin and Marshall Academy. His victory was acclaimed by local track men, for John has worked hard toward this goal. In six years of competition, he had never before won a race. Last year he finished sixth in the "Y" event, although he has placed even higher in marathons around Philadelphia.

In addition to the trophy for winning the race, Johnny was awarded the special Y. M. C. A. trophy for being the first "Y" member to finish.

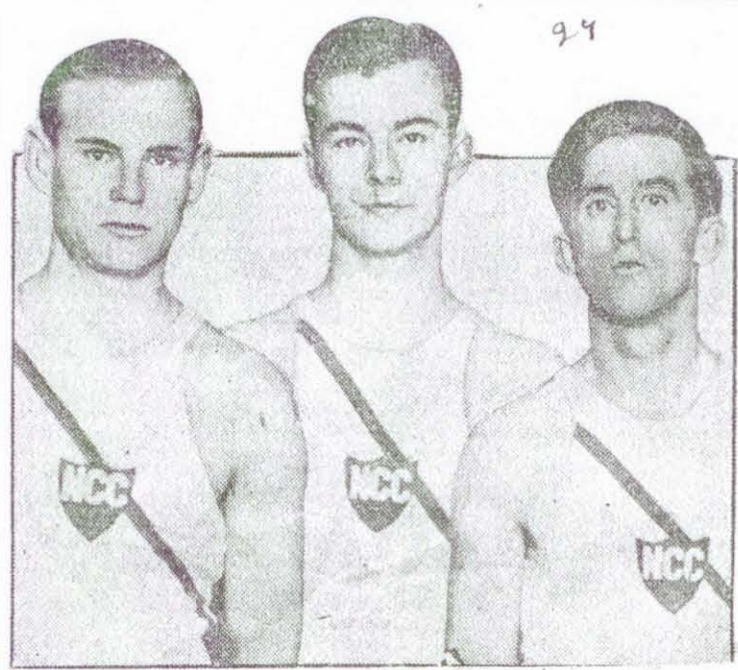

Using his generous handicap to the fullest advantage, Johnny Glazer, of the Nativity Catholic Club, won the sixth annual Camden Y. M. C. A. open handicap street run yesterday.

Glazer started with a 30-second handicap, which sent him off his mark a half minute after the first runners started. After the first quarter-mile he took the lead and held it throughout.

With the first three runners in the race carrying its colors across the finish line, Nativity captured the team prize with the low score of 21 points, only six more than a perfect score, a rarity in an open race.

Shanahan was second in team scoring with 57 points. Meadowbrook took third place with 64 points and Kensington fourth with 68. St. Boniface, Milo A. C., Mask and Wig, Germantown Boys Club and the Northwest Boys Club did not finish full teams and were not counted in the scoring.

Merembeck Time Winner

Ben Merembeck, Pennsylvania's cross-country captain, starting from scratch and yielding handicaps as high as 5 minutes, took the time prize. He finished in eleventh place. Merembeck was clocked in 24 minutes 22 seconds actual time for the 4 7-10-mile course.

In winning the race, Glazer kept the individual honors in his home town, for Johnny is a resident of Camden and attended Camden High School. Hughie Gallagher, second-place winner, also a member of the Nativity Club, is another former Camden High youngster, while Harry Melchort, also from Nativity, the third runner to finish, is from Hadson Heights.

Realizing that he had been given a large handicap and determined to make the best use of it, Glazer set out early in the race to take first place. After taking it easy in the first quarter of a mile, the Nativity harrier opened up in the next mile to sweep ahead.

Once ahead the pack, Glazer kept steadily increasing his advantage, so that at the three-mile mark he was 150 yards ahead of Hughie Gallagher, who started with a handicap of 1 minute and 30 seconds.

Around the three- and one-half mile post Glazer was handicapped by a severe pain in the side which slowed him down considerably and allowed Gallagher to gain. At the finish Glazer staggered over the line a winner by the scant margin of a few yards.

Melchort Finishes Third

Melchort also did some fast running over the final two miles to finish in third place not far behind Gallagher. SHANAHAN LAD WINS IN STREET RUN DEBUT

Hughie Kelly Victor by 200 Yards From Go in Annual Nativity Event! Shanahan Team Winner Gets Trophy; Time Prizes for Frank O'Donnell

SANTA CLAUS was very good to the Shanahan Club yesterday and especially to a few of the club's runners who competed in the annual Christmas Day street run of the Nativity Catholic Club.

Hughie Kelly, youthful member of the Shanahan team, who was running in his first race, received perhaps the best gift when he was given the limit handicap and breezed home a winner in the long grind by more than 200 yards.

Frank O'Donnell, also of Shanahan, came in for a share of Santa's generosity when he captured the time prize over a field of 95 starters. However, it was not Santa alone who enabled these two boys to win their prizes, for they came through with some fine running on their part.

The Shanahan Club was treated to the team prize, winning the event with a low total of 18 points, three more than a perfect score and far ahead of their nearest rival. In addition to taking the team prize, the Shanahan Club also receives permanent possession of the Rev. Edward Harkins trophy, which must be won three times to allow a club to hold it for keeps. Prior to yesterday Shanahan held two legs on the cup, Nativity one and the disbanded Enterprise Club one.

The race was staged over a six-mile course through the streets of Port Richmond and was witnessed by a throng of nearly 1000 people, who lined the entire route. The race started and finished in front of the Nativity clubhouse, at Belgrade street and Allegheny avenue and was over a three-lap course, which enabled the spectators to see the position of the runners at all times.

Hughie Kelly, the winner of the race, set out early to gain the wrist watch offered for the first runner to breast the tape. Starting with the "go" runners, the first group to leave the mark, Kelly went out into the lead and was never headed. He steadily increased his edge as the race progressed and at the finish was more than 200 yards ahead of Adrian Folcher, the second runner.

Folcher, a Shanahan runner, was followed over the line by Roger Fouracre, former Penn State star, who was carrying the colors of the Shanahan Club, giving the West Philadelphians the first three places. Fouracre was the first back man to break through. He started with a handicap of five minutes 20 seconds.

Harry Rappold, of Kensington, finished in fourth place, close on the heels of Fouracre, and was trailed over the finish line by Gene Syliski, of Allentown, and Harry Kashow, of Nativity. Seventh place went to M. Peters, unattached, followed by George Williams, of Shanahan, Conrad Kent, of the Germantown Boys' Club, and Johnny Barraclough, of Meadowbrook, who made up the first ten.

The battle for the time prize was very close, the first time winner having only a five-second edge over the fourth time winner. Frank O'Donnell, one of the three scratch men who figured among the time winners, made

OTTEY TAKES JUNIOR X-COUNTRY HONOR

Meadowbrook Man Finishes First in Fairmount Park Event, But Triumph Does Not Help Club Which Is Dethroned as Nativity Snares Team Laurels

WORTHY of all the fine traditions of hill and dale racing was Tom Ottey's victory in the junior Middle Atlantic cross-country championships run over the six-mile championship course in Fairmount Park yesterday afternoon. Ottey ran for Meadowbrook, narrowly defeating Paul Mundy, who flew the colors of the Nativity Club, winner of the team trophy. The event was held under the auspices of the Penn Athletic Club.

To say that the race upheld hill and dale tradition is to mean just that in this case. Ottey is a strapping, heavy lad; Mundy is fashioned in slighter cast. And so it was that going up the hills Ottey lagged behind while his lighter foe man scored; that going down the slopes Ottey sped ahead, his bulk carrying him along with tremendous impetus, while Mundy was constrainedly more conservative; he had to hold himself back or fall.

The two came to the turn at the small summer house together. Starting at the Penn Athletic Club, John Barraclough, of Nativity, had dogged their heels as winner and runner-up sped into an early lead. Stretched out twenty to fifty yards behind were Joe Mundy, of Nativity; Frank Messenger, of Shanahan, and Tom Riffe, of Nativity, who finished in that order.

Run Stride for Stride

Nip and tuck, breast to breast, matching stride for stride, the Nativity runner, the Meadowbrook Pheidippides ran along silently, measuredly, along Lincoln drive, over the Girard avenue Bridge, under the railroad bridge, past Sweet Briar Mansion, past Memorial Hall and the General Meade monument. The Dairy, famous milestone, hove into sight and was passed with no change in positions.

Now the picturesque Japanese Tea Gardens, Horticultural Hall and the Plaza, were behind, the Speedway was the scene of this stirring cross-country drama. At the small summer house Ottey and Mundy led the field by forty yards, still plodding along on even terms.

Four hills they had crossed on the first three miles' journey, four hills remained to be traversed on the ambie homeward. Ottey seemed to be tiring as the race back to the Penn Athletic Club started. Mundy appeared to have something in reserve.

Mundy it was who gained going up those hills, for the task of keeping up with him on the upward journey seemed to be sapping much of Ottey's strength. Mundy held his own pretty well coming down on the first two hills, and it seemed to be written in the books that he was winner. He was matching his adversary at his own game and the homestretch was not far off. Now in this homestretch the lighter runner certainly would have the advantage, and well the Mercury head representative knew that.

So he bent to the task of keeping up with Mundy on the Jack and Jill, up the hill treks. It was a mighty job, but Ottey did it well. On the last

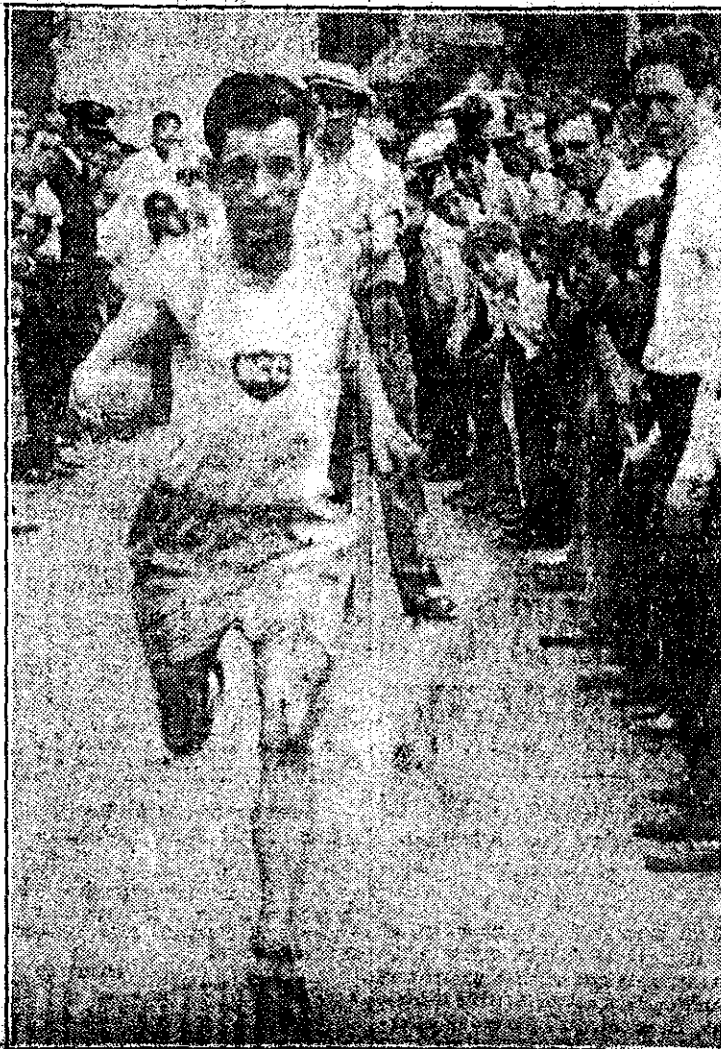

HANDICAPERS who were ineligible for team placing furnished the outstanding performances in the Middle Atlantic States A. A. U. junior cross-country championship yesterday. George Rapp, of Meadowbrook, finishing the grind first after a sensational uphill battle.

COMPTON'S STRETCH SPRINT SNARES RUN

Nativity Trackster Grabs Lead From Coan With Six
Squares to Go; Shanahan Places Second With
Meadowbrook Making Third in Camden Grind

Nativity Catholic Club, for the second consecutive year, ran away with the laurels in the seventh annual Camden street run held yesterday afternoon by the Camden Y. M. C. A., under the auspices of the Middle Atlantic A. A. U.

Both individual and team honors were captured by the Nativity sprinters, as was the case in last year's event.

Stanley Compton, of Nativity and also a Northeast Catholic High runner, won the individual honors, being the first man to cross the finish line after a 2.15-minute handicap. His actual time was 26.04 minutes. Shanahan Second

Shanahan Club and Meadowbrook came in with a tie score of 51 points apiece, but Shanahan was awarded second place by the officials, as a Shanahan runner, namely, Johnny Coan, crossed the final mark before a Meadowbrook entrant. Coan was the second man in the pack to finish, while the first Meadowbrook runner to finish was Symons, who finished sixth. Northwest Boys' Club was fourth in team standing with a score of 64 points.

Compton captured the race by some brilliant sprinting on the last lap of the course, which extended over a distance of 4.7 miles. Joe Stephenson of West Chester "Y" took the lead at the start and held it for the first mile. L. Diambrosio of Northwest Boy's Club then jumped into the van and was leading at the end of two mile distance. In the next two miles Coan and Charles Bowman of Shanahan went into the front with Compton right behind them. Coan tried to increase his lead, but Compton stayed close to him. At the Sears and Roebuck store on Crescent Boulevard, about six squares from the finish mark, Coan still held the lead with Compton about 150 feet behind him, but at this point the Nativity and Northeast Catholic runner began stepping on it, and won out rather easily.

MEADOWBROOK ENTRY WINS ANNUAL RUN

Jim Elkins, Competing Against Doctor's Orders, Captures West Phila. Business Men's Classic; Shanahan's Athletes Forge to Front

Running against his doctor's orders, Jim Elkins, former Oklahoman, carrying the colors of the Meadowbrook Club, showed his heels to a field of sixty starters in the first annual New Year's Day marathon of the Fifty-second and Market Streets Business Men's Association yesterday afternoon.

More than 10,000 spectators, the largest crowd to witness a street marathon in this city, lined up, many as deep, on both sides of Fifty-second street from Market to Baltimore avenue to witness the event.

Tom Ottey, another Meadowbrook entrant, captured the time prize with the best actual time for the grind, which he covered in 27 minutes 44 seconds. Ottey started from the scratch mark, along with Billy Meyers, of Shanahan, yielding handicaps as high as 4 minutes 45 seconds. Meyers, who appeared to be in bad condition, finished far down in the list.

First team prize went to Shanahan Catholic Club with a low point scoring of 34 counters. Nativity with four stars away competing in Washington, D. C., took second place with 44 points, followed by Meadowbrook with 52 and Northwest Boys' Club with 80. Northwest took the prize offered for the first novice team to finish.

All of the runners were examined before the race by three physicians to test their physical fitness to compete in the long grind. Elkins was the only athlete upon whom the medics failed to pass satisfactory judgment, but after a brief conference two of the doctors decided to allow him to compete, but the third held that the Oklahoma cowboy's heart could not stand the strain. Elkins proved that his confidence in himself was well placed by the manner in which he captured the race from a handicap position of 2 minutes and 40 seconds after go.

Paul Dougherty, of Shanahan, who started one minute after go, took the lead at about the half-mile post and led the pack for the first four miles of the race. At this point Elkins, who had been advancing slowly but surely pulled even with the Shanahan entrant.

Dougherty was not willing to yield his pace-setting position, which he held for so long, so with victory apparently in his grasp he decided to battle for his place.

For three long blocks Elkins and Dougherty raced, stride for stride, until Dougherty finally broke under the pace while Elkins, he of the weak heart, sped home a winner by more than 100 yards.

In addition Elkins negotiated the course in the second fastest actual time. The Oklahoman, who ran out West, covered the distance in 28 minutes 30 seconds.

The harriers competed over a course so designed that the spectators could see the runners at three different stages of the race. Starting at Fifty-second and Market streets, the hill-and-dalers went south on Fifty-second to Baltimore avenue and then back to Market.

The Shanahan Catholic Club, which took first team honors, did so without having a runner among any of the special individual winners. The winning team was composed of Dougherty,

Joe Wins Time Prize, But Charley Shows Harriers Way Home

Home Club Gains Top Team Laurels, While Shanahan Is Second

Joe Mundy yesterday furnished the biggest feature in the Nativity Catholic Club's annual six-mile handicap run by winning the coveted time prize, a large silver trophy, in 33 minutes flat.

The standard Mundy came within 10 seconds of equalling was that established by the former United States Olympic star, Johnny Gray, who stepped over the course in 32.50 seconds six years ago.

Competing in the event for the first time, Charles Rayhill, another Philadelphia youth, sprang a big surprise by leading the field home. With a handicap of 40 seconds, Rayhill assumed the lead in the second lap and was never headed. He defeated the outstanding amateur distance runners hereabouts. His actual time was 30 minutes 40 seconds.

Second place was taken by Joe St. Clair, while S. Grabowski and Ben Boas, finished third and fourth, respectively. More than sixty contestants participated in the event, which was started and finished outside of the Nativity Club House, Belgrade and Madison streets.

The first team prize went to Nativity, coached by Jim McGinley, the second to Shanahan, and the third to the Meadowbrook Club. The Northeast Boys Club also was represented.

Tom Ottey, who has been winning events of this kind with astonishing regularity, was expected to compete, but he did not appear. It was learned the Meadowbrook boy, who had drawn the heaviest handicap of six minutes, had injured his right ankle in training and was in no condition to run.

Local fandom was looking for Ottey and Joe Mundy, who have been staging some thrilling races lately, to put on another yesterday.

By far the strongest in the field, the Nativity outfit gained the first team prize by taking the first three places in addition to fifth and eighth place. It scored nineteen points. Shanahan was next with forty-four, followed by Meadowbrook with sixty-nine and the Northeast Boys Club with seventy-eight.

Brookes, the "go man," set the pace during the early part of the first lap, but later dropped out. Rayhill then worked his way up from the rear and took command, showing the other boys the way around the course until the end. His margin of victory over the second man, St. Clair, was approximately fifty yards.

Grabowski made a game sprint to overtake several competitors in order to place third.

First Man Home Takes Advantage of Fact That Prior Leader Wanders From Course; Brother Paul in Dead Heat; Nativity Team Victor

Making full use of the opportunity which presented itself when the leader, Bill Furey, strayed from the course, Bob Yerkes, young Nativity harrier, triumphed in the second annual street run sponsored by the Greater Fifty-second and Market Streets Business Men's Association, run yesterday on a course starting and finishing at that point before thousands of persons who thronged the way.

Flashing down the finish lane, held open by policemen who had to battle with the big crowd, with a lead of almost a hundred yards over John Nelson, of Meadowbrook, the young Nativity runner traversed the six-mile course in 36 minutes 15 seconds.

The time prize went to Joe Mundy who was the highest handicapped entry with a handicap of 50 minutes and 50 seconds, and who sped over the course in 31 minutes and 20 seconds. He finished in a dead heat with his brother, Paul, who was handicapped fifteen seconds less and who hence carried off the second team prize.

The winner's actual time was thirty one minutes and forty-five seconds. Starting with a handicap of four minutes and thirty seconds along with two others, he had an advantage of one minute and twenty seconds over the time winner.

Honors for Nativity

With George Schufer also coming in third, the Nativity lads had no trouble winning the team prize, their total being 30 points, while the team club, Shanahan, totaled 42. Meadowbrook, without two of its stars, Tom Otter, senior Middle Atlantic A. A. C. cross-country champ, and Jim Elkins, last year's winner of the Fifty-second street jaunt, not entered, made its poorest showing of the season, ranking third and last among the clubs.

A field of eighty-three runners, recruited from other local clubs besides those with complete teams, from Chester and from Lynn, Mass., started the race, many of them wearing sweat shirts and some sweat pants to protect themselves from the cold, and all but twenty finished.

Garrison, of Shanahan, stepped out into the lead at the start and held it for almost half of the first lap, when he was over taken by Furey, wearing red of Nativity, as they turned off Baltimore avenue and up Fifty-second street again.

Furey Pulls Away

Running easily, Furey pulled farther and farther away from the field and as he turned east on Chestnut street to Fifty-first he boasted a margin of almost a half-mile. Up Fifty-first to Market and then west under the tracks of the elevated Furey continued to pull away.

Arriving at Fifty-second and Market, however, the red-clad runner turned south, however, instead of continuing west to Fifty-third for the extra gallop up to Haverford avenue, and he was followed by ten others: Garrison, Ray Ford, Shanahan; H. McConigle, Nativity; H. Profan, unattached; Bargaran, Meadowbrook; E. Little, Shanahan; Zurbach, Northwest; D. Cohen, unattached, and N. Hessler, of Northwest.

The officials tried to stop them, but the crowd which milled about South Fifty-second street interfered and the eleven continued on their way to disqualification. The course had been carefully explained to them before the gallop, so there was no other course left open to those in charge.

Furey was so far ahead at the time that he left the course that he was almost a certain winner. With both Furey and Garrison, who had a half-mile lead on the rest, out of the way, Yerkes had a golden chance to come through, and that is just what he did.

Nelson, another of Coach Lou Speaker's crack Meadowbrook outfit, came in second, and Schufer, another Nativity man, was third. An even baker's dozen, five seconds of

DICK DUEDAK WINS CAMDEN STREET RUN

Nativity Athlete Spurts in Final Mile to Give His Club Team Prize; Otero Finishes Second; Williams, Pace-maker, Cops Fifth Place

From the lists of the unknown, flashed Dick Duedak in a burst of home-stretch speed to win the ninth annual running of the Camden Y. M. C. A. street sprint yesterday from a field of seventy-two starters, leading his Nativity Catholic Club mates to the team prize as well.

Duedak, a sturdy twenty-two-year-old lad who came back to Nativity after serving an enlistment in the Medical Corps of the U. S. Army, was handicapped 1 minute and 55 seconds, touring the 4.7 mile course in an elapsed time of 27 minutes, 9 seconds, and an actual clocking of 25 minutes, 14 seconds.

Finishing strongly, Duedak boasted a lead of nearly fifty yards over C. Otero, Meadowbrook representative. George Williams, Shanahan man, who set the pace most of the way, came in fifth, back of Furey, of Nativity and Weaver, of Meadowbrook.

The course record of 23 minutes, 26 seconds fell with a loud crash, broken by both Frank Nordell, of New York University, and Herb Treferson, of Meadowbrook. Nordell, former Northeast Catholic star, running yesterday in the Violet of N. Y. U., set the new mark of 23 minutes, 6 seconds.

Handicap Work Too Much

Along with J. M. Clark, another Meadowbrook harrier, the pair were held to last, being handicapped 4 minutes 30 seconds. It seemed a bit too much for Clark, who struggled in twenty-ninth, but Nordell and Treferson were right up with the front-running pack, crossing the finish line eighth and tenth, respectively.

For Nordell it was just another medal to decorate a chest already burdened with honors. The former local schoolboy star already holds the National A. A. U. two-mile indoor record and the metropolitan A. A. U. two-mile steeplechase mark.

Nativity, the team winner in 1929, captured it again yesterday with a total of forty points, four less than Meadowbrook, the defending team champions. Northwest Boys' Club was third with 66, Shanahan fourth with 75, and Germantown Boys' Club fifth with 100. The other clubs did not have a complete team entered.

Bill Furey played another big role in snaring team honors for Jim McGinley's Nativity runners, finishing third. The other three came in ninth, thirteenth and fourteenth, and for safety's sake Nativity had two more in the first twenty.

Behind Otero in the Meadowbrook list was Weaver in fourth place, while the remaining members of Coach Lou Speaker's crew counted eighth, twelfth and eighteenth in the team score.

Out of action for the past seven months, Duedak wasn't even counted among the first place possibilities. A year ago Dick whipped Tom Oley and the Mundy brothers, team of Philadelphia's cross-coun-

UNATTACHED STAR HEADS 63 RUNNERS; OTTEY SETS RECORD

Meadowbrook Ace Speeds
Over New Course in
32 Min. 55 Sec.

Conald Kent, running unattached, was the winner of the thirteenth annual Christmas day run of the Nativity Catholic Club over a six-mile distance through the streets of Port Richmond, but he had to share the honors with Tom Ottey, the Middle Atlantic cross-country champion, who won the time prize.

Kent led a field of almost 100 harriers through the streets near the Nativity club to finish first in the good time of 37 minutes 54 seconds. As Kent had started on a 2-minute and 5-second handicap, his actual time was 35 minutes 49 seconds.

Ottey, starting fully six minutes behind the "go" runners from the scratch mark, made a new course record when he finished in ninth place in 38 minutes 55 seconds. Tom was given an actual time of 32 minutes 55 seconds, which was better than the record made by Joe Mundy, of Nativity, who won the race last year in 33 minutes.

Lou Spealler's Meadowbrook team, which holds both the junior and senior Middle Atlantic titles, tied the Nativity team for first place in the team prize. Each team scored 40 points. Shanahan was third with 53 points and Northwest Boys' Club was next with 76 points.

Kent, who is a coming youngster, was over 100 yards ahead of W. Furey, of the home club, as he turned into Belgrade st. for the finish of the race. F. Kelly was third, giving Meadowbrook its first man to breast the tape.

While these leaders were battling for first place a great fight was going on in the rear of the park among the four scratch men. Ottey, Trefferson, a teammate, and the Mundy brothers, Paul and Joe, were stepping it off to take the time prize.

Ottey was too good for the other scratch men, but Paul Mundy had his own troubles beating off Trefferson for the second fastest time. This pair had had a great duel in the championships the week before, and again yesterday Paul had the edge, finishing six seconds ahead of the Meadowbrook athlete. Mundy was in the eighteenth position when he crossed the line and Trefferson was directly behind him.

Joe Mundy, who had carried off the time prize the year before, could not keep up with the other men yesterday, and he had to be content with twenty-ninth place. Joe's time was not

Boss Repeats Previous Feat, Blazing Trail Home and Winning Re-run of Wood- land Avenue Event

Northwest Boys' Club Team Winner, With Nativity Har- riers Second; Trefferson Wins Time Prize

Bern Boss, lanky Shanahan distance runner, now knows what it means to win the same race twice for one prize. Yesterday afternoon he led the field in the re-run of the first annual street run of the Woodland Avenue Business Men's Association.

Last week, Boss, a newcomer to winning races, had led a big field home through the rain and snow to find the weather and traffic conditions had been too much for the checking officials. Yesterday Bern came back to lead the field home, making sure that no other harrier was to take the award that he had previously won.

Boss was about ten yards ahead of C. D. Sharr, who ran unattached. This was not as big a margin as he had on the second man last week, but it was enough to win.

Boss Staves Off Rival

Boss led throughout the final two miles, but had to stave off the sprint of Sharr, who came from third to second in the final sprint up Sixty-fourth street. The finish had been roped off so there would be no danger of a repetition of the first mix-up. Sharr's sprint was just enough to beat out H. Kalka, of the Northwest Boys' Club, who took third.

While Boss was showing the way to the field of seventy-nine harriers, Herb Trefferson, the new sensation from Meadowbrook, was battling to catch up and take the time prize.

Trefferson never had a chance to win the race, as he could not overcome the five-minute handicap which had been allowed the limit men. Trefferson could not do better than thirty-seventh place and yet his actual time was far ahead of the field. Herb took the time prize with 24 minutes 43 seconds.

Joe Mundy, of Nativity, who had shared the scratch mark along with his brother Paul and Trefferson took the second time prize with 25 minutes 1 second. Joe was in forty-fifth position. Paul took next time prize with 25 minutes 19 seconds in fifty-second place.

Yesterday's event was truly a "limit man" event. None of the back runners had a chance as the boys with the big handicaps took all of the leading places. It was fortunate the management had provided eight times prizes or many of the better runners would have had no chance to break into prizes.

Northwest Boys Team Winner

So well were the leaders handicapped that they finished in bunch. The only thing wrong was that

kept all of the back runners out of the first twenty.

The Northwest Boys Club, who seemed likely to win the first race from the way its men finished last Saturday, came back to take the team prize by a very close margin. In fact N. W. B. C. and Nativity each had 42 points, but since the Northwest team had its first man in ahead of the Nativity runners, it was given the prize.

Shanahan was next with 55 points and Meadowbrook the local champions finished fourth with 71 points. Meadowbrook was greatly effected by the handicaps as it had most of the back runners.

Captain Clark had the entire course well policed and he took every precaution to give the athletes a free rein when they came up to the finish line. This was a big help to the runners, who had dodged heavy traffic in the first race.

Boss finished the five-mile course in the elapsed time of 28 minutes 15 seconds. He started from the 1 minute 10 second mark and this put him with an actual time of 27 minutes 5 seconds. Sharr was only two seconds behind the winner, with Kalka another two seconds back.

Gerard Boss Prize Winner

None of the first twenty finishers got into the time prizes. Gerard Boss, brother of the winner, took the eighth time prize in twenty-fourth position with a mark of 25 minutes 57 seconds.

Fourth time prize went to J. Zack, of Shanahan, with 25 minutes 30 seconds, in twenty-second place. George Rapp, of Meadowbrook, took fifth time prize in forty-first place with 25 minutes 36 seconds. J. McKenna, of Nativity, took sixth time prize with 25 minutes 50 seconds, and Al Roebuck, of Meadowbrook, in thirty-fifth place, took seventh time prize with 25 minutes 63 seconds.

The runners started their five-mile grind from Sixty-fourth street and Woodland avenue. Traffic was held up until the field got into motion. Some of the limit men had completed almost a mile by the time the back runners were sent off.

As the men passed the starting line at about the half-way mark Phillips, of Shanahan, was ahead, with Kalka running a close second, and Boss well up in third place. Sharr was a close fourth and the rest of the field was spread out.

Winner Swings Into Lead

At this juncture it was possible to ascertain that Trefferson and the other scratch men would never be able to catch up. Herb had picked up about a minute and a half, but he only had two and a half miles to go.

At the three-mile mark, Boss took the lead and he was never headed from there on. Bern was unable to pull away from the other leaders as he did last week, but he did manage to stay in front.

Boss dropped back to twentieth place where he finished. The pace was too strong for this harrier after

WINS MARATHON RUN ON 18TH BIRTHDAY

Eddie Gara Races to Victory in North Penn Boosters' Event Carrying Colors of Whittier Playground

Over the streets and sidewalks of Northwest Philadelphia, where only a few years ago he played with the "corner gang," eighteen-year-old Eddie Gara—eighteen to the day—raced to victory yesterday in the May Marathon run of the North Penn Boosters' Association.

Ten thousand spectators joined with Eddie in celebrating his birthday as he led John Ferris, blue-shirted Shanahan runner, to the finish line by a hundred yards and kept the Esslinger Cup, the winner's prize, very much at home.

Eddie—Edward J. Gara, 2307 Allegheny ave., to be exact—carried the colors of the Whittier Playground at 27th and Clearfield sts. to a victory so surprising that most of the crowd didn't even know his club, much less his name.

Gara wore a white jersey with a blue "W" and some thought he was representing the old Warwick Club. But the many boosters of the two Playground teams entered by their veteran coach, W. A. Saillan, soon left them know about Eddie.

Coch Jubilant

Saillan was just as happy as Gara himself. "I knew he was good, but expecting an eighteen-year-old boy, running for the first time against such boys as Hugh Trefferson and the Mundys is a big order; and I couldn't bring him along too fast. Didn't he come through, though? beamed Saillan.

Trefferson, representing Lew Spealer's Meadowbrook outfit, won the time prize with a 17.13 performance over the tough three and six-tenths mile course. Trefferson, handicapped 3.30, along with the Mundy brothers, had an elapsed time of 20.43. He finished tenth.

Gara carried a 30-second handicap into the race, as did most of his Whittier teammates. His elapsed time was 20.05 and his actual clocking 19.33.

Shanahan, with Ferris second, Ed Whitehead third, Bernard Boss fifth, E. Considine thirteenth and G. Boss sixteenth, had a comparatively easy time carrying off the team prize with a total score of 39.

Nativity was second with 50, and Meadowbrook third with 65. Northwest Boys' Club took fourth place with 82 and Whittier's first five home racked up 97. Germantown Boys' Club, the final team, was last with 135.

Atkins, finishing seventh, was the first Nativity man home, but the runner-up had a whole team home within the first fifteen. Behind Atkins, the Nativity men were Rathell, eighth; Nachoney, ninth; J. Mundy, eleventh and Furey, fifteenth.

Difficult Course

They couldn't have picked a much tougher street course in the section than the two-lap layout, starting at 26th and Lehigh, west on Lehigh to 28th, north to Allegheny, east to 24th, south to Lehigh and west to the starting line.

E. P. Read, of Fitzsimmons Junior High School, one of the "go" men, took the lead at the start and held it as they turned up 26th st. on the first lap.

But the schoolboy's pace was far too fast and he had to drop out at the end of the first mile, and Al Hall, of Germantown Boys' Club, took the front-running place.

Meanwhile Ferris was pushing out strongly and soon overtook Hall. Whitehead also came up, and it was a battle between the three during most of the first lap.

Gradually the red-headed Ferris began to pull away, however, taking a lead, which he held uninterruptedly until he was passed by Gara in the last mile.

Midway in the second lap, Bernard Boss, the tall, tanned Shanahan harrier, with a white handkerchief wrapped over his head, pounding ahead with the stride of a football halfback, began to come to the fore.

But Ferris and Gara were out of pursuit by this time and the only question was as to the winner. And that was also answered soon.

Practically neck-and-neck, the Shanahan and Whittier runners pounded down Allegheny avenue on the "repeat" lap. But as they turned the corner down 24th st., in the at mile, Ferris began to fall behind.

Gara Wins Going Away

While thousands cheered and ran into the street, Gara increased his gait down the "stretch" grind on Lehigh avenue and won going away as Ferris struggled home a good hundred yards behind, 15 seconds separating them.

Ferris had almost the same advantage over Whitehead, who was chased home by W. Rubenstein, of Meadowbrook. Boss, finishing strongly, was two seconds back of the Meadowbrook harrier.

The Esslinger Cup will be Gara's permanent possession. A solid gold medal went to the runner-up and gold medals to those finishing third, fourth and fifth.

The batch from sixth to tenth received silver medals and those from eleventh to fifteenth were awarded bronze medals. Al Hall was the winner of the prize for the first lap leader. Silver cups went to the winning and runner-up teams.

Samuel D. Schwartz, is president of the North Penn Boosters' Association, which put the run over in big

Joe Clarke, of La Salle College, Wins 11th Annual Event With Ease

SHANAHAN BEST TEAM; RAPP WINS TIME PRIZE

Despite the fact that he ran an extra 100-yards, Joseph Clarke, representing the Germantown Boys' Club romped off with the 11th annual Camden Y. M. C. A. handicap street run honors here last Saturday afternoon.

Starting 10 seconds after the first batch of runners got away, Clarke, who is a member of the La Salle College track team, finished the 4.7 miles in the actual time of 26 minutes 10 seconds.

The Germantown B. C. entry took the lead at Haddon avenue and Mickle streets and held the advantage of about 100 yards in the van of Vic Lavinakas until he began the winding ascent in Farnham Park.

Unaware of the course marks at this point, Clarke choose to run along the winding road to the summit of the park instead of cutting up the hill which is permitted. Lavinakas, however, knew enough of the layout to take this cut and as a result when the two reached the top of the hill, the latter had taken the lead with Clarke about 10 yards in the rear. In all Lavinakas made up about 125 yards.

However, when the two reached Kaighn avenue turning left to the Crescent boulevard, Clarke again assumed the lead and by the time they had reached the circle was far in the van and increased his advantage as they trudged down the boulevard, finishing about 200 yards in front of his nearest competitor who was Lavinakas. The latter also started in the same group with Clarke.

Runs Fine Race

It wasn't long after the race got under way that it became apparent that Clarke would finish in front. The La Salle student had a fine stride and practically ran the course in the manner of a quarter-miler, finishing with the same speed as when he started.

It was only the second cross-country run in which he has participated and this is the reason why he was given a 3 minute 50 seconds handicap over George Rapp and Alfred Knabb, both of Meadowbrook, who were the scratch men.

The time prize was won by Rapp, who started four minutes after the first man got away. His time was 23 minutes 46 seconds, but failed to break the course record by 40 seconds. Frank Nordell, former N. Y. U. runner and Olympic candidate holds the record set in 1931, which is 23 minutes 6 seconds.

Girard Boss, of Shanahan, with a five second handicap won the second team prize, finishing two seconds in actual time behind Rapp, while Knabb won the third team prize.

Seven clubs were entered in the event with a total entry list of 75, 10 of whom dropped out. The clubs were Shanahan, Germantown, Northwest B. C., Nativity C. C., Camden Y. M. C. A., Meadowbrook and Margate A. C. of Atlantic City.

But Meadowbrook Takes Team Award With

42 Points; Northwest B. C. Fourth

Sturdy legs went scampering and valiant hearts pumped fast as more than twoscore runners raced over slippery macadam roadways for 33-10 miles in the Lansdale Moose event, won by the Meadowbrook team yesterday.

Undaunted by the chill damper of the day, a young Germantown B. C. entry, Joe Clark, came coasting across the finish line more than half a minute ahead of his nearest rival, V. Levinakas, Northwest Boys' Club, with J. Dolan, flying Meadowbrook's colors, tripping home in third place.

But to none of these performers went time honors for the test. Girard Boss, veteran Shanahan contestant, placed no better than seventh in the regular race, yet his time of 19 minutes 18 seconds was the best of the day. As a matter of fact, no fewer than three entries negotiated the course in faster actual time than did Clark, the winner, R. J. Kelly, Meadowbrook, with 19:26; A. W. Knabb, with 19:39, and Boss. Clark's actual time was 19:50.

Yet the going was close all the way, so well were the handicaps mated, and at the finish only seconds separated one runner from another galloping across the finish. Between the time Clark stepped by the judges and the moment W. Parazek, another Germantown B. C. entry, trotted in 39th, less than three minutes had elapsed.

Eight of the more than 40 starters were not given the word "go" until three or more minutes had passed since the first competitor took off. Boss, at 3:55, was the last man to hear the starting signal, but he was no more than 35 seconds behind Auch, Kelly, Knabb, Zach, Zampitella, Dudek or Clark, none of whom were allowed to go before three minutes.

Clark Conserves Energy

Clark, ultimate winner of the race, got off to a good start, but he was not so foolish as to spend his energy, like some, in the first mile of the race. Given the "go" at two minutes, he was content for a time to set his own pace and showed no burning desire to overtake too quickly those of his opponents who had substantial advantages over him.

A fine drizzle was descending as Clark unlocked his efforts. But this did not deter him. Even content as he was to follow his own pace, he began passing those who had started before him, and by the end of the first mile he was well up in front of the pack.

By this time the earlier starters had become fairly evenly bunched, and one man's chances looked as good as another's, with Lavinakas, Provan, Bradley, McDonald, Goldsmith and Weaver immediately ahead of Clark and not behind J. Armstrong, H. Bey, J. W. Hatton and Parazek, earliest starters, who were at this time still managing to retain their donated advantages.

By the end of the second mile most of these early starters were finding the pace too burning and were beginning to lag, with those included among the second contingent of takers-off stepping up to match the lead. Clark was going strongly now, up near the very front.

The contestants began to accelerate their paces as they started on the third mile, and here Clark began his stride to pass his

Somewhat different was the race run by Girard Boss, time-prize winner. Boss, the last man to take off, had to adopt a steady, easy-going stride that would eat up the miles, overtake his rivals and still leave him with enough strength to go the full distance at top speed.

Boss managed this very well. He ran almost effortlessly, stretching out those long, husky legs in such a manner that the distance melted almost unnoticed. But he did not concentrate too much on passing rivals who had started far up in front of him, content at first to glide by his more immediate predecessors.

Most of these had fallen into the error of starting too quickly. By the time they had passed the first mile and a half the majority were already fagged and unable to answer the challenge Boss issued to them over the last ditch.

Auch, Sullivan and Zampitella, three of Boss' Shanahan teammates, and Kelly, the Meadowbrook, clung doggedly to the time winner's heels for a while, but over the last mile most of these scintillants, too, weakened and had to fall back. Only Auch and Kelly, who finished eighth and ninth, respectively, were able to remain with the veteran, and even this pair could not match Boss' strides over the last quarter-mile, when he clinched his prize.

The race was, on the whole, highly successful. It produced some spine-tingling competition, and was well conducted by the officials in charge.

Ben Hammel was chairman of the Junior Moose committee that handled arrangements, with L. M. Moffitt, W. A. O'Donnell and Russell Bright very capably assisting him. O'Donnell is dictator of the Lansdale chapter.

Figures computed by these officials at the end gave Meadowbrook the team prize with the low total of 42 points, with its first five men finishing third, fourth, ninth, twelfth and fourteenth. Shanahan, with 49, nosed out Germantown B. C. for second place by the scant margin of a point, while Northwest Boys' Club, with 59 counters, was fourth.

SHANAHAN HARRIERS TRIP MEADOWBROOK

Spealer Will Protest First Place of Zack, But Outcome Will Not Affect Team Scoring; Victor Displays Much Improvement in Running

A king coronated one moment and willing to give his crown away in the next second was the woof on which was spun a very unusual weave of events yesterday when Johnny Zack, Shanahan C. C. runner, broke the yarn a winner in the Senior Middle Atlantic cross-country championship held over a six and one-quarter mile Fairmount Park course.

Johnny won the race over Alfred S. Knabb, West Chester State Teachers' College athlete, who hails from Oley, Pa., in the last 300 yards when Knabb, who held a substantial lead up until this time ran off the course, at a turn toward the finish line and lost valuable time returning to the proper route, finishing third. Zack, being a sportsman, immediately reported the matter to officials in charge and announced his willingness to give up his newly won robes of purple.

It was a tough race for Knabb to lose, that is if the formal protest to be presented by Meadowbrook A. C. at the next A. A. U. meeting is ignored and the officials decide that Knabb is the loser. There was no doubt as to who was the better runner. Zack, himself, along with his fellow teammates offered their condolences and announced that they would like to see the bauble placed on Knabb's scholarly brow.

But despite the mix up concerning the actual champion, there would be no difference made in the team championship even though the winner's place was given to Meadowbrook, the team for which Knabb performed. The Winged Heel athletes of Lew Spealer were undisputedly deposed as title holders as a team of Shanahan racers lead the field in scoring.

Muddy Course Suits Knabb

More important than the outcome of the race was the run itself with plenty of thrills afforded on the muddy bridle paths over which the lads struggled for positions. Frost in the ground melted in the unseasonable weather and early morning riders had churned the tortuous paths into veritable morasses. This kind of going was to Knabb's liking and gave him a huge advantage over the other racers.

Herb Trefferson, winner of the event last year and entered to defend

his title in the race, was withdrawn at the last minute when his handlers announced that he will run in the 1000-yard race in the Millrose games at New York. This announcement gave everybody a chance, as Trefferson is almost in a class by himself in this district.

Officials, upon hearing Zack's version of the affair, were undecided for the time. Herman Myers, president emeritus of the local A. A. U. body, was on hand and he believed that true sportsmanship demanded that Knabb be declared the winner. After a discussion was decided that the race should be taken up at the next meeting when Coach Lew Spealer will protest.

No matter who wins, it was agreed by officials in charge that Zack should be declared the winner of the amateur cross-country sportsmanship crown. But Zack was happy at that. Even if he only took second place, which was rightfully his, he performed a great feat in topping the rest of the opposition. It is the first time that he had shown such ability, although he has been improving with every race.

Shanahan, taking first team prize with all five men finishing in the first eight places, held a margin of 23 to 32 over the former Meadowbrook champions.

ZACK RETAINS TITLE IN X-COUNTRY JAUN

Auch Captures 2d Place as
Shanahan Annexes Team
Championship

Nov. 24, 1934

John Zack, long-distance specialist from Shanahan C. C., retained his Middle Atlantic cross-country crown yesterday, winning the championship event for the second straight year over the 6 1/2-mile Fairmount Park course. Zack's victory aided Shanahan to win the Luke M. Smith Memorial Trophy presented as team prize.

Bitter winds which swept the Belmont Plateau, a spill along the route and the stern opposition of Harold Auch, also of Shanahan, found the winner still undaunted. Following the tortuous up-hill, down-dale bridle path route, Zack employed the same easy pace. He had neither early speed nor strong finish kick, but running with the motion of an automaton, he led from the two-mile mark on.

Although Auch, a teammate, followed him in second place, Zack did not let up a minute. Auch recently finished second in the national championships at Indianapolis. In this same race Zack finished fourth. Zack was out to erase this defeat and he was taking no chances.

At the start William Rubinstien and Frank Kelly, a pair of Meadowbrook racers, assumed the lead. This advantage was held until the two-mile mark, when the strength of Zack first became evident. Auch stayed behind at the outset of the race and did not become a challenger until the return trip.

Herb Trefferson, 1932 champion and a challenger in the race, was the man most feared. Trefferson, noted for his great "kick" at the finish, stayed up with the leaders all the way and his supporters hoped for a repetition of the home sprint which broke the supremacy of the Mundy brothers in '32. Trefferson, however, was still trailing 75 yards at Girard ave. bridge, which is only 1000 yards from the Malta Boat Club, where the race finished.

RUBENSTINE TAKES STREET HANDICAP

Meadowbrook Runner First Across Line in An- nual Boys' Club Run.

Wolf Rubenstine, Meadowbrook, the next to the last man to start, ran a steady race yesterday to top the field of 52 runners in the annual Germantown Boys' Club open handicap street run over a 5 1/4-mile course through the streets of Germantown.

The Northwest Boys' Club, with its members taking full advantage of their handicap, captured the team trophy with a total of 51 markers. The other five clubs having full teams were closely bunched behind them. Meadowbrook was second with 50, followed by Germantown Boys' Club and Camden Y., both with 58, West Chester State Teachers College with 83, and Natick with 93.

Keeping a steady pace throughout, Rubenstine, a former Simon Gratz High star, slowly advanced on the pack and did not take the lead until a mile from the finish.

Although he accomplished the feat of finishing first, the Meadowbrook star had to take second honors to Herb Treferson, unattached, for time prize. Treferson, former Meadowbrook runner, started at scratch, four minutes behind "Go" and finished in fifth position.

BEARDSLEY SNARES CAMDEN STREET RUN

Overbrook Cross-country Captain Surprises by Taking Skeeter Event; Auch Also Scores as Shanahan Carries Off Team Honors

Graham Beardsley, captain of Overbrook High School's cross-country team, got his first taste of open competition yesterday and won the 13th annual Camden Y. M. C. A. street run over the classiest field of runners ever to compete in the handicap affair. Beardsley, a member of the Shanahan C. C. team, unheralded and unsung, traversed the 4 1/2 mile course in 26 minutes, 50 seconds actual time.

Harold Auch, also a member of the Shanahan team, took down first time prize honors. Auch, a place-winner in the junior national run at Indianapolis last month, sped over the course in 23 minutes, 27 seconds, close to the record time set by Frank Nordell at 23.06 in 1932.

The performances of Auch, Beardsley and kindred Shanahan harriers brought the first team prize award to the West Philadelphia club. Shanahan compiled a low score of 34 credits in the run; Meadowbrook took second place honors with a total of 59 points and Nativity Catholic Club was third with 88.

Many Drop Out

A field of 89 racers took to the flat Camden course at the outset of the race. The course, although a level one, proved plenty hard for the racers, as chill winds swept the open outskirts of Camden, and only 73 finished. Herb Trefferson, among those favored for team prize, did not start and left the issue clearly up to Auch, Johnny Zack and the Mundy brothers.

The Mundys—Paul and Joe—were judged the fastest distance men in this district before claiming New York and the Melrose A. C. as their home last year. Eager, however, to retain their honors in this vicinity, the brother act came to Camden yesterday.

Paul Mundy, out after the time prize since he carried a heavy handicap, finished 20th in the race and turned in a fast time of 23.42 for the mileage. Mundy, however, ran into difficulty along the route, being forced to halt because of an automobile tie-up at the two-mile mark.

Joe Clarke, winner of the race last year and termed the Pittston Flyer because of his remarkable running during the 1933 season, came down from the hard coal regions to defend his laurels. Clarke, however, was among the heavily handicapped, too, and he was ninth in the race. His actual time for the distance was 24.06.

Runners, unknown and without exact rating in this district, dominated the race over the entire route. Ray Wood, an unattached runner, who was formerly a Shanahan man, broke first in the early running and maintained his speed until the last 100 yards. The unattached speedster upset the dope all around, breaking fast with a 45-second handicap and going to the lead in the first mile. This unprecedented action made the other places a mad scramble.

Out in the open stretches, near the Camden Airport and through the Park Boulevard. Wood ran with ease to the fore and held a 50-yard advantage at one occasion. Harold Auch, one of the feared racers, was well back, but began his climb to the front ranks through the park trail.

Paul Mundy, knowing that Auch was the man to beat, was pulling out and around lagging competitors at the same mark, and was only 75 yards in back of the Shanahan man at this time. Then came the traffic tie-up. Mundy was almost hit by a motorist who was stopped by the motorcycle escort heading the run. The motorist, stopped on the side of the road, started up again as soon as the vanguard was past and tied up traffic, almost hitting Mundy in the process.

The Melrose racer lost 50 yards on the mishap, but this was the luck of racing and he started in again with renewed vigor, but he was unable to catch the fleeting front runners. Brother Joe Mundy was away back in the race at this time and carrying a 4 minute 30 second handicap, was never a threat. He finished 40th in the competition, but was clocked in 24.14.

The victory of Beardsley over

such a field of experienced and highly touted runners, created a sensation despite the fact that the others carried heavy handicaps. In scholastic competition, Beardsley finished forty-first in the Public High championships, and was never before considered a real candidate for the Shanahan championship aggregation.

He gave his first glint of ability in the closed Shanahan run held Thanksgiving Day. He finished fifth in this race and has since been groomed by Johnny Gray, 1923 Olympic team member, and Jim McMenamin, the men responsible for his entrance in yesterday's meet.

Camden Y. M. C. A., with a full team in the competition, managed to get a man among the first five. He was George Burger, a racer carrying a 65 second disadvantage

Camden "Y" Harrier Wins 2d Annual Test; Shana- han Grabs Team Prize

Leo Augustine, a Camden Y. M. C. A. harrier, appeared to have wings attached to his nimble feet yesterday, when he ran the fastest race of his career; to capture the second annual cross-country test, sponsored by the Lansdale Junior Moose at Lansdale.

Earl Meade, of Westside and another unheralded runner, led the field; until the four mile point. At that mark, Augustine moved up to lead the field.

John Zack, a Shanahan entry, carted off the time honors for touring the course in the best time. Zack, a consistent winner in this sector and a Middle Atlantic champion, covered the distance in 30 minutes and 41 seconds in elapsed time, but he was a scratch man, and left the starting point four minutes and 20 seconds after the "go" men.

E. Ehley was the first Lansdale harrier to finish, scampering across the finish line in fourteenth position.

Al Knabb, favored to win the race, went 10 seconds before Zack, and finished eleventh in the competition. Knabb, an Oley, Pa., boy representing West Chester State Teachers College, is holder of the Penn Relay 3000 meter Steeplechase. Yesterday's race, however, had a few obstacles in it, and Knabb was not at his best.

Shanahan C. C. continued its team victory streak in the race, compiling a total of 20 points to score easily over Meadowbrook, which tallied 54.

MUNDY BETTERS TIME OVER NATIVITY ROUTE

New York Entrant Takes Time Prize; Smith Wins Race After Near Accident and Shanahan Men Capture Team Trophy

Bill Smith, Public High cross-country champion from Olney High, got his first chance in fast company yesterday and cracked down in front to top the classy field entered in the annual Nativity Catholic Club street run. Paul Mundy, of New York, shared the honors with the youthful Philadelphian by winning the time prize. Shanahan, Middle Atlantic champions, won the team trophy.

To Smith, in particular, went the plaudits of some 5000 persons who lined the course in the Northeast section of the city. The little Trojan, who looks like anything but a distance man, fought courageously over the 5½ miles to assume the lead and win by more than 200 yards.

Beset by every obstacle, unmindful of the crowds that surged out in busy thoroughfares to cheer him on, Smith was almost run down by an automobile at one spot, but went on plodding to first place. His stellar performance almost pushed the brilliant Mundy into the background, but Paul put on pressure to crack the record for the course in 38 minutes, 18 seconds.

To the Mundy brothers, former Nativity men who now represent the Millrose A. A. of New York, went special attention for turning in the smoothest races. Paul, who is national 20 and 15-kilometer champ, swung into the time-prize ratings with an easy pace. His brother, Joe, was almost as good and won second honors in this division, finishing four seconds behind.

But the race turned in by Smith marks him as one of the best middle distance prospects in these parts. He carried a two-minute, 40-second handicap and proved he had competitive spirit by moving up despite all of the course hazards. He ran merely to beat the man in front of him and this formula was a good one as he did not fail in any one instance.

The Trojan had just that kind of will. He would not be beaten and when a car along the road nearly ran over him, he continued as close as he could to the moving machine, even breaking his stride and spurling in front of it. It seemed that everything in his path must be passed—and was.

Norman Gordon, another Olney man, finished second in the race—just as he did in the Public High championships—behind Gordon. It was remarkable the way he tagged after his former teammate. He matched stride for stride with Smith until the winner opened up for the sprint. He did not have the kick that Smith had when the final bid was made.

Joe and Paul Mundy Finish Second and Third in
Tacony Marathon; 46 of 51 Starters Finish
Grind; Earle Meade Grabs Fourth Honors

Joe Yozzo, a contestant in A. A. U. foot races for the past two years, scored his first victory yesterday, and in so doing led his Shanahan Club to the team prize in the Middle Atlantic 15-kilometer championship run over the streets of Tacony.

There were 51 starters in the race, which was sponsored by the William D. Oxley American Legion Post, and 46 finished. Yozzo finished 29 yards ahead of Joe Mundy, who unleashed a terrific sprint on the homestretch. The winner's time was 54 minutes 37 seconds, though his elapsed time was 57.17, since he went at 2.40.

Yozzo's time was not the best of the day. Paul Mundy, National 15- and 20-kilometer champion, ran the fastest race, but, though he was clocked in 49.33, which establishes a district record, the Millrose A. A. star could place no better than third. He followed his brother, Joe, also a Millrose entrant, by about 12 yards.

To neither Yozzo nor Mundy, however, went the Middle Atlantic individual title. This honor went to Johnny Zack, who crossed the finish line in eighth place, but was the first resident of the district to complete the race. His time was 68.12 elapsed or 51.12 actual.

Dorsey Starts Race

Practically all of the 46 finishers won prizes of some sort, for Tacony merchants were generous in their donations. There was even a neighborhood prize, and this went to Charley Carnegie, Nativty veteran, who was the first Tacony boy to make good. He finished ninth.

Shanahan won the team prize by placing representatives first, second, fourth, sixth and eighth for the low total of 21 points. Meadowbrook was second in the team tabulations, Nativty third and Camden Y. M. C. A. fourth.

Frank Dorsey, former Penn runner, who is now the Congressional Representative for the Fifth district, gave the starting signals. Hen Garvin, John Scott, Bill Snowden, Lee Loesching and Joe Carroll took off at Congressman Dorsey's initial signal, for they were the "go" men.

They were not destined to hold their starting advantage for long. Earl Meade, a Shanahan man who started after 2 minutes 40 seconds pulled up steadily on the "go" men and held undisputed possession of the lead at the three-mile mark.

The runners were still fairly well bunched, however, and from time to time some one of them would come up to challenge Meade's leadership. But Meade did not surrender his advantage immediately. He, too, jockeyed, accelerating his pace when challenged and slackening when holding a clear path. Thus as the pack came struggling up Frankford ave. for the first time, Meade was still in front.

He stayed ahead for more than four miles. When the pack completed the first of the two trips around the course, Meade was still ahead, but by now Yozzo was forging from the bunched field.

Garvin, the "go" man, and Ben Merembeck, former Penn runner now with the Meadowbrook Club, were also prominent figures at this stage of the proceedings. Later, of course, they weakened, but first they flared so brilliantly that the leaders were worried by their form. Running almost together, Garvin and Merembeck sprinted up to assume front positions; but their efforts were costly.

The strain so taxed Garvin's strength that he had to slow down and could place only 46th; Merembeck was 43d.

But during their brief flare, both looked like dangerous contenders. Meade was beginning to feel the strain of his front-ranking position, and it was by no means certain that Yozzo's burst of speed was anything more than a flare that would quickly burn him out.

Yozzo was not misjudging his strength. He held to a long, steady, space-eating stride and did not hurry himself to pass Meade. In fact, Yozzo was content to hang back of his Shanahan teammate until only about two and a half miles remained to be covered. Then he finally let go, and did some stepping out of his own.

64 BILL WILSON WINS X-COUNTRY OPENER

Sep, 29, 1935

Former Marathon Racer Tops Field in Lansdale V. F. W. Five-Mile Run

Bill Wilson, veteran Philadelphia marathon runner, took shorter distance racing seriously for the first time yesterday and led a talented pack of harriers home over a five-mile course at Lansdale. The race marked the opening of the cross-country season in this district and was sponsored by the Lansdale Post, V. F. W., in conjunction with the mammoth three-day celebration commemorating the Meuse-Argonne campaign of 1918.

More than 1500 veterans crowded the town to take part in the affair and to watch the brilliant band of middle-distance runners vie for honors in the race. Wilson, heretofore known chiefly as a marathon tripper, dashed across the line an easy victor.

The triumphant harrier, a former Meadowbrook clubman who came to this country more than a decade ago from Ireland where he was well known as a distance runner, finished fourth in the 26-mile, 385-yard run which ended in the Sesqui Stadium on Labor Day and has been a constant place gatherer in every major long distance test this year.

Yesterday he ran his race like a typical marathoner. He was never a factor in the early racing, despite the fact that he did not have a big handicap and left the mark 50 seconds after the go-men. He was far back in the pack, advancing gradually until the last mile when his steady pace wore down Ed Steele, Germantown Boys' Club, who was leading at the time.

Moore Sets Pace

Since Wilson was running unattached, his points did not count in the team scoring and that prize was won by the Camden Y. M. C. A. band with 38 credits. Shanahan C. O. garnered a similar amount, but was second because the Jersey team placed a man nearer the top of the list.

When the select field, 48 strong, left the starting point, George Moore, Germantown Boys' Club took first place and appeared an easy winner as he went out with a dizzy pace and sported a huge advantage over the others. Moore did the first mile in 6 minutes 23 seconds.

Jim Armstrong, another Cliveden performer, was close on Moore's heels on the second mile and Joe O'Donnell moved up for Nativity and challenged the leading pair late on the second mile, while George Casper, another former Meadowbrook man, left the pack and moved forward at the same time.

It was Casper who set the pace at the outset of the third mile and the unattached man had plenty of trouble trying to fight off Steele. The Germantowner finally prevailed in this duel, passing Casper a few yards following the four-mile mark. The ultimate winner, Wilson, fell back in the pack at this

CARNEGIE WINNER IN HARRIER EVENT

Cjarley Home Ahead in Middle Atlantic States 10,000 Meters Test

Charles Carnegie, of the Nativity Catholic Club, is the new junior cross-country champion of the Middle Atlantic States section. He won that title yesterday when he finished ahead of 70 other contestants in a 10,000 meters race sponsored by the A. A. U. over the Cobbs Creek Golf Course. The winner's time was 35 minutes and 28 seconds.

The recently-organized Philadelphia A. C. won the team plaque with a low gross of 51 points. Germantown Boys' Club was second with 54.

The Philadelphia A. C. is practically the same as the disbanded Meadowbrook Club which won the event last year. Harold Auch captured the individual title last year, but was ineligible for the event this year, being a senior runner.

Carnegie led at the halfway mark, but on the last lap Joe Sullivan, of the Shanahan Catholic Club, but running unattached, sprinted in front, Augie Zampitella was second, and Carnegie was in third place.

Due to a mistake on the part of the checkers, the runners understood that the race was to end at this point, and they came dashing down the greens, giving everything they had.

Suddenly it was discovered that they had failed to cover one lap around the green across from the clubhouse. They were slowed down and told to continue on their way. As it turned out, they ran 250 yards more than they should have run.

The first three finishers were running as individuals. Therefore, Joe Alexander was the first man to score. Alexander is a former Penn State runner. He ran in one and two-mile races at the Nittany institution. Phil Cochran, another Philadelphia A. C. man, runs and rows for Malta Boat Club, and Bill Robinhold runs and rows for Undine.

Bill Wilson coaches the winning team, and also wears their colors. Dr. George Lieberman, who also gave them some valuable points, is a marathon runner, and represented the University of Pennsylvania in 1922 and 1923.

There were 74 contestants and 12 clubs entered in yesterday's race, which is said by Referee James Foley to be a record entry. Only three men dropped out before the conclusion of the race.

The Philadelphia College of Osteopathy sponsored yesterday's race, presenting a medal to each man who finished. It was the first time in 10 years that the college at 48th and Spruce had overtaken to sponsor the event.

Ottey came over the line in 35 minutes 24 seconds. He was running unattached. He was the Middle Atlantic champion in 1929, 1930 and 1931. Next Saturday he will be a favorite to capture the national A. A. U. cross-country title in New York.

Crossing the line about 75 yards behind Ottey was Joe Sullivan, of Shanahan C. C., the cigarette factory-hand who won the national junior championship last Sunday at Trenton. He was timed in 36 minutes 1 second.

The chap who came in third also made history. He was Norman Gordon, 16, an Olney High School boy. Gordon's performance was the more noteworthy because he finished seven seconds ahead of Johnny Zack, of Shanahan, defending champion and also winner in 1933. Zack was followed by Charley Carnegie, Nativity Catholic, holder of the Middle Atlantic junior title and runner-up to Sullivan for the national junior honors. Carnegie was timed in 36 minutes 12 seconds.

The next five, completing the first 10 across all were favorites—W. Rubenstein, of the newly formed Philadelphia A. C.; Augie Zampitella, of Shanahan; George Rapp, of the Philadelphia A. C.; Harold Auch, of Shanahan, and J. Clark, of the Germantown Boys' Club.

The team championship went to Shanahan Catholic, which also holds the national junior title. Shanahan scored 31 points to the 43 of the Philadelphia A. C. Then followed Germantown Boys Club with 54, Nativity Catholic Club with 92, Camden Y. M. C. A. with 101, West Chester State Teachers College with 127 and Margate A. A. with 152.

The victorious Shanahan team was composed of Sullivan, Zack, Zampitella, Auch and J. Yozzo. The New Jersey State winner was M. Kavolchuck, of Camden Y. M. C. A., who finished 14th. The Camden Y. M. C. A. also won its State team title. George Williams gained the Gloucester City title.

GLOUCESTER RUN HAS ENTRY OF 102

Outstanding Athletes to Compete in Cross-Country Race Tomorrow

The senior championship cross-country run to be held at Gloucester City tomorrow will have more than 100 starters. There are now 102 athletes entered from the various clubs in Philadelphia, Camden and Gloucester. The race is being run under the direction of the Gloucester Athletic Association, formerly the Gloucester Business Men's Association, and is sanctioned by the A. A. U.

Philadelphia Club Wins First Place Awards At Stacy Park

A 125-pound platinum-haired harrier, Joe Sullivan, of the Shanahan Catholic Club, of Philadelphia, is the new junior national A. A. U. cross country champion.

Putting on pressure when pressure was most necessary, the 25-year-old Sullivan, who looks years younger, outraced a field of 79 starters over a course in Stacy Park yesterday afternoon to capture the title and lead his club to triumph in the team championship.

Charles Carnegie, of the Nativity Club, who had defeated Sullivan last week in the Middle Atlantic cross country at Philadelphia, finished in second position, little more than 10 yards behind Sullivan.

Sullivan covered the distance—slightly more than five miles because of the runners failure to make a loop at the half-way mark—in the excellent time of 28 minutes and 32 seconds.

But it was a blanket finish event, as five other harriers crossed the finish line in less than 29 minutes. Little more than 50 yards separated the leaders as they completed the jaunt. Close behind Carnegie was Johnny Zach, of the Shanahan C. C., who led the way for his teammate and buddy, Augie Zampetella.

Frank Kelly, of the Philadelphia A. C., running independently because he had previously been on a winning team, came home in fifth position, with Albert C. Handley, of the Irish-American A. C., in pursuit.

A gallery of more than 1,500 lined the course at the finish and thrilled to the footbeats of the slightly-built Sullivan. Joe, running a beautifully paced race, was comparatively fresh at the finish, and wasn't talking nonsense when he said:

"It was swell, and I felt great at the finish. I know I could have gone on and piled up more yardage if I had to."

Not until the race went into its last stages did the ultimate winner deliver his bolt. Then, it found its mark. Nosing by Carnegie when the latter became confused at a turn at the pump-station on the return trip, Sullivan went out in front and then successfully fought off all bids by the Nativity ace.

A stellar field of 79 answered the starter's gun on the grass at the lower end of the park. Up through a lane of spectators and trees they jogged and sprinted, battling for advantageous positions. Around a tree-pylon came the pack, bobbing up and down, with only inches separating one runner from another. They were as tightly grouped as a bunch of grapes going down the park straightway. Only when the group approached the Calhoun Street crossing did anyone flash into an appreciable lead. It was Carnegie who was out in front, and Sullivan was buried deep in the large field.

From then on Carnegie kept drawing away. Soon he had constructed a comfortable lead, and he was running easily. When the half-way mark at Brookfield was reached, he was ahead by about 25 yards.

Grinding off the yards at an exceptionally fast pace, Carnegie missed the turn where the runners were supposed to bear left and circle. Instead, he turned right, and the pack did likewise as so many "follow the leader" players.

At the half-way point, John Kernason, of the Millrose A. A., was in second position, with David Kantrowitz, of St. Anselm's A. C., of New York, in third place. Al Handley was close behind in fourth position.

Kernason Gets "Stitch"

Heading for home, the Millrose runner opened up. By the time Lee Avenue was reached, he was out in front. Sullivan contented himself with a place much farther back.

But Kernason's efforts took heavy toll, and just before he reached Parkside Avenue he caught a stitch in his side. Carnegie, who was in second place, forged ahead, and Kernason slid back. It was then that Sullivan showed that he was to be a real contender for the title. He stepped past the tiring leaders and soon was close behind Carnegie. Here the battle began. It reached a turning point when the Nativity harrier became confused and lost time on a turn near the pump station.

Sullivan flashed ahead, and he courageously and successfully, fought off repeated challenges.

His victory, together with the scores made by his mates, earned the huge Times Trophy for the Shanahans. The race was held under the auspices of the Times Newspapers. First, second and third place winners, and first, second and third teams received A. A. U. medals.

Harold Auch, of Shanahan, sixteenth finisher, and his teammate Zach, finished in second and fourth positions in last year's junior nationals at Butler, Ind.

Much of the credit for the Shanahan victory is due little Johnny Gray, coach and trainer. Gray, former Olympic runner, had visited Trenton as a competitor several years ago when he won a road race sponsored by the Trenton Times. Mel Sheppard—old Peerless Mel—idol of track fans and public alike back near the turn of the century, was in charge of the Millrose A. A. team.

One of the greatest surprises of the race was the failure of Frank Nordell, of Philadelphia, former N. Y. U. ace miler and later a New York A. C. luminary, to complete the grind. He was one of five starters who found the pace too hot to continue the entire distance.

Moving along with the ease of ballet dancers, two young runners furnished the thrills in the annual Camden Y.M.C.A. five-mile handicap run on Saturday afternoon.

He started from scratch. Shanahan Team Winner

The Shanahan Catholic Club gained the club's prize with a score of 30 points, with the Germantown Boys Club entrenched in the runner-up position with 60 markers.

For the first mile-and-a-half, Bill Steindel, of Margate, set a fast pace, but when he was forced to 'hit' the hills of Farnham Park the stiff grades took their toll. As they started out Kaighn avenue, Hess staged a short sprint to grab the leadership at the two-and-a-half-mile mark.

The only mistake the Birdsboro runner made during the afternoon was coming in the Wilson Boulevard. He was at least fifty-yards ahead of his closest rival, but he persisted in looking back all during the run along the boulevard. He lost valuable time in this foolhardy move and had he paid particular attention to his own speed he might have set a new record. However, he finished a good city block ahead of the field, but if he had been 'taken' in a close sprint at the finish line, it could have been attributed to his carelessness on the boulevard.

Nordell's Record Broken

Ottey, who was presented with a permanent trophy for setting the new record, shattered a mark that stood since 1931. Frank Nordell, New York University harrier, was responsible for the old record of 23 minutes and six-seconds. Ottey also received a trophy for the best time of the race, and also received a medal.

Another outstanding participant of the afternoon was Ray Wood, of the Camden 'Y', who finished in fifth place. His actual running time was 24 minutes and 31 seconds. It was the best time for a South Jersey entrant, and with it went a handsome trophy for his fine efforts.

It was one of the classiest races ever held by the local institution and, although it started late, once underway it was handled in flawless fashion.

his burst of speed could be compared to the pace of a first rate half-miler.

Hughes was lost in the final sprint, having spent himself by his early efforts. Cavellier passed him and then Ottey did the same. In rapid succession, Ray Wood, Camden; Joe Sullivan, Shanahan, and Bill Bornman, Germantown, caught the former leader and he came in sixth.

Joe Sullivan, Shanahan's chief hope in the race and junior national individual champion, was Ottey's nearest competitor in the time racing. The West Philadelphia clubman ran gamely against the U. S. champ and hung on grimly in the final test. At that Sullivan was clocked 32 seconds behind the Spartan speedster.

Ottey ran the race unattached, and his brilliant performance had no bearing on the team scoring. Cavellier was the first man to count in the bracket for the Dr. Francois D'Elescu trophy. Cavellier's points counted for Margate A. A., which was too weak in other places to be considered a factor for the prize.

Sullivan's points, however, aided the Shanahan cause and Roy Bingham backed up his leader in the low scoring. Johnny Zack, Harold Auch and Earl Mead were other West Philadelphia runners who enabled Shanahan to garner the low total point tally.

William Rayhill, former Northeast Catholic harrier, was the first Nativity man to count, crossing the line in eighth position. The Falcon racer carried a 3½-minute impost and was among the leaders in the time bracket.

Norman Gordon, another scholastic distance man from Olney High School, ran a splendid race, too, and was high among the time scorers. The Olney harrier, however, was 24th on the finishers' list, but he was started 4 minutes 35 seconds after the go men.

Duel Doesn't Pan Out

The expected duel between Wudyka and Ottey failed to materialize over the route, as the Cherry and White star appeared off form and only fought with Ottey over the first mile and a half. Wudyka has not been in much competition lately which may have been the reason for his showing.

A field of 68 starters were ready on the mark when Marshall George Fithian, in charge of the affair, got the boys ready. Only one of the starters failed to finish the grind, which was over a cobble-paved course which included several hills.

The first homester runner to finish the grueling race was Johnny Gsell and a special prize was won by the latter. Gsell, getting his second taste of open competition, was 27th among the finishers and showed promise. The homester was awarded a traveling bag by admirers.

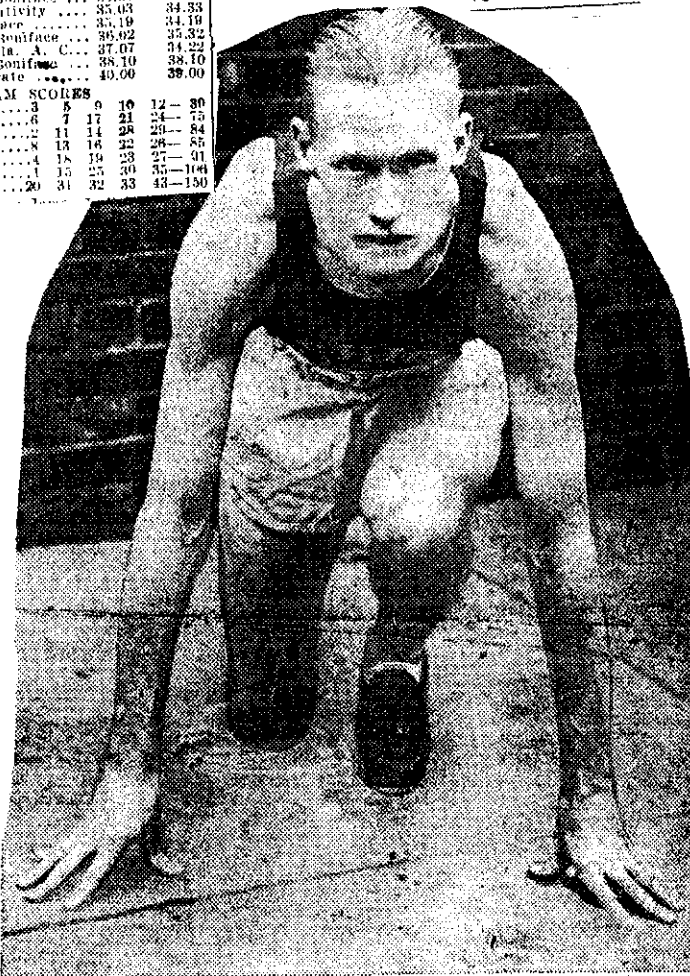

east Catholic High graduate, was home first in the 17th annual Nativty Catholic Club street run yesterday, defeating a formidable field of Middle Atlantic Association A. A. U. harriers. Joe Sullivan, junior national champion, annexed time honors in the race, finishing fourth and aiding materially in the victory scored by the Shanahan team.

Rayhill, running under the disadvantage of a heavy handicap, was never factor in the early racing, first becoming evident as a challenger on the fifth mile. The former Falcon, who plans to enter Temple in February, won by almost 50 yards over Johnny Zack, Shanahan star, who finished second.

The victorious distance racer, a member of the Nativty club, opened his campaign for laurels four minutes after the "go" men got under way. His elapsed time for the event was 39 minutes 9 seconds and his actual time was 35 minutes 9 seconds.

Tom Ottey and Girard Boss, outstanding entrants in the race, were expected to duel for the prize, but competition between the pair failed to materialize as Ottey did not make an appearance. It was explained by officials that Ottey, who is an accountant, had to work and was unable to run.

Girard Boss, Michigan State sophomore, was not without competition, however, Joe Sullivan electing to try his stamina against the Spartan, who finished seventh in the recently staged I. C. 4-A. cross-country championships. To make the duel more interesting, Sullivan, who was handicapped 15 seconds less than Boss, asked to be more heavily imposed.

Ehms Falls Back

Both Boss and Sullivan started six minutes after the rest of the field, and after matching stride for stride over the early miles, Sullivan stepped out on the last lap. The surge carried him quickly to the fore and he was fourth, while Boss could not get better than ninth at the finish yarn.

Ice and snow-covered streets in the northeast section of the city hampered the harriers more than a little, making the footing precarious for the experienced and tiring out the novice aspirants. Only 46 men, out of the original 93 entered, lined up to brave the adverse elements.

Bill Snowden, a teammate of Rayhill's, was the early pace-setter, breaking fast at 20 seconds after the starting gun fired by Charley Roeser and taking the lead at the mile stake. For two miles Snowden held his advantage, only to give up to Charley Ehms at the half-way mark.

The effort to get into the van, however, cost Ehms heavily in stamina and when the real test came on the final lap the Shanahan entrant could not stand the gaff, fading back. Ehms finally finished up in last place.

Wilson Near Leaders

But on the fourth mile the duel between the veterans and Rayhill began to take shape. Dr. George Leiberman, Philadelphia A. C. representative; Joe Yozzo, Shanahan, and the ultimate winner were stretched out in order named behind Ehms when the real test came.

Bill Wilson, veteran marathoner, who won the opening race of the season, a six-mile affair at Lansdale, was coming strong, too, and at this point it appeared as though the veteran harrier might be able to withstand the cold and ice betw-

Leiberman, and then changes took place with such rapidity that it was virtually impossible to follow them. Mike Kavolchuck, nowhere near the leaders prior to this time, came forward with a dazzling burst of speed and so did Joe Sullivan.

The speed with which Rayhill gained recognition as the leading Catholic High School miler at the interscholastics at Notre Dame last spring then became evident. The Nativty ace was fresh and his "kick" lengthened until he caught the leaders and continued until he opened a comfortable gap.

Johnny Zack, another harrier with a strong finish, tried vainly to catch his fleeting rival and did well to get within 50 yards of him. Sullivan was close too, but Mike Kavolchuck, strong Camden Y. M. C. A. racer, had enough left to withstand the junior champion's challenge and kept his third place position from danger.

Mundy Holds Record

In the finish sprint, men like Wilson and Leiberman, who depend mostly on their strength and experience to carry them through, were hopelessly lost. Wilson hung on to take fifth place, but Harold Auch, Ray Wood and John Clarke broke fast to pass Leiberman.

Although he finished ninth, Girard Boss, Michigan State star, completed the course in 33 minutes, 54 seconds to take second time prize. Johnny Zack and Harold Auch, both Shanahan men, were third and fourth respectively in the time prize racing and Rayhill also came in for a slice of honors in that bracket, taking fifth.

Sullivan's actual time for the route was 33 minutes, 44 seconds, not even close to the standard set by Paul Mundy, New York harrier who raced the distance in 32 minutes, 18 seconds last year to establish a new mark. 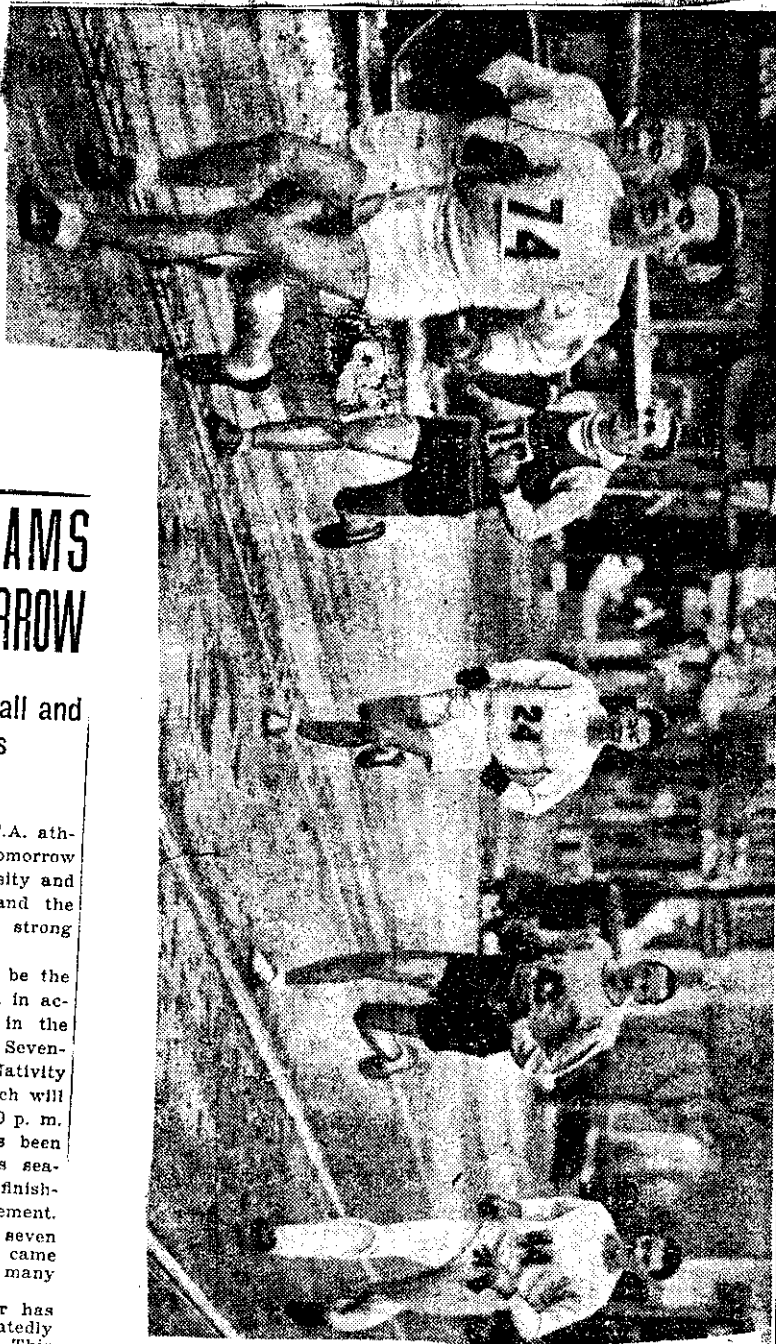
Cross Country, Handball and

**Bill Rayhill Home First
in Annual Nativity Race**

EHMS BREAKS YARN IN SIX-MILE EVENT

*Shanahan Runner Home First in Handicap Race;
Cavelier Upsets by Annexing Time Laurels;
Shanahan C. C. Lands Team Triumph*

Charles "Bucky" Ehms and James Cavelier, both virtually novice harriers, created the major upsets of the cross-country and street-run season yesterday when they shared honors in a six-mile grind staged by the West Philadelphia Y. M. C. A. The race was held over a course of West Philadelphia streets, with Ehms coming home first in a handicap affair and Cavelier gaining time laurels over the formidable field.

It was Ehms' sixth start in open competition as a member of the Shanahan Catholic Club, which won team honors. The victory of the 18-year-old youth was a sharp reversal over form he displayed in other recent races. Last week, in fact, Ehms finished dead last in the Nativity C. C. run.

Cavelier, a Margate, N. J., runner, appearing in the fourth race of his career, ran the route faster than either Joe Sullivan, junior national cross-country champion, or Girard Boss, collegiate star from Michigan State. Cavelier was sixth in the finisher, despite the fact that he was heavily imposed in the handicaps.

Snow and ice covered the course laid out by the sponsors of the race, but to Ehms these conditions meant nothing. The Shanahan racer, a protege of Sullivan, duelled courageously all the way with the front runners and withstood the challenge of the scratch men with a burst of speed in the home stretch.

Ehms Leads Way

The race was one of the most interesting of the year, what with 51 starters lined up to compete for the elaborate prizes offered by the West Philadelphia Businessmen's Association. Along the way, on every mile, there was a fight for first place, no one runner compiling a big lead over the pack.

William Wilson, Philadelphia A. C. runner and a veteran marathoner, gave a good account of himself in the last two miles, joining the top flight by virtue of his stamina. Many of the late finishers, completely worn out from the tough go-

CARR, NATIVITY, WINS FIVE-MILE SHORE RUN

*Veteran Racer Realizes Ambition When He Leads
Pack to Finish in Margate Event; Otley Lands
Time Prize, Shanahan Captures Team Laurels*

MARGATE CITY, N. J., March 29.—Harry Carr, 33-year-old Nativity Catholic Club distance racer, upset a formidable field of harriers over a five-mile course here today in the third annual Margate A. A. cross-country grind. The stout-hearted, strong-limbed pupil of John St. Clair led home a pack of 80 starters over the Bay Side route.

Carr, with his startling performance shared the limelight with Tom Otley, Penn A. C. entrant, who gained first time prize over the same distance, and Shanahan Catholic Club, which landed team laurels, Passon A. A., composed of former Meadowbrook runners, Margate and Nativity trailed in the order named for the group honors.

The Nativity winner, who left the starting line 3 minutes 45 seconds before Otley realized an ambition of nine years' standing by breaking the tap first, Carr has been a member of the Nativity team since 1926 and never won a major race before in his career.

But there was no denying his superiority today, as he judged his pace well and broke into the lead with but a mile left to travel. Until the time he assumed the advantage, John Donaldson, a Margate man and who is a student of Holy Spirit, was out in front and put up a game battle before he succumbed to the grueling pace.

The ultimate winner, though back in the pack most of the way, crept up a little at a time as the race progressed. He fought a private duel with D. Williams, of Shanahan, just before the spurt which carried him to the van. Only once after that was he challenged as William McCloskey, another Shanahan racer, closed up a big gap at the last and was less than ten yards behind.

Donaldson Favorite

Those who saw the early racing could not figure how Donaldson could lose. The homester favorite, taking the lead in the first mile, at one time was more than 200 yards in the van of his nearest competitor. He ran with legs high, like a spirited prancing race horse as he traversed the first lap past the temporary grandstands in front of city hall and received the cheers of the packed gallery. He was unable to stand the strain, however, and finished fourth at the end.

If the race had been long, Tom Otley, Penn A. C. entrant and present National A. A. U. 10,000-meter champion, would undoubtedly have won. Otley was the scratch man in the event leaving the mark five minutes after the "go" men. Yet he improved his position with almost every stride and came up to ninth position overtaking rivals with an ease that was amazing.

On his heels was Stan Wudyka, former Temple athlete, who competed today unattached. Stan, not in his best shape, was unable to catch up with Otley after Tom passed him in the early racing. Stan left the mark 25 seconds before his principal rival, taking off with Harold Auch, another top-flight racer from Shanahan.

The Fourteenth Annual Street Run of the Camden Y. M. C. A. will be held on Saturday afternoon, December 5th.

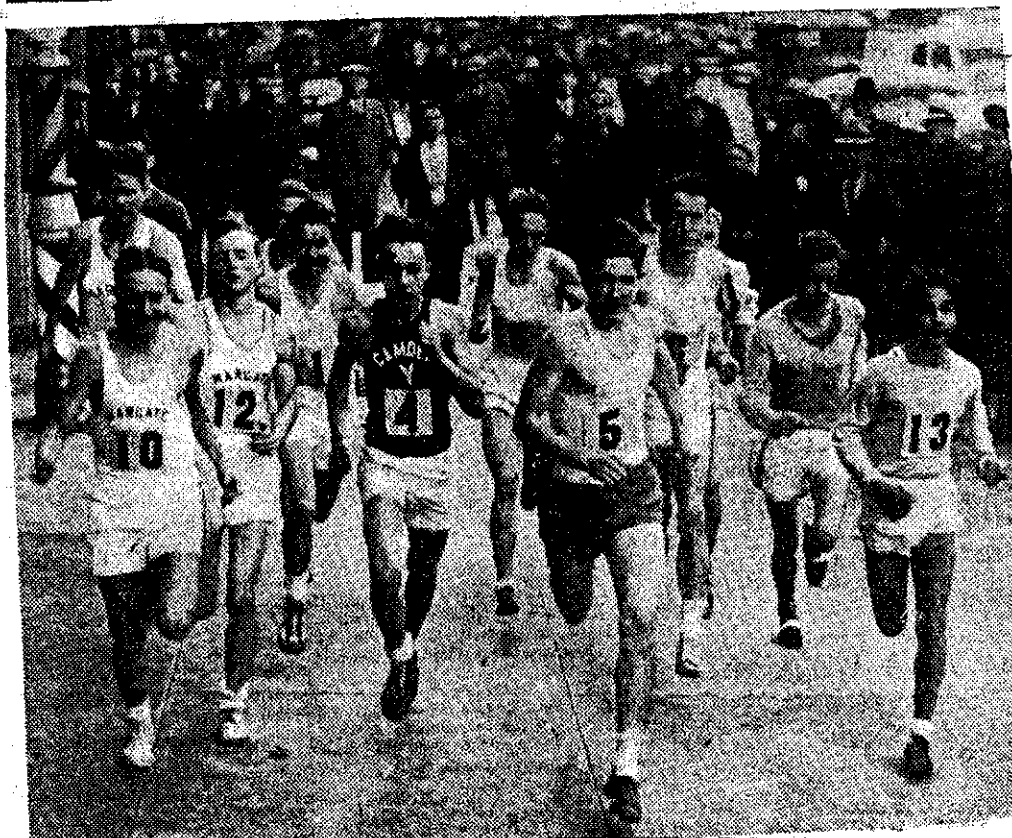
The event draws one of the biggest fields in New Jersey, both locally and nationally. Harriers anxious to compete in the affair can secure entry blanks at the "Y."

Mike McConn Snared Street Run Honors

Dec. 26, 1936

Mike McConn, born in Ireland, who recently turned to distance racing, at 28 years, gained top laurels yesterday in the 18th annual Nativity Catholic Club handicap street run over 10,000 metres.

Mike, a strong-limbed, low-headed athlete, led over the last four miles of the long jaunt to take undisputed possession of first place. The team prize was won by the Mercury A. A., a newly organized band of Northeast High racers, under the direction of Bill Rittler, with 54 points, and the time trophy was taken by Harold Auch, Shanahan speedster who was crowned Middle Atlantic champion just one week ago.

But the triumph of the homester was the most startling event in the long run over a meandering maze of streets and avenues in the Northeast section of the city. The rugged Nativity entrant battled for his supremacy over the first two miles—won a 100-yard advantage and held it thereafter.

Barker Leads at Start

Al Barker, a young man from Camden, was the early leader, assuming temporary command away from the mark and retaining it for more than a half-mile unchallenged.

John Chimoskow, a Passon entrant, furnished the early opposition with McConn trapped far back at the time. But before the first eight furlongs were completed, Mike made his presence felt and the most thrilling part of the race came when he drew even with Chimoskow.

The homester was unable to gain an inch over the Passon racer for more than a mile as they ran neck and neck, but Chimoskow weakened first and dropped back. The issue was never in doubt again as McConn apparently gathered confidence and continued to open the gap.

The winner, a stationary engineer, only decided to take up distance running in July and went under the mentorship of Johnny St. Clair for several months before he attempted open competition. His time for the approximate 6½ miles was 37 minutes, 11 seconds.

A four-corner fight took place for the time prize with Harold Auch, Shanahan; Joe Sullivan, Shanahan; Charley Carnegie, Nativity and Jessie Cavaleer of Margate battling with every ounce of their speed and stamina for the honor.

Auch, a winner by less than 10 yards over Sullivan in the championship race a week ago; Cavaleer, rated as the most sensational of all distance racers developed in this district last year and Carnegie, the veteran, were all heavily handicapped.

Cavaleer, now attending Syracuse University as a theological student, was feared because little was known of his improvement since last season. Jess was one of the best two milers hereabouts during the summer months, climaxing his successful long distance campaign with several performances well under 10 minutes for the cinderpath race.

STREET RUN WON BY SHANAHAN ATHLETE

Cusack Triumphs Easily
in West Phila. Event;

John Cusack, Shanahan Catholic Club distance racer, claimed laurels yesterday when he led a pack of 53 finishers to the yarn over six miles of West Phila. streets in the annual West Branch Y. M. C. A. Street Run. The Mercury A. C., recently organized running club, annexed team laurels for the second straight week and Harold Auch notched up his fourth consecutive time triumph of the season.

The event was conducted on a handicap basis, and Cusack, formerly a gymnast at Shanahan A. C., was among the early starters, leaving the mark 30 seconds after the "go" men. The Lancaster ave. clubman assumed command on the first mile and was never headed thereafter, leading Charles Ehms, a teammate, to the line by more than 300 yards.

Cusack Wins Easily

Employing an unorthodox "knee action" running style, of a type also used by Harold Auch, the victor displayed unusual strength and stamina, especially on the hills and dales of heavily trafficked Baltimore ave. On this stretch, Cusack opened such a gap that he could have virtually walked the last mile home and won.

Bert Young, youthful Mercury racer, topped his team's scorers, finishing third. Young, a protege of William Rittler, Sr., also in the race, clung to the leaders as long as possible, but could not stand the dizzy

pace of Cusack and settled back to hold his position safe. Four Mercury runners were numbered in the first 10 finishers.

A four-cornered feud took place for time laurels, Charley Carnegie, Nativity; Girard Boss, Michigan State and Shanahan C. C. and Jesse Cavileer, of Margate, struggling over the route. Auch was the most heavily handicapped, but picked up on all those to leave before him in the select bracket, excepting Carnegie. The Nativity veteran refused to be passed and captured second prize.

Ragen Falters.

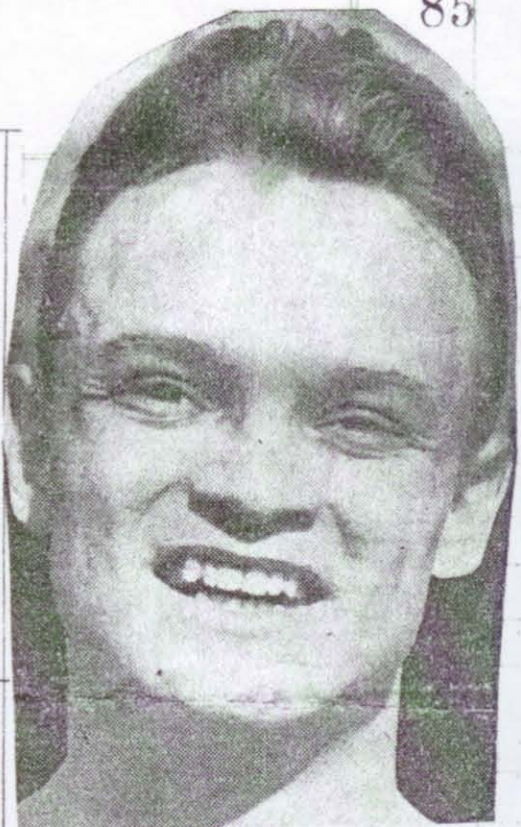

Ragen lost his advantage as the runners moved into the sixth mile. Koenig, Schiller and Wyant all closed the gap the Camden's entrant had erected.

The best time prize went to Shanahan's Harold Auch, who reeled off the distance in 35.02. Shanahan's squad carried off team prize honors, but surrendered the prize to St. Anselm's team.

DiCamillo was among the first seven runners to answer Director of Public Safety Emanuel's starting gun. Majesty, who started a minute later, and Hart caught up with the South Philly runner at Green st. From there on it was a close, grim battle.

A father and son combination helped the Mercury team walk off with the team trophy when Billy Rittler, 3d, finished ninth while his father, Bill Rittler, 2d, former Middle Atlantic champion, finished 11th.

Falls To Catch Son.

Rittler senior started a minute and a half after his son. He cut down the handicap considerably, but could not quite catch his offspring.

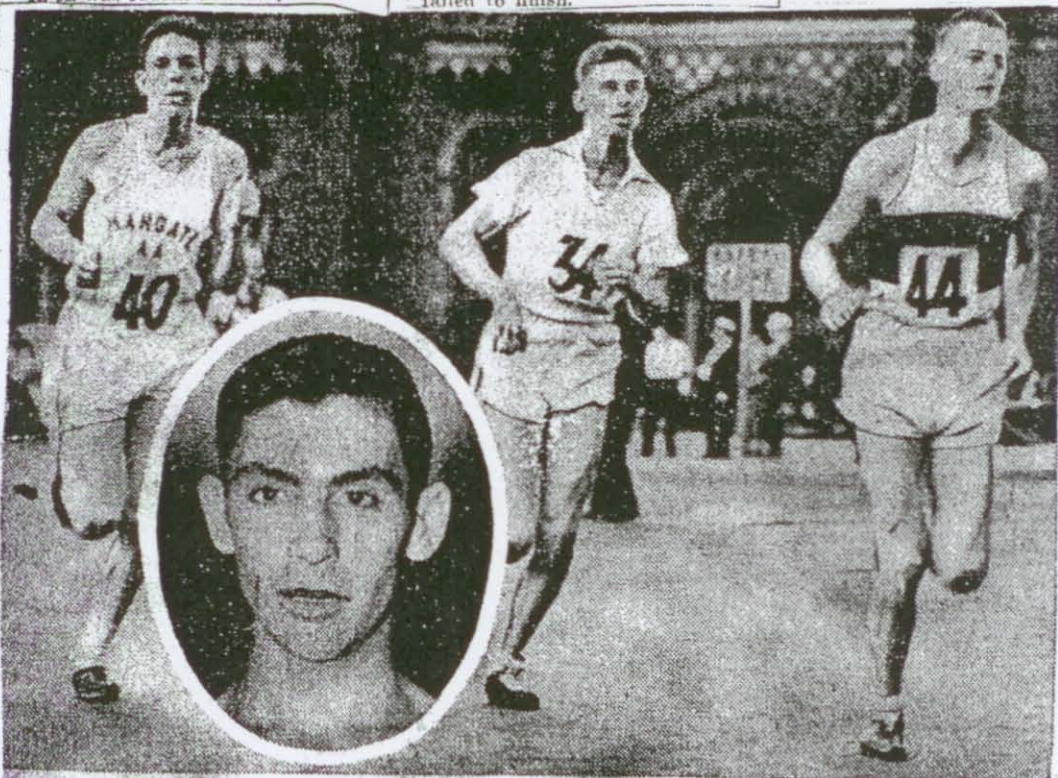
Auch finished in 18th position, while Gordon, with a 30-second handicap on the scratch man, finished 20th.

Jim Bowser, husky shore youth who strengthens his legs playing ice hockey, pranced home an easy winner over a field of 72 harriers in the 15th annual Camden Y. M. C. A. street run.

The 4.7 mile jaunt, which was held Saturday, started in front of the 'Y' building and culminated at Seventh and Federal streets. Jim, a 16-year-old lad is a senior and captain of the Holy Spirit High School track team. Bowser's elapsed time was 26 minutes 25 seconds; his actual time was recorded as 24 minutes 55 seconds.

Al Otero, diminutive Passon representative, finished in second position after leading the field for more than a mile. The Atlantic county youngster's steady, long stride enabled him to overtake the short-stepping Otero near the Admiral Wilson boulevard bridge.

Good Sportsmanship Shown

The best piece of sportsmanship shown in any sporting event in this section for a long time was displayed by Mike Kavolochyck, a member of the 'Y' team. Mike hit the tape in ninth place, about 18 yards behind Joe Rauss, of the same team. It has been the custom in this particular event to award a trophy to the first 'Y' runner to finish.

It was announced that Rauss was ineligible for the prize as he was not a paid up member. The cup naturally, would go to the next 'Y' boy that completed the run. Kavolochyck refused to accept the cup and asked that the award be given to its rightful winner—Rauss.

Joe Sullivan, former junior national cross-country champion, turned in the best actual time. He covered the course in 23 minutes 37 seconds to win a nice plaque. The record is held by Tom Ottey, a member of the U. S. Olympic team. It is 22 minutes 32 seconds and was set in 1935.

The Mercury club compiled a total of 48 points to gain one-leg on the team trophy, replacing Margate A. A., last year's champions. The latter club only had four runners entered and was ineligible as far as the team award was concerned.

Young Loses Lead

A youngster by the name of Ben Young, of Mercury, set the early pace but wilted around the mile-and-a-half mark. He relinquished the lead to Otero at Farnham Park. Otero, it seems, loomed as the new titleholder as the scattered field converged onto the boulevard. Bowser kept plugging away and Otero lost his stride, giving Bowser his opportunity to "challenge" after they passed Baird avenue.

The seashore student finally pulled up on even terms and then shot past his mite rival at the Admiral Wilson boulevard bridge. After that the ultimate winner was never in doubt as Bowser's fine stride "ate" up the asphalt in large chunks.

It was a great race and gave Bowser a rigid foundation before he begins his college career at Syracuse, where he will join a former teammate Jess Cavalier, who is now a freshman. Jess recently finished third in the national intercollegiate

SULLIVAN WINNER IN CROSS-COUNTRY

Having led the field of 31 harriers across the finish line, little tow-headed Joe Sullivan, representing the Shanahan Catholic Club, yesterday won the senior cross-country championship of the Middle Atlantic A. 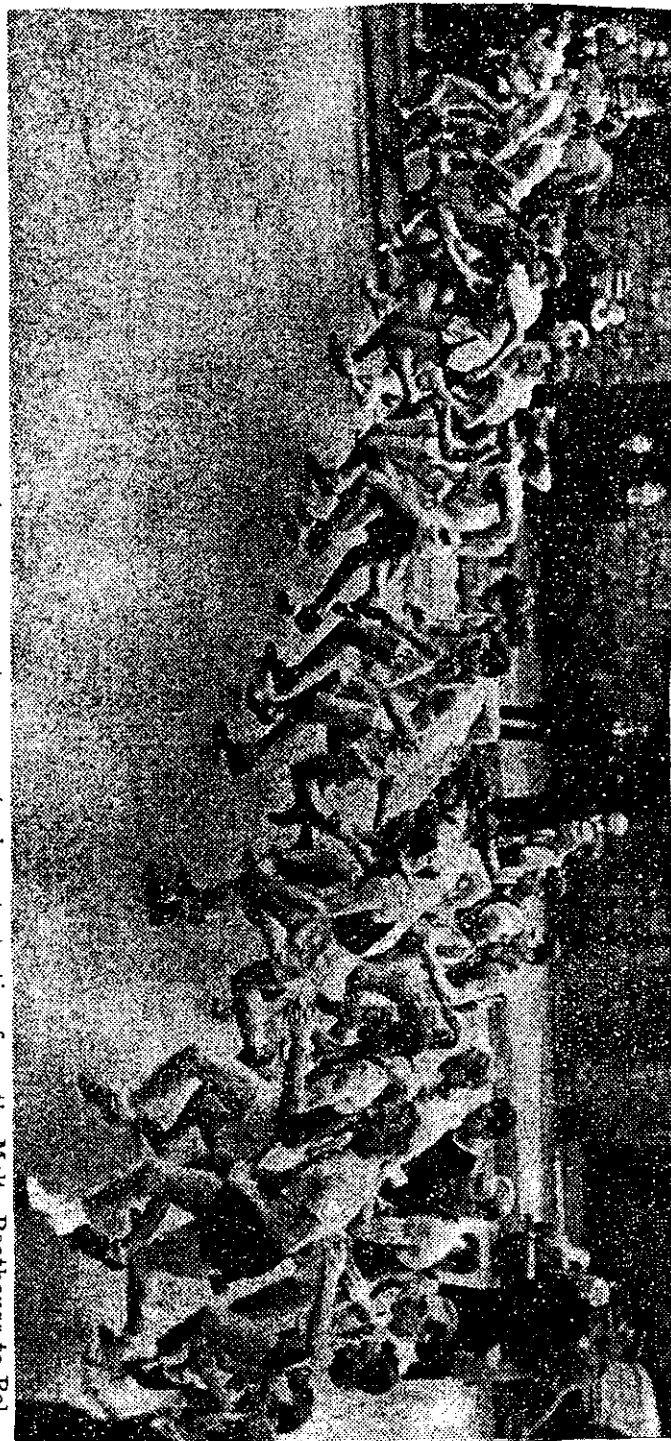

GORDON VICTOR IN STREET RUN

Shanahan Ace Beats
Blackwell in Annual
52d St. Event.

Norman William Gordon, Penn State's 19-year-old cross-country runner and National Junior A. A. U. steeplechase titleholder, defeated a field of 70 starters yesterday in the sixth annual running of the Greater 52d-Street Business Men's Association Street Run.

Blackwell 5 Yards Back.

Gordon, who formerly ran for Olney High and represented Shanahan Catholic Club, won by five yards from Mercury's Henry Blackwell, who was hard pressed to beat Frank Kelly, Passon, who ran third. Blackwell's whirlwind spurt stayed off Kelly's last minute challenge and only two yards separated them at the taps.

Gordon also reaped honors for the best time prize. The Shanahan standard bearer's clocking of 34-31 bettered that of Joe Sullivan, a team-mate, who won this honor last year. Sullivan was four seconds behind Gordon.

Neither a driving rain, which started soon after the field left the starting spot at 52nd and Sanson sts. nor a chilly breeze, hampered Gordon, who was content to lag behind for most of the course but always within striking distance of the leaders.

Conboy Weakens.

Gordon's first bid to pass the field came in the last 300 yards. Here the Shanahan runner passed Frank Kelly, who previously wrested the lead from Tom Conboy. Shanahan. Conboy paced the field for the first five miles but weakened at the start of the last mile.

Kelly, however, didn't hold his lead long. Gordon, who, in the meanwhile, turned on steam, was soon thundering close on the heels of his rival. He swung on even terms, matched strides with Kelly, then put on a burst of speed that carried him to victory. Kelly then lagged behind and after a nip and tuck race with Blackwell finally finished third.

The next two runners to finish, Henry Hart and Conboy, also waged a keen battle down the stretch with Hart, a Northeast High runner, beating off the Shanahan star.

The Mercury A. A. team repeated its victory for the team-prize. This outfit posted 32 points. In repeating its victory of last season, Mercury sent one man home in second place, another in fourth, and five of the first 10 to cross the line. Shanahan's team finished 10 points behind Mercury. Passon scored 47 for third place with Nativity fourth.

Dad Among Vanquished.

CAMDEN 'Y' HOLDS ANNUAL STREET RUN

Numerous Prizes to Be
Awarded in 17th Yearly
Event on Saturday

The Camden Y. M. C. A. will stage its 17th annual handicap street run on Saturday, starting at 2:30 p. m.

The Camden "Y" run was originated back in 1923 by Maximilian Younger, one of the local physical directors at that time, and since 1927 a professor in physical education at Temple University. At that time only Y. M. C. A. members were permitted to enter. The first race was won by John Meiler, a local sportsman.

After the first year the race was opened to A. A. U. runners, and naturally the number of entries increased yearly to the point where it draws well over 100 entries every year.

Another interesting point in regard to local runners is the fact that John Glazer, a Camden man, has run in all 16 races staged by the local "Y," and is entered in this run as well, making it 17 straight; and judging from Glazer's past performances, and his present ability to run, should be good for a good many more years of running.

BOB CAMPBELL VICTOR IN 'Y' STREET EVENT

**Bests Field of 55 Harriers
in 18th Annual 4.7-
Mile Race**

BUTFILOSKI SECOND

Bob Campbell, former Olney High School star, is the new champion of the Camden Y. M. C. A. Street Run.

Bob, representing Nativity Catholic Club, of Philadelphia, outdistanced a field of 56 harriers last Saturday afternoon in the 18th annual race that wound 4.7 miles through the streets of Camden and Farnham Park.

Some of the best long-distance runners in the East competed in the event.

Campbell led Frank Butfiloski, Warinanco Club, Elizabeth, N. J., by five yards at the finish after the North Jersey runner's sprint in the last 50 yards all but wrestled the lead from Campbell.

Campbell Rallies

The Nativity Catholic Club runner gained the lead just as the field wended its way into the last mile. At this juncture Campbell, who had been hotfooting it among the first 10 from the start, put on a burst of speed and sped by Bobby O'Brien, a teammate. O'Brien tried to match strides with Campbell, but after pulling up on even terms halfway from the finish, O'Brien dropped back again and never did catch the flying Campbell.

O'Brien and Charley McGee alternately set the early pace. O'Brien held the lead to the half-way mark, lost it to McGee and then regained it. Just after O'Brien went ahead, Campbell sprinted up from behind to lead the rest of the way. The winner's actual time was 25.15, which was just a second faster than the second-place finisher, Butfiloski.

Gordon Gets Time Prize

Norman Gordon, Shanahan Catholic Club, raced around the course in 23.40 to capture the best time prize. David Williams also Shanahan, had the second best time,

GRUNDLOCK, HADDON HEIGHTS HARRIER, WINS STREET RUN

16-Year-old Schoolboy
Beats Field of 80 in.
Annual 'Y' Event

FARAGHAN SECOND

Milton Grundlock, 16-year-old Haddon Heights High School junior, today is the proud possessor of the 19th annual Y. M. C. A. street run trophy.

Grundlock outdistanced a field of 80 harriers who started in the 4.7 mile race from the "Y" building Saturday, to beat the tape at Seventh and Federal streets in 27 minutes 46 seconds. He had been given a 50-second handicap. He ran for the Shanahan C. C., of Philadelphia.

Another youngster, George Faraghan, 15, Olney High School student, representing the Mercury Club, made his debut in long distance running by copping second place. Faraghan took the lead after the first mile and held it until he crossed the Admiral Wilson boulevard drawbridge over Cooper river.

Shortly afterward Grundlock overtook him and went on to win. Just as Faraghan approached the bridge it appeared as though the race would be discontinued, the bridge being raised to allow passage of a tugboat. But the structure was lowered just in time to necessitate the runners from interrupting their stride.

Faraghan's time was 27 minutes 54 seconds. Third and winner of the time prize was Norman Gordon, also of the Shanahan Club, which copped the team prize. Gordon refused a proffered 15 second handicap, started from scratch and sprinted home in 28 minutes 4 seconds. Since he spotted the rest of the field 4 minutes 15 seconds his actual time was 23 minutes 34 seconds.

Record for the course is the 22.49 set by Tom Ottey, of Meadowbrook, in 1932.

The best weather conditions in years prevailed and evidence of it was the fact that 79 of 80 starters finished.

John Glazer, of the Camden Y. M. C. A., who has participated in all 19 races sponsored by the local institution finished 70th.

A crowd of about 250 saw the runners off and most remained to watch the boys cross the finish line.

Team winner was Shanahan with 38 points, while Mercury with 47, and Mitchell with 72, were second and third, respectively.

Williams, Last to Start,
First to Finish; Misses
Otley's Course Record

South Jersey athletes today had a stranglehold on the top prizes in the annual YMCA street run held Saturday.

Dave Williams, 22-year-old Georgetown pre-legal sophomore who was graduated from Gloucester Catholic High School in '37, turned in one of the most remarkable performances ever recorded in the race when he won the time prize and was first to finish.

In finishing ahead of a field whose vanguard enjoyed a 5-minute handicap, Williams was the first to execute that feat in the history of the yearly classic here.

Williams Beats Ross

However, doing the unexpected has become a habit with this illustrious son of an equally capable father, George Williams, who also was a top-notch harrier in his day. The elder Williams racked up all kinds of marks in his heyday which extended over a 25-year period.

Young Williams, who represented Shanahan CC, of Philadelphia, Saturday, recently placed third in the national 10,000 meters national championships in Newark, and on Thanksgiving Day tucked away the Middle Atlantic crown over the same distance. In addition, Williams has been undefeated for two years while performing for his "alma mater."

Williams' time closely approached that of Tom Otley, who set the course record in 1936 for Penn AC in 22 minutes 49 seconds. Williams started from scratch and covered the gruelling course in 23 minutes 4 seconds, lapping 53 of 55 runners who finished.

Browning Ross, Woodbury High School senior, who also was carrying Shanahan's colors, was second by two yards. His actual running time was 23 minutes 45 seconds. Ross is unbeaten in scholastic competition and is state champion. He also placed third in the national interscholastics.

Woodbury Hi Runner Third

A teammate of Ross's, Charley Sarlo, representing Woodbury High and placed third with 27 minutes 33 seconds having elapsed during his trek around the proscribed pattern of hill and dale.

Then entry of 55 candidates was the smallest in the history of the event and was attributed directly to wartime circumstances.

Only one service man, Pvt. Ed O'Toole, former Manhattan College runner who is stationed with the Fort Dix Medical unit, participated. He finished 29th and copped the special trophy offered for the military.

Johnny Glazer, of the local "Y," was 43rd and was awarded the prize as the first YMCA runner to finish.

Shanahan snared the team trophy, beating out Nativity CC, also of Philadelphia, by the comfortable margin of 26 to 42.

NATIVITY C. C. RUN CAPTURED BY WILLIAMS

Dave Williams continued his AAU title sweep here yesterday when he overcame the longest time disadvantage in the field to win the 25th annual handicap street run of the Nativity Catholic Club. The race was over a six-mile course starting and finishing at Belgrade and Madison sts.

The sturdy little Shanahan C. C. harrier, a 22-year-old sophomore at Georgetown University, finished in 33 minutes and 21 seconds to defeat 39 runners. Williams will hold the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Turner Perpetual Trophy for one year.

There was 500 yards separating Williams when he breasted the tape and his runner-up, Mike McConn, Nativity C. C. McConn, who finished eighth in the national 18½-mile championship, was in the lead a mile from the finish. Here Williams spurred to take over.

Left Alone.

Williams was the only one in the field to start from scratch. He was sent away 5 minutes and 30 seconds after the first two harriers, J. Tucker, Shanahan, and John Glazer, Camden Y. M. C. A. veteran. At the three-mile mark, Williams eased off for a short distance in order to overcome a stitch in his side.

McConn had started 2 minutes and 20 seconds after Tucker and Glazer, so that he had a handicap of 3 minutes and 30 seconds on Williams. McConn's actual time for the distance was 36 minutes and 54 seconds.

Ross Third.

This is the third run Williams has taken on the fall schedule of the Middle Atlantic AAU. He captured the Middle Atlantic senior 10,000-meter title on Thanksgiving Day and retained his Camden Street Run title last week. Williams formerly attended Gloucester High.

Browning Ross, who was runner-up to Williams in the Camden run, was third to him yesterday. Ross, a Woodbury High senior who is the New Jersey interscholastic champion, turned in the

second best actual time, 34 minutes and 29 seconds. He had the second longest handicap, starting just 30 seconds before Williams.

Joe Sullivan, Shanahan, former national 10,000-meter champion, finished in fourth place and took the third best time prize in 35.07. C. E. McKee, Jr., Margate City, N. J., son of the winner of the first Camden run 20 years ago, was fifth.

Shanahan C. C., placing men in five of the first seven places, captured the team championship with 19 points. Its runners were Williams, Ross, Sullivan, Conboy and McIlhenny. Nativity C. C. was second with 42 points and Mitchell A. A. third with 59. In all, 25 prizes were presented by Jim McGinley and St. Clair, of the committee in charge.

Joe DiFazio, an unknown who trains by nightly jaunts around a cemetery, won the annual Shanahan Catholic Club's five-mile handicap street run yesterday.

Actual Time 27.11.

Since then, through rain, snow or cold, he has trotted five miles each night. DiFazio entered his first race two weeks ago, when he finished 16th in the Nativity C. C. street run.

DiFazio's triumph ended the streak of Dave Williams, Shanahan and Georgetown University sophomore, who had previously captured the Middle Atlantic A. A. U. senior 10,000-meter crown and the Camden and Nativity street runs.

Bothered by a cold and lacking training, Williams finished 17th. He and Norman Gordon, Shanahan, Penn State harrier, who placed 28th, were the only scratch runners in the field. They started five minutes after the first runners were sent away.

Several outstanding harriers from South Jersey will compete in the 21st annual Camden YMCA street run here tomorrow afternoon. It is a handicap event, sanctioned by the Middle Atlantic AAU and is considered the top running event in the East.

Outstanding in the list of entries without a doubt, is Dave Williams, whose home is in Gloucester, but runs under the colors of the Shanahan Catholic Club of Philadelphia, and also Georgetown University. Dave comes natural to running, as his father, George, competed many times in this same race years ago.

At the present time, Dave is probably the outstanding runner in the East, if not in the country, and he has certainly made his mark in the Camden "Y" run. Last year as scratch man, starting five minutes after the first runner, he managed to win the race. This made him the first scratch man to ever win the "Y" run. Williams is expected to give a good performance as he just successfully defended his Senior Middle Atlantic AAU cross country title last Sunday in Philadelphia.

Glazer Again in Race

Another interesting highlight of the race is the fact that John Glazer, local runner, will again compete in this year's race, the only athlete who has competed in all of the 21 Camden races. During the early years of Glazer's running he was a top-notch runner and came in first in one of the early races. While John's speed is gone, his endurance and spirit is still there.

Two other youngsters who are expected to go a long ways in this event are Phil Stilwell, of Lower Regional High, and Forrest Ross, of Woodbury High. Both will run with Philadelphia clubs. Stilwell is the newly crowned New Jersey Interscholastic Athletic Association distance champion and has also won several independent races, while Ross is taking up where his brother Browning, now in the service, left off.

Several service runners coming from various camps within the radius of 100 miles will compete for the special prize, which is a statue trophy to the first service man to finish.

FARRAGHAN SCORES VICTORY IN LOCAL YMCA STREET RUN

Beats Fast Field in 21st Race; Morgan Posts Best Time

Other South Jersey runners didn't fare so well. Dave Williams, of Gloucester, running under the colors of the Shanahan Club and defending champion, could do no better than 32nd. Dave, running from scratch, was timed at 25 minutes two seconds.

John Glazer, another local runner, placed 36th with a time of 29:52 and Forrest Ross, Woodbury High star, finished seventh, being clocked at 24 minutes 18 seconds.

Winner of the special service man's prize was Sgt. Tom Convoys, of the Shanahan club, who finished sixteenth with his time as 25 minutes 29 seconds.

Runs 20 Miles on 20th Anniversary Patrolman Has Unique Hobby

PATROLMAN FRANCIS PALLOZZA, a talented 41-year-old policeman, whose principal hobby is street running, celebrated his 20th anniversary as a member of the Philadelphia Police Department by running 20 miles on the indoor track of the Central Y. M. C. A., 1421 Arch st., Friday night.

He stepped off the distance in about two and a half hours. Although running has been Patrolman Pallozza's favorite exercise

ever since he joined the Y. M. C. A. 21 years ago, it was not until a year ago that he hearkened to the urging of fellow members to enter competition.

The athletic member of "Philadelphia's finest" is attached to the 17th district station, 20th and Federal sts., and spent his two decades of service on South Philadelphia beats. He has participated in a number of street runs, notably the Mitchell A. A. runs, the Vassella American Legion Post Armistice Day five-mile event, and a six and a quarter-mile race over the Fairmount Park cross-country course.

Officer Pallozza, who lives at 2333 Morris st., trained as a member of a Central Y. M. C. A. gymnasium class under James Carter, who also instructs at South Philadelphia High School. He also took the opportunity to get in a little practice when he went down to Atlantic City during the summer, having covered the 12 miles of boardwalk from the Inlet to Longport in an hour and a half.

While his main competitors in the street runs are high school or college athletes, Mr. Pallozza usually finds a few veterans such as John St. Clair, Sr., of the Nativity Catholic Club, whose three sons line up with him; Joe Harvey, Mitchell A. A.; John Scott, Nativity, and John Glazier, Camden.

Philadelphia should be particularly proud of two other accomplishments of Policeman Pallozza, achievements which mark him as unique among the usual guardians of law and order. For one, he has committed to memory the order of the city streets, from the Navy Yard to City Line, studying the City Directory in his spare time.

In addition he knows all the trolley and bus routes from origin to destination.

Besides possessing these claims to fame, the officer owns a fine tenor voice, capable of reaching "D" above high "C". He is a soloist with the King of Peace Catholic Church choir and a member of a group of minstrels affiliated with St. Nicholas Church. In connection with the latter organization, Patrolman Pallozza has entertained servicemen at Valley Forge General Hospital, the Naval Hospital and other like institutions.

While his neighbors constitute a vociferous cheering section when he runs, it is Mr. Pallozza's daughter, Jeannette, 13, a student at Vane Junior High School, who is his most loyal follower of all his endeavors. Not only does she applaud him in his athletic career, but she is his constant companion and at times the instigator in their attendance at operas and concerts.

Fraties Wins Run As Miller Errs

Jim Fraties, a 15-year-old North Catholic High School sophomore, one of the early starters, captured the annual Middle Atlantic A. A. U. handicap street run of the Ontario A. C. yesterday over a three-mile course beginning and ending at 1916 E. Ontario st.

Fraties, who set out 30 seconds after the first harriers, breasted the tape in the elapsed time of 18 minutes, 45 seconds. His actual clocking was 18.15. He finished 20 yards in front of Charles Otero, Mitchell A. A., who nosed out Douglas Clark, Jr., North Catholic High, for second place. Otero and Clark were both caught in 18:50.

MILLER BLUNDERS

A blunder by Ed Miller, Shanahan C. C., probably prevented his winning. Icy streets led to a change in the course so that most of the running took place under the "El" bridge on Kensington ave. Miller, former Woodrow Wilson High School runner, was leading the pack by about 25 yards. When he was less than a quarter of a mile from the finish, he kept going down Kensington ave. instead of turning left into Ontario st. to the finish line.

Referee Charles O. Roeser ruled the responsibility lay with Miller, as he had been given his instructions as to the course. We cannot give him first place, as we have no right to assume he would have won. Anything can happen in a race. Miller might have fallen 10 yards from the finish.

Miller finally finished 12th and Al Lewis, chairman of the event, decided to award him a special trophy.

DI FAZIO SCORES EASY WIN IN ANNUAL YMCA STREET RUN

'Y' TO AGAIN STAGE ANNUAL STREET RUN

**Expect Large Entry List
for 23rd Event Here
This Saturday**

The Camden YMCA will hold its twenty-third annual street run this Saturday afternoon, starting at 2.30 o'clock, over the same course which has prevailed for the past 15 years and announced as a distance of 4 7-10 miles.

Despite the war years, the YMCA continued to hold the event, although with smaller fields and lesser stars. But according to Wayne Bush, who is in charge of the event, this year's run should be equal or if not better than those held previously with the return of servicemen.

The race will start at the main entrance of the YMCA and continue down Haddon avenue to Park boulevard, on Park boulevard to Camden High school, circle back of the high school, cross Baird boulevard and continue on winding road through park to foot of the hill; turn right at foot of the hill and continue to Kaighn avenue, out Kaighn avenue to Crescent boulevard, in Crescent boulevard to Sears-Roebuck, turn left on Magin street and back to the YMCA.

The run has long been considered an outstanding event in the Middle Atlantic area. This is due primarily to the large number of awards which are made immediately following the race. This year two new features have been added. There will be three medals, gold, silver and bronze, presented to the "old timers." Anyone who is 32 years of age or over and who has competed in previous Camden YMCA street run is considered an "old timer."

The second new feature in regard to awards will also consist of gold, silver and bronze medals, presented to veterans of World War II who have been discharged within the last three months prior to the date of the race.

John Glazer, who resides in Camden, has participated in all past 22 events. John has not only entered in this year's race, but has trained diligently throughout the year. The "old timers" medals have been donated by John himself, which is quite a tribute to his fine physical condition and sportsmanship.

Phila. Sailor, Last in 1943, Leads Field of 51 by Over 2 Blocks

Thanks to a display of determination that is typical of Uncle Sam's armed forces, Louis Di Fazio, a 23-year-old Philadelphia sailor stationed at Camp Peary, Va., today reigns as the new titlist in the annual YMCA Middle Atlantic AAU street run.

After finishing a dead last in the same event back in 1943 and collapsing at the finish line last year after placing a dismal 28th, Di Fazio staged a remarkable comeback Saturday to lead a field of 51 home over the 4.7 mile course in time of 27 minutes, one second.

An early starter going with but a 30-second handicap, the slender Gob lost little time in forging to the front, taking the lead only one-half mile from the starting line. His legs churning like a couple of well-oiled pistons, he increased his margin with every stride and crossed the finish line all alone, his nearest rival over two blocks back. His actual time was 26 minutes, 31 seconds.

St. Clair Takes Time Prize

Last year's titleholder, Jack Kashishian, Mitchell AA harrier, didn't compete.

In second place was John Wernick, Jr., Mandan Club, with a time of 28 minutes, 34 seconds; while Robert McCormick, a 35-year-old ex-GI also running for the Mandan Club, finished third.

The time prize was also captured by a serviceman, with John St. Clair, Jr., a "dogface" running under the colors of the Nativity Club, completing the grind in 24 minutes, 59 seconds. This was quite a bit off, as the record is 22 minutes, 49 seconds, set by Tom Ottey some years back. St. Clair, working with a handicap of 4 minutes, 20 seconds, was one of the last to get away, yet finished 13th.

Mitchell AA Team Champs

The Mitchell AA retained their team championship and won the Courier-Post trophy by compiling 41 points. Next in line were Mandan, 46; Nativity CC, 53; Shanahan CC, 83; Warinanco AC, 117, and Woodbury High, 117.

Di Fazio naturally was awarded the prize as the first serviceman to finish; Robert McCormick, Mandan; Nevin Schopf, unattached, and Tom Conboy, Shanahan, took the ex-servicemen's awards, and Sam Monestero, Mitchell, snared the old-timers' prize.

**Williams, Gloucester GI,
Wins Time Prize in
6 1/4-Mile Run**

Jim Johnson, veteran, who served with the Army Air Forces in Italy, sprinted from behind 100 yards from the tape to win the inaugural 6 1/4-mile Middle Atlantic AAU handicap street run from Camden to Maple Shade yesterday.

Johnson, a solidly built athlete, captured the long grind in the face of a cold wind by 30 yards over George Casper, Mitchell AA, of Philadelphia. Casper, a veteran harrier, led for almost the entire distance until Johnson caught him. The race began at Twenty-seventh and Federal streets.

Mandan Tribe Entry

Johnson's winning time was 39 minutes 29 seconds. He was handicapped at four minutes and 30 seconds and was next to last to start. Johnson represented Mandan Tribe of Redmen, Philadelphia.

The time prize went to Dave Williams, former Georgetown star, who saw action in Italy with the 11th Mountain Infantry Regiment of the Fifth Division.

Williams, stationed at Camp Campbell in Kentucky, was the only scratch runner, starting six minutes after the first harriers left the line. He covered the course in 33.47 and won fourth place with a handicapped time of 39.47. He was preceded over the line by Charles Otero, Mitchell AA.

Williams, representing Shannahan CC, former Middle Atlantic AAU 10,000-meter champion, was awarded the James J. Gray Medal for being the first New Jersey runner to finish. He is from Gloucester.

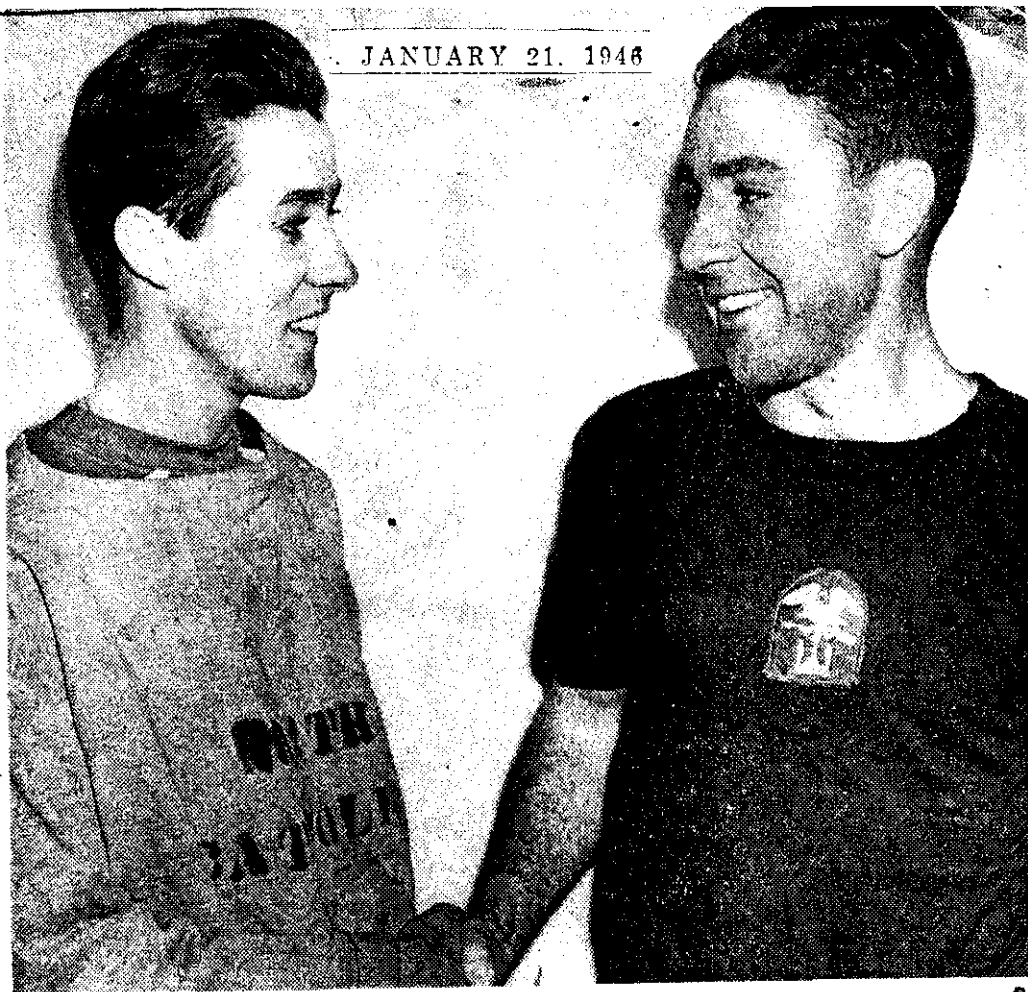

Wayne Bush Bids Farewell to Camden YMCA At End of Month

After years of exemplary work, both as an organizer of sports activity and as physical instructor,

of whom many residents of this particular area can attest to his aptitude as a conditioner in making frail ones husky and fat ones slim, Wayne Bush will bid farewell to the Camden YMCA at the end of this month for more greener pastures.

On Jan. 31, Bush will terminate his association with the local "Y" after nearly 21 years at the Broadway and Federal street institution, where he has become a popular figure not only with the youngsters, but also with the grownups.

The following day he will take up his new duties as sales manager for the Petersen Mat Manufacturing Company of Philadelphia, covering New York State and Long Island.

"While I hate to sever my connections with the "Y" and the association of my many friends here, I feel that the opportunity presented me by a Philadelphia concern was of greater importance financially.

Another of his many achievements here was the annual street run held each December for the past 23 years. He has been in charge of this event each year with the exception of the first two when Max Younger, now a physical instructor at Temple University, held sway. It is considered the outstanding such event in the Middle Atlantic area.

"It has been a pleasure working with the boys and men here, but knowing that advancement in my present occupation is out of the question and that a new job had been offered me that I couldn't turn down, I tendered my resignation last December to take effect the end of January."

So well do the members of the local "Y" regard Bush they are honoring him with a farewell dinner on Tuesday, Jan. 29, at the Plaza hotel.

Wayne has accomplished much, not only as an instructor, but in building up sports activity at the "Y" and throughout the city.

He came here from Harrisburg, Pa., in September, 1925, under Kenneth E. Smullin, director of physical education. Smullin was instrumental in bringing Bush here, having instructed Wayne during the Summer of 1925 at Silver Bay, N. Y., a training camp for YMCA instructors. Prior to his association with the Camden "Y," Bush served as a physical instructor for two years at the Harrisburg YMCA.

During his 21 years here, Bush has instructed thousands of youngsters, many of whom today are still under his wing in the adult section and business men's group. For some time he handled practically every class in gym work and calisthenics at the "Y."

But one of his main fortes was organization of sports activity, such as swimming campaigns, volley ball, softball, basketball and street runs, in addition to staging the annual May circus, which is an exhibition of gymnastics and calisthenics put on by outstanding pupils in his charge.

He is considered one of the outstanding officials in the national volleyball picture. Not only did he play the major role and organizer of the Four-State volleyball tournament, conducted here for the past 15 years, starting in 1931, but he has been called upon to conduct several national YMCA tournaments throughout the country.

He has been an official of the National YMCA Volleyball Tournament since 1935 and was named tournament director when the nationals were held in Philadelphia in 1940. The following year he was one of three named on the national championship committee at the Ann Harbor, Mich., open tournament and in 1942 was named chairman of the committee at St. Paul, Minn.

In 1943 he was made official rule interpreter of the United States Volleyball Association and the same year was elected chairman of the officials.

Next month he will conduct the New England States open tournament at Boston, scheduled for Feb. 16 and despite the fact that his association with the "Y" here will have been terminated, he will also conduct the 16th annual Four-States tourney, which attracted a record entry of 18 teams in 1941.

YMCA STREET RUN TO BE HELD DEC. 7

Annual Race Expected to Attract Many Out-of- Town Entries

The Camden YMCA will stage its 24th annual handicap street run Saturday, Dec. 7 at 2.30 p. m.

This annual event, a distance of 4.7 miles, which is sanctioned by the Middle Atlantic AAU officials, will start in front of the "Y" entrance and continue down Haddon avenue to Park boulevard to the high school; circle back of the high school, cross Baird boulevard and continue on winding road through park to foot of hill, turn right at foot of hill and continue to Kaighn avenue, out Kaighn avenue to Crescent boulevard, in Crescent boulevard to Sears-Roebuck, turn left at Sears-Roebuck to YMCA.

Due to the fact that the Camden "Y" run had been held annually for 24 years, it has become the outstanding running event in this section. Another reason for the popularity of the event is the numerous and beautiful trophy and medal prizes that are awarded the winners.

Many Out-of-Town Entrants

Most of the entries will come from Camden and Philadelphia. However, runners from Reading, Harrisburg, Hazleton, Scranton, of Pennsylvania and Newark and possibly a few from the Melrose Athletic Club of New York.

Servicemen are invited to participate for a special award and already several entries have been received from Fort Dix soldiers.

The run was originated in 1923 by Maxmilhan Younger, one of the local physical directors at the time, and since 1927, a professor in physical education at Temple university.

At that time only YMCA members were allowed to enter. The first race was won by John Meiler, now a local merchant. After the first year the race was opened up to AAU runners and naturally the number of entries increased yearly to the point where it draws well over 100 each year.

Another interesting point in regard to local runners is the fact that John Glazer, a Camden manufacturer, has run in all 23 races staged and is entered in this run as well, making it 23 straight. This may constitute some sort of a record.

Judging from Glazer's past performances and his present ability to run, he should be a participant for many more years.

It is hoped that there will be a goodly number of local school-boys entered this year from the neighboring high schools. Entries close on Nov. 30, at noon, with Robert Atkinson at the Camden YMCA.

DI FAZIO MAKES HISTORY IN WINNING 'Y' STREET RUN

Shanahan Entrant Again Captures Local Event to Score Second Straight Victory; Browning Ross Sets Best Time in 4.7 Miles Race

It required 23 years for a runner to twice win the Camden YMCA street run in succession.

He was just one second above the course record of 22:49.0, set by Tom Ottey, Penn AC, former Michigan State star, in 1935. Ottey, former national champion, was present yesterday as an official. Ross won the Benwick Marathon on Thanksgiving Day.

Wins By 200 Yards

Twenty-four-year-old DiFazio won by about 200 yards. He had taken the lead about 1½ miles out and never relinquished it.

He was clocked in 25 minutes, 58 seconds.

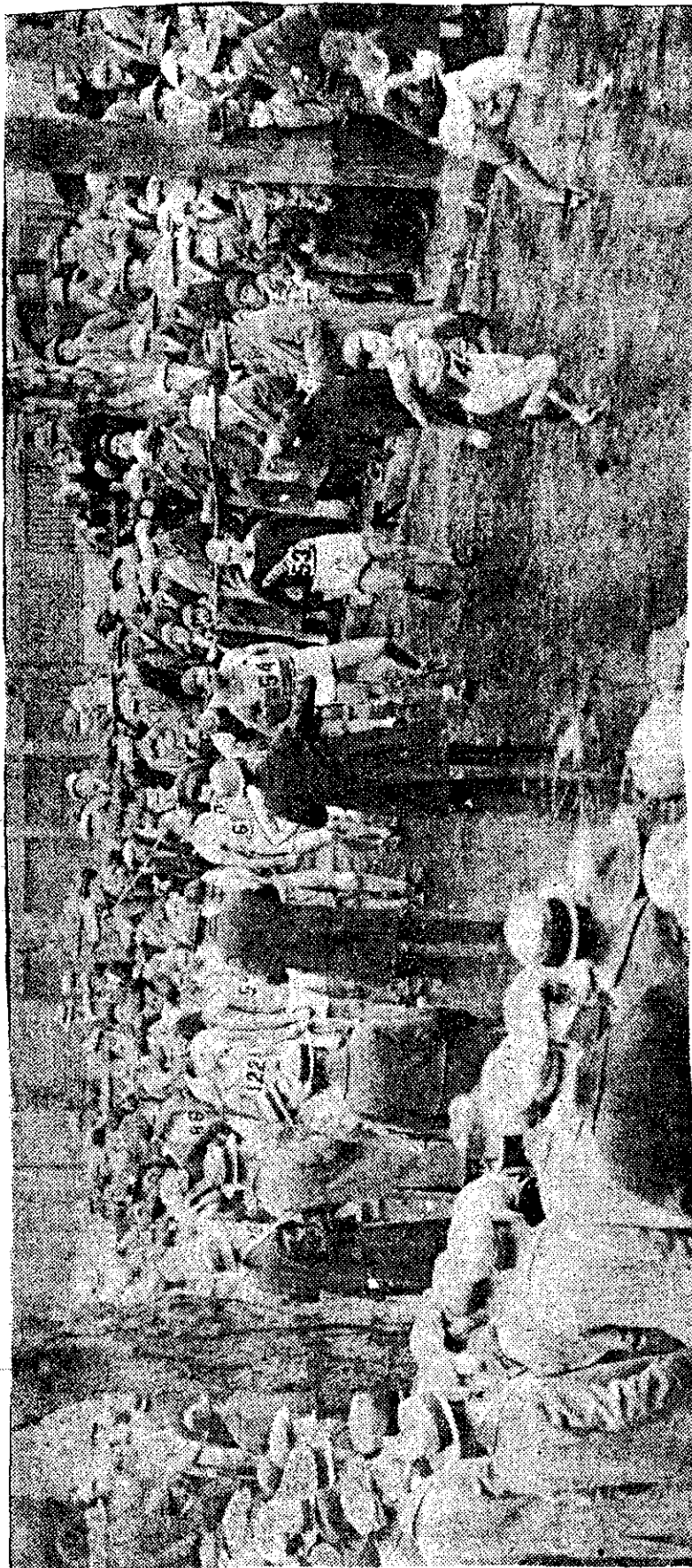

A large crowd, braving the cold and falling snow, watched Cullingford take the honors by 60 yards over Bob McCormick, unattached, a coal miner from Mahanoy City. McCormick was caught in 20.36.0 and was awarded a Silver Medal.

Spills were frequent, especially on the turns. Cullingford, former Ambler High star, out of competition from 1938 until this year, managed to stay on his feet, however.

There were 34 starters, of whom only one failed to finish. Larry St. Clair, Nativity CC, set the early pace after going away first in company with John Glazer, Camden YMCA. At the halfway mark Jack Sheward and John Regan, both of Nativity, were out in front, with Cullingford ninth. Cullingford forged ahead on the last half-mile. He was handicapped at one minute and 30 seconds before McCormick.

Phil Stilwell, unattached, Lower Regional High star, won the best time prize in 17 minutes and 56 seconds, having raced from scratch, starting 3 minutes 20 seconds after St. Clair and Glazer. McCormick was next in 18.36, followed by Vince Hermanson, unattached, 18.58.0; Cullingford, 19.01, and Bernard McDowell, Margate, 19.20.

Tom Iapalucci, seventh, won the James M. Gray Medal and the Maple Shade Lions Club Trophy, for the first Maple Shade boy to finish. Jim Johnston, unattached, winner of last year's race, was 15th.

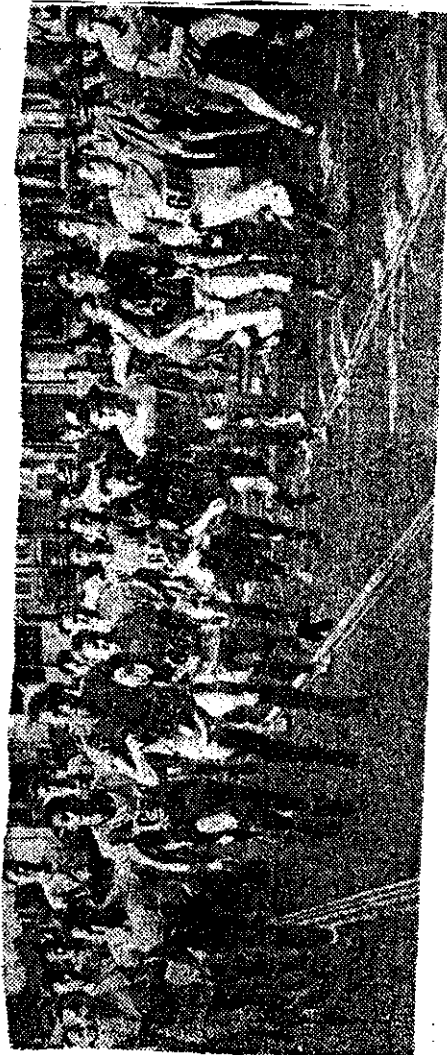
