Woodbury Captain Wins Penn AC Handicap Run

Scoring his first AAU cross-country victory, 17-year-old Woodbury High School captain crosses finish in Penn AC handicap run yesterday.

Frank Harris, 17-year-old Woodbury, N. J., high school captain, scored his initial AAU cross-country victory yesterday by capturing the five-mile handicap run of the Penn AC in Fairmount Park. His fellow townsman, Browning Ross, Middle Atlantic AAU champion, won the best time prize by traveling the route in 27:53.0.

Harris, representing the South Jersey Track and Field Club, was handicapped at one minute. He took over the lead about three-quarters of a mile from the finish line in front of the Penn AC Boathouse on the East River Drive and came home the victor by more than 100 yards. His elapsed time was 30:58.0 and his actual clocking was 29:58.0.

AMUSING SLANT

The triumph had an amusing slant. As he passed the finish mark, Harris asked: "Who won?" This was because he had been confused by club runners on the course ahead of him in practice spins.

Second place went to Charles McQueen, Nativity CC, in 31:16.0, and third to Tom McCole, Shanahan CC.

Ross, also representing South Jersey Track and Field Club, and Herman Goffberg, Shanahan CC, were the two scratch men in the field of 56 finishers. Ross, a Villanova College star, finished 34 seconds ahead of Goffberg, who took the second time prize in 28:27.0.

South Jersey T & F C won the team trophy with 36 points. Next were Nativity CC, 57; Shanahan CC, 61; Mitchell AA, 70, and Malta Boat Club, 101.

S.J. Club Stages Run at Woodbury

Woodbury, Oct. 26.—The South Jersey Track and Field Club will hold its second annual handicap street run here tonight, starting at 7 o'clock, over a course measuring 2.8 miles.

A total of 70 competitors is scheduled to run, coming from high schools in this area and from clubs in the Philadelphia district.

Among the high schools entered are Haddonfield, Lower Regional and Woodbury, while the clubs are Penn AC, Mutual, Malta, Camden YMCA, Shanahan and several harriers from Villanova.

The veteran of the 70 runners is John Glazer, of the Camden YMCA, who has not missed a street run in this district in nearly 30 years.

The course begins at North Broad street and Colonial avenue, south on Salem avenue to Twells avenue, right on Twells to Mantua avenue, north on Mantua to Broad street, north on Broad street to the finish line at the judges' stand.

Newark Central Ace Takes Race

Annual YMCA Test
Won by Dave Bolden



Dave Bolden, of Newark (N. J.) Track Club, raced to victory by a close margin of eight yards in the 25th annual Camden YMCA street run of 4.7 miles yesterday over a course starting and ending at 614 Federal st.

Bolden, Newark Central High senior, breasted the tape in 26 minutes and 35 seconds. The 17-year-old youngster, Newark schoolboy cross country champion, was handicapped at 60 seconds and had an actual time of 25:35.0 for the course.

Not long out on the course, Bolden took over the pacesetter and no one in the field of 88 finishers was able to dislodge him from his position. But on the homestretch, Tom Duffy, of Margate (N. J.) A. A., who had started two minutes behind the first harriers, came on with a rush and moved close to Bolden. The Newark youngster met the challenge and galloped away to his triumph, one of the first out-towners to take the honors.

Duffy, a member of St. Joseph's College's undefeated cross country team, finished second in 26:37.0. His actual time for the course was 24:37.0. John Wernik, of South Jersey Track and Field Club, a runner from Cape May, took third place in 26:46.0. He was followed by William McNicolls, Newark, and Michael Hadden, Margate A. A.

Dave Williams, South Jersey Track and Field Club, former Middle Atlantic AAU cross country champion, won the best time prize in 23:25.0.

Williams, a product of Gloucester High running from scratch, holds the second best time in the history of the event, a clocking of 23:04.0, fifteen seconds above the record, which he made before going off to war. He was in the event yesterday for the first time in five years.

John St. Clair, Jr., Nativty C. C. runner-up in the Berwick Marathon gained the second time prize in 23:27.0. Richard Hart, of the University of Pennsylvania team, eighth in the IC4A cross country champion, was third in 23:36.0. Like Williams, St. Clair and Hart were handicapped at six minutes. Dan Van Dorpe, Newark ace, took the fourth time prize and Lou DeFazio, only one to win the Camden Y race twice, the fifth.

The prize for the first service man to finish went to Richard Thomas, Bainbridge Naval Base. Bob McCormick, Mutual of Omaha; George Casper, Sam Monastero, both of Mitchell A. A., won the Old-timers' prizes, first racers over 32 years to finish.

Don Alderman, Nativity CC, captured the fourth annual four-mile handicap street run of the Breen-McCracken Post, American Legion, by five yards yesterday at 50th and Market sts. Dave Williams, South Jersey Track and Field Club, won the best time prize.

Alderman, a member of the undefeated St. Joseph's College team, out-sprinted Richard Weathers, St. James High, to win in 24:08.0. Alderman and Weathers shared the lead over the last two miles, running together until the last 50 yards when Alderman drew away. Alderman started one minute and 15 seconds after the first harriers were sent away and had an actual clocking of 22:53.0.

LINDQUIST THIRD

Weathers was followed across the line by Al Lindquist, Ed Landis, both of Mutual of Omaha, and Bernard McDowell, Margate AA.

Williams, hailing from Gloucester and a Villanova College student, ran from scratch, starting four minutes and 30 seconds after the first runners left the line, and finished in 21:04.0. It was the second triumph for the former Middle Atlantic champion within a week as he also carried off the time prize in the Camden YMCA run. Lou DiFazio, Shanahan CC, also racing from scratch, took the second time prize in 21:15.0, and Gus Ormrod, Margate AA, the third in 21:47.0.

Mutual of Omaha won the team prize with 33 points as against 80 for Margate AA, 82 for St. James, 86 for Nativity CC; 91 for Shanahan CC; 128 for Mitchell AA, and 130 for Newark TC.

Richard Stillwell Wins A.A.U. Run

South Jersey Ace Takes 2d Race of Career by 1 Second

A triumph for Richard Stillwell in the second A. A. U. race of his career and the best time prize for Dave Williams in his return to local competition featured the second annual three-mile handicap street run of the Breen McCracken Post yesterday at 1 North 50th st.

Mitchell captured the team trophy with 44 points. Williams will be one of the favorites in the 1000-yard handicap in The Philadelphia Inquirer's indoor track meet Friday night at Convention Hall.

R. Stillwell, Navy veteran from the South Jersey Track and Field Club and eldest of three brothers in the event, led home a field of 53 finishers, in winning a thrilling race by a slight margin. He came across the line in the elapsed time of 18 minutes and 29 seconds. He had to sprint hard on the homestretch to beat John Wernik, his teammate, who finished one second behind him.

Setting out 30 seconds after Nevin Schopf, unattached; John Glazer, Camden Y. M. C. A.; John St. Clair, Sr., Nativity C. C., and John Scott, Nativity C. C., R. Stillwell went into the lead early in the race. His brothers, Phil and Roscoe Stillwell, finished sixth and 35th, respectively.

Williams, one of the leading milers and cross country aces at Georgetown University before serving with the Army, captured the best time prize in 15 minutes, 35 seconds. He ran from scratch and finished fourth. Williams, last in an event here last spring, is a former Middle Atlantic cross country champion. John F. Kelly, Breen-McCracken Post, awarded him the prize. Phil Stillwell, who will meet Williams in The Inquirer's 1000-yard handicap was second in 15 minutes, 49 seconds and John St. Clair, Jr., Nativity, third in 16:17.0.

Street Run Won By Hackulich

The most thrilling race of the Middle Atlantic AAU street run season was won yesterday by William Hackulich, 26-year-old ex-Marine, in the last five yards over Jim Johnson, 1945 victor, in the third annual Maple Shade (N.J.) event amid drenching rainfall and treacherous footing on slush. The Maple Shade Sports Association was sponsor.

Hackulich, Mutual of Omaha, Philadelphia, a veteran of 30 months of South Pacific action, won the 3.4-mile competition by one yard in the elapsed time of 19:52.0, which will stand as the record for the race as it surpassed last year's mark of 20:31.0.

Glazer Ignores Old Man Time After 26 Years as Harrier

Although he may not win many races today, Johnny Glazer is a fixture in cross-country and street runs in the Middle Atlantic area.

Like Tennyson's babbling brook, Glazer goes on and on.

Johnny, whose home is at 1166 Mt. Vernon street, has no idea of how many races he has competed in during 26 years of competition, but you may be assured if one were to total the miles he has run, it would be several times across the nation.

Glazer started his track career at Camden High and although now hitting 46, he has been an entrant in the annual Camden YMCA street run for 25 consecutive years, a record equalled by few harriers.

Whenever a street or cross-country run turns up in the Middle Atlantic area, Johnny invariably is a contestant. He has no intention of giving up the sport, only when it becomes necessary due to his health. Glazer keeps himself in shape now, as in years past, at the Camden YMCA.

One wonders why he continually keeps at it, but as Johnny says, it's in the blood and he likes running. Also the competition interests him, despite the fact victories are now out of the question.

But even so, for an "old" man, Johnny was clocked only three minutes, three seconds behind the winner, less than half his age, in the last YMCA run.

We mention Glazer because there are few athletes today who have actively engaged in a sport over so long a period.

The second best time of the race was turned in by Don Evens, of Shanahan, who did 23:31. McKee, the winner, had an actual time of 23:47.

There are numerous and beautiful trophies and medals awarded the winners. The first three runners to finish will be awarded trophies, while the first Camden "Y" runner to finish and the runner with the best time will also be awarded similar prizes.

The Courier-Post Newspapers give annually a trophy which is awarded as the first team prize. Special plaques and trophies are given to the first, second and third place individuals and the runner who makes the best time. Special medals are given to members of the U. Ross Drives From Scratch To Take Pennac Run Honors

The last man to leave the starting line was the first to finish yesterday as Browning Ross, of the U. S. Olympic team, ran from scratch to win the annual Penn AC five-mile

handicap race through Fairmount Park on both sides of the Schuylkill.

The 25-year-old, compactly built Woodbury (N. J.) ace, wearing Penn AC colors, took the lead at the three-quarter mark and hit the tape in front of his club's boathouse on the East River Drive in 26 minutes and 37 seconds. Sixteen seconds and 80 yards behind him came Luther Burdelle, Mutual of Omaha.

The result was a repetition of the previous Sunday when Ross won the 6 1/4-mile race for the Senior Middle Atlantic AAU championship by 16 seconds and 80 yards over Burdelle, a Post Office worker. Yesterday Ross was handicapped at five minutes and 10 seconds, starting 20 seconds after Burdelle. Ross came across in the elapsed time of 31:47 and Burdelle in 32:03.

Ross, Villanova College captain, recent runner-up for IC4A cross country championship, was also the winner of the best time prize with his clocking of 26:37. Burdelle took the second prize in 27:13. John St. Clair, Jr., Penn AC, and Alden Stevenson, Shanahan CC, each did 28:23, St. Clair getting the third prize because of his higher handicap.

Team prize went to Mutual of Omaha with 31 points as against 39 for Shanahan CC and 50 for Penn AC.

Novice prize went to John Donaghy, Penn AC.

Glazer, Camden Y Runner, Vieing Nearly 3 Decades

John Glazer, a Camden manufacturer, stands as proof that cross-country or street running competition does not lie wholly within the province of youth.

As a matter of fact, Glazer has been a competitive racer for nearly three decades and he is still going strong. This afternoon, for instance, he will toe the starting line at 2 o'clock in front of the Penn AC Boathouse on the East River Drive in Fairmount Park and embark on a 6 1/4-mile course in the 42d annual Middle Atlantic AAU cross-country championship. To be sure, Glazer has no hope at all for the title—there are some celebrated runners in the field—but will run for the joy of it, if a gruelling marathon can be classed as a joyful affair. It is a good bet, too, that Glazer will not drop by the wayside, but will be listed among the finishers.

Only a week ago, on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 3, this hardy individual finished 68th in the 27th annual Camden YMCA handicap street run of 4 7/10 miles. He was running for 30 minutes and 55 seconds and was not the last to finish—there were younger fellows who followed him home.

This was the one race of the season Glazer was very much determined to endure, for by finishing he preserved his record of having competed in every Camden YMCA street run since the inception of the race in 1923, no mean achievement and probably a record without parallel in the country.

Glazer, wearing the Camden Y colors, came across the finish line looking comparatively fresh, too. Among some of the officials who clocked him at the finish mark were George Williams, former Middle Atlantic champion, and Charles McKee, Sr., winner of the inaugural Camden Y race, both of whom often competed against Glazer in the year.

Glazer is one of the cross-country regulars, competing in almost every event on the AAU schedule from three miles up to the marathon distances—and you will always read in the paper that he finishes.

Camden 'Y' Sets Run Saturday

The Camden YMCA will stage its 28th annual handicap street run at 2:30 p. m. Saturday. The run is a distance of 4.7 miles, and is sanctioned by the Middle Atlantic AAU. It will start in front of the YMCA entrance, continue down Haddon avenue to Park boulevard to Camden High school, circle back to the high school, cross Baird avenue and continue on winding road through park to foot of the hill. Turn right at the foot of the hill and continue to Kaighn avenue, out Kaighn avenue to Crescent boulevard, in Crescent boulevard to Sears Roebuck, turn left at Sears Roebuck, down Federal street to the YMCA.

Because the Camden "Y" run has been held annually for 27 years, it has become the outstanding running event in this section of the country. Another reason for the popularity of the event is the numerous trophies and medals awarded the winners. The first three runners to finish will be awarded trophies, while the first Camden "Y" runner to finish and the runner with the best time will be awarded similar prizes.

The Courier-Post newspapers give a trophy which is awarded as the first team prize. Special plaques and trophies are given to first, second and third place individuals and the runner who makes the best time. Gold-plated medals are given to the fourth to eighth placements, silver-plated medals to the ninth to thirteenth placements and bronze-plated medals to the fourteenth to twenty-fifth placements.

Most of the entries will come from Camden and Philadelphia. However, runners from Reading, Harrisburg, northern New Jersey, and possibly a few from New York, will also be entered. Servicemen are invited to participate in each year's race.

The run was originated in 1923 by Maximilian Younger, one of the local "Y" physical directors at the time, and since 1927 has been a professor in physical education at Temple university. At that time only YMCA members were allowed to enter. Another interesting point in regard to local runners is the fact that John Glazer, a Camden manufacturer, has run in all 27 races staged and is entered in this run.

This may constitute some sort of a record. Judging from Glazer's past performances and his present ability to run where he practices in the local YMCA each week, he should be a participant for many more years.

Ross Shatters Own Run Mark

Browning Ross, National AAU cross country champion, produced another top performance yesterday in lowering his own record by 13 seconds in winning the best time prize in the 28th annual Camden YMCA open handicap street run.

Dick Russell, of Shanahan CC, won the race by 80 yards.

Ross, representing Penn AC, sped the course of 4.7 miles, starting and finishing in front of the Camden Y on Federal st., in the record time of 22 minutes, eight seconds. In 1948, the Villanova College senior set the course mark of 22:21.0, which had broken the 1935 record of 22:49.0 made by Tom Ottey, former Penn State star. Ottey was the chief timer yesterday.

MAKES GREAT BID

The only scratch man among the 60 finishers, starting out five minutes and 30 seconds after the first harriers received the "go" signal, Ross overcame 50 of the contenders in a great bid to take the race. But due to his heavy handicap, the former Woodbury High star had to be satisfied with 10th.

Russell, 18-year-old senior at Burlington High, seventh in the New Jersey Interscholastic cross country championship, captured the handicap race in the elapsed time of 27 minutes, two seconds. Handicapped at two minutes, Russell, who at five feet six is smaller than Ross, was unable to catch the leader, Walter McEntee, his Shanahan teammate, until 250 yards from home.

Carroll Wins Penn AC Run; Burdette Takes Time Prize

John Carroll, former Tuskegee star, won the fifth annual Penn AC five-mile handicap cross-country race by a narrow margin in the elapsed time of 31 minutes 38 seconds yesterday in Fairmount Park. Luther Burdelle, of the local Mutual of Omaha team, captured the best time prize in 26 minutes 50 seconds.

The race was dominated by out-of-townners as the Baltimore Olympics put the first five men across the finish line in front of the Penn AC Boathouse on East River Drive. They were Carroll, Walter Atcheson, Frank Pfäging, Henry Schaefer and Ed Colburne, who earned their club the team honors with 15 points.

TRIED FOR DEAD HEAT

Carroll and Atcheson, former Michigan State star, who finished 17th in the 1949 NCAA cross-country championship, were thwarted in their design to finish in a dead heat for first place. A half mile from home they forged into the pace-setting and ran stride for stride from there, making no effort to sprint on the homestretch to beat each other for first place.

But as the 25-year-olds jogged "non-competitively" across the finish mark, the officials detected Carroll ahead by a nose. Atcheson was caught one second behind him. Carroll was handicapped at three minutes, Atcheson at 2:40, Atcheson

thus having set out 60 seconds before Carroll.

BROWNING ROSS ILL

In the absence of Browning Ross, Penn AC ace, who was ill, Burdelle, former University of New Mexico star, and Ted Horner, Penn, were scratch runners, both setting out five minutes and 15 seconds after the first harriers were sent away by Al Rosenheck, Middle Atlantic AAU cross-country chairman.

Burdelle, post office worker, ran a strong race to take eighth place. Burdelle was runner-up to Ross for the Middle Atlantic crown. Herman Goffberg, 1948 Olympic team member; Lou DiFazio, a musician, and Bob Deckman, Penn AC, also won best time prizes.

St. Clair and Ross Cop Y Run Honors

Larry St. Clair and Browning Ross, both representing the Penn Athletic Club, carried off the major laurels in the 29th annual Camden YMCA invitation street run held here Saturday.

St. Clair covered the 4.7 mile handicap course in 26 minutes 31 seconds, with an elapsed time of 27:11 to finish in first place, while Ross, of Woodbury, former Villanova college star, captured the time prize for the second straight year.

Ross, starting from scratch, covered the distance in 22:30, 22 seconds slower than his time last year. In giving up a 40-yard handicap, Ross managed to finish in fourth place, behind Luther Burdell, of Mutual of Omaha, clocked in 27:20 who finished second and Shanahan's Bill Johnson who came in third.

St. Clair captured the title left undefended by Shanahan's Dick Russell. A total of 90 harriers started the race with 63 completing the long grind.

Penn Athletic Club dethroned Shanahan as team champions. Pennac had five runners among the first 10 to finish to carry off the team prize with a total of 28 points. The Pennacs took first, fourth, sixth, eighth and ninth.

Mutual of Omaha took runner-up honors in team totals, 11 points more than Pennac, while Shanahan wound up third with 61 points. Baltimore finished fourth in the Middle Atlantic AAU sponsored event.

Ross Sets 'Y' Run Mark As Otero Captures Race

Ex-Woodbury Athlete Snaps Own Record; Glazer in 30th Event

Three outstanding performances were established in the Camden YMCA's 30th annual handicap street run held here last Saturday.

First there was Charley Otero, representing Mutual of Omaha, who captured the event after finishing in a runnerup position 20 years ago; second, Browning Ross, ex-Woodbury high and Villanova college star and a member of the last two U. S. Olympic teams, cracked the record for the third time within four seasons and third, veteran Johnny Glazer, who finished in 45th place, preserved his record of finishing in all of the 30 street runs.

Ross' record time was 21 minutes 49 seconds, bettering his own mark of 22:08 set in 1950. Ross finished in 12th place on Saturday after starting from scratch.

Otero, 37, led almost all the way in winning the race by 30 yards over Henry Kinkaid, Catholic War Vets, in the elapsed time of 27:12.0.

Ross not only broke his own record for the second time but also passed 37 others who had set out before him to take 12th place.

Handicapped at 7 minutes, the only scratch man in the field, Ross, Senior Middle Atlantic AAU champion, gained the best time prize for the seventh straight season.

This event concluded the Middle Atlantic AAU schedule for the season in which Ross won every time prize.

Wins Camden 'Y' Run

Harrier, 49, Holds Unique Record

12-52

John Glazer was a happy man when he finished 45th (49 starters) in the Camden YMCA's 30th annual street run last Saturday. He had reason to feel good. It seems that in 1923 when the Camden Y inaugurated the event, Glazer, at the age of 19, was a competitor.

Every year since Glazer entered and finished the grueling 4.7 mile test. None of the district harriers have matched Glazer's record of competing in such an event for the past 30 years. In fact, Glazer celebrated his marriage by winning the run. That was in 1928. He has come close to the honors in succeeding years, but John never made the grade again as a gold medal winner.

DRILLS THROUGH YEAR

The 155-pound, 49-year-old harrier was very confident he would finish last Saturday's race. He trains twice a week throughout the year, summer and winter not excepted. He runs two to three miles each practice session, either outdoors in Camden's Farnum Park or on the indoor track at the Camden Y where he does from 54 to 81 laps.

For last Saturday's run, Glazer trained a few times at six miles, so he knew he could make the distance. Two hours afterward he sat down to a hearty meal, and mused that his time of 0:33.14 was not bad at all for a chap 20 pounds over his running weight of more youthful years.

PLANS HIS RUNNING

Although he only had time to participate in this one race during the recent Middle Atlantic AAU cross-country season, Glazer was faithful to his twice-a-week drills because: "Once you stop, it's hard to get started again."

Glazer, who specializes in hot wire goods for hospitals, left school at 14 to help support a family of nine. He began cross-country running at 18, first at the Camden Y, then at Nativity CC under the late Jim McGinley. After 10 years representing Nativity in competition, Glazer and six or seven others transferred their activities to Camden Y and formed a team. He is the only one of that group still running.

If all goes well, you can wager that at 50, Glazer will stand poised for the crack of the gun for Camden Y's 31st annual.

McDade Wins Street Run In Camden by One Stride

In one of the closest finishes in the 31-year history of the event, Jim McDade, Penn AC, won the Camden YMCA handicap street run of 4 7-10 miles over Howard Jacobson, New York Pioneer Club, and Dick Russell, Shanahan CC, yesterday at Federal st. and Broadway. They came across the line about one stride behind each other. John (Joe) Barry, Shanahan CC, equaled the course record of 21 minutes, 49 seconds in winning the best time prize.

Rain and wet terrain thus proved no deterrent to extra fine performances. McDade, a 20-year-old hailing from Bordentown, N. J., won with an elapsed time of 0:25.45. He was handicapped at 0:02.45, and had an actual clocking of 0:23.00. Jacobson, handicapped at 0:02.55, had an elapsed time of 0:25.46, and Russell, handicapped at 0:01.25, of 0:25.47.

Tom Adams, Shanahan CC, set the early pace out Haddon ave., then yielded at Park ave. to Jim Nicholas and Phil Tallon, both of Kearney AC, who shared the lead. At Camden High School, Nicholas went out front and in the park behind the school, McDade moved up to third. Ascending a steep hill in the park, McDade, St. Joseph's College junior, went into the lead and never gave up the pacesetting as he dashed down Admiral Wilson blvd. and back to Federal st. Jacobson almost caught him in the last 15 yards.

Finishing 22d, Barry, Irish Olympic Team member and Villanova College star, equalled the mark made last year by Browning Ross, Penn AC harrier sidelined by a cold yesterday. In 23d place was Bill Ashenfelter, U. S. Olympic Team, former Penn State star, who took second time prize in 0:21.50. Dr. Charles Robbins, Valley Forge Marathon victor who finished eighth, also was caught in 0:21.50 but took the third prize since he was handicapped at 0:04.45, while Ashenfelter ran from scratch at 0:05.45, as did Barry.

Another feature was the great record preserved by John Glazer, Camden YMCA, of having finished in every one of these Camden YMCA handicaps since 1923. The sturdy veteran, wearing numeral one, came in last in 43th place in 0:33.24. He was among the first group to leave the starting line. Shanahan CC won team honors with 30 points, as against 33 for Penn AC, 58 for Baltimore Olympics and 90 for Kearney (N.J.) AC.

Terry Anderson, Central Jersey Track and Field Club, won the 32d annual Camden YMCA handicap street run of 4.7 miles last Saturday in the elapsed time of 25 minutes and 50 seconds.

Browning Ross, representing Penn AC, took the top honors in actual time by covering the route in 22:04. One of the features of the event is the entrance of John Glazer of the local YMCA. He has competed in each of the 32 runs staged, which is over a 1.7 mile course.

The event will start in front of the "Y," down Haddon ave. and cutting off Sixth st. beneath underpass to Mickle st. to Haddon ave., proceeding to Park blvd. Turning left on the boulevard the runners proceed through Farnham Park onto Kaighn ave. to the Airport circle and return by way of Admiral Wilson blvd. to Sears, Roebuck Co.

It is in this stretch where the runners get their final test before going into Magin st. and then turning left to Federal st. and the finish at Eighth st.

Besides the two team trophies, a trophy will go to the first Camden "Y" runner to finish, donated by Pat Benedetta and to the first runner contributed by Glazer. Medals will be awarded to the best time, second through tenth runners, based on handicap. An old timer's medal will be presented to the first runner 58 years of age and older. 'Developments' on Santee Hinted; Whelan, 16, Takes Camden Race

Santee Misses Handicap Run

Interesting aspects of the 33rd annual Camden YMCA handicap street run of 4.7 miles yesterday were the winning of No. 1 place by the youngest in the field, 16-year-old Steve Whelan, Vesper BC, and the taking of position No. 52 by one of the oldest contenders, John Glazer.

The attainment of last place by Glazer, Camden YMCA, actually was a big achievement, since it preserved his record of having competed in every one of his club's street runs since 1923. The veteran, in his 50s, was among the first harriers to be given the "go" signal by Starter Al Rosenheck, Middle Atlantic AAU cross-country chairman, and came home 33 minutes and 21 seconds later looking fit and sturdy.

Disappointing features were the failure of the two scratch men, Lt. Wes Santee, Quantico Marines, and Browning Ross, unbeaten Penn AC star, to take part. About to leave for Camden by air from Quantico, Santee, the country's top miler, was telephoned from the National AAU convention in Louisville by Avery Brundage, Olympic official, and told to stay put for another call regarding his clearance for the Olympic Games. Santee, recently cleared of professional charges, will be here to compete in next Sunday's Penn AC run. With Santee out, Ross had no incentive for competing inasmuch as he has won the best time prize several times and holds the course record of 21:49.

Little man Whelan, 5-5 and 135 pounds, a junior at Roman Catholic High School, went into the lead in the wooded area behind the Camden High School, just before the half-way mark, and stayed in front from there to win the race by some 35 yards over Jerry McCann, Shanahan CC. Whelan, setting out on the course 30 seconds after the first batch of runners, scored with an elapsed time of 25:45; his actual clocking was 25:15.

Shanahan CC, coached by Jack Pyrah, was team winner with 17 points and Penn AC, runner-up, 38. Luther Burdelle, Penn AC, won best time prize in 22:51.

75 Enter YMCA Street Run

The Camden YMCA will stage its 34th annual handicap street run Saturday at 2 p. m. This run covers a distance of four and 7/10 miles, and is sanctioned by the Middle Atlantic AAU.

A field of 75 harriers will start in front of the Central YMCA at 614 Federal st. and proceed down Haddon ave., cutting off Sixth st. beneath underpass to Mickle st., and then left to Haddon ave., proceeding to Park blvd.

Turning left on the boulevard, the runners go through Farnham Park onto Kaighn ave. to the Airport circle and return by way of Admiral Wilson blvd. to Sears, Roebuck Co. It is on this stretch that the runners begin to take their final positions before going into Magin st. and then turning left to Federal st. and the finish at Eighth st.

One of the outstanding runners of the race is Alex Breckenridge, of Shanahan C. C., who will be starting six minutes and 30 seconds after the first group. Breckenridge was beaten by only one second by Browning Ross, Olympic star, at the 6 1/4-mile Middle Atlantic AAU cross country championship held recently in Philadelphia. Only a final sprint 100 yards from the finish line enabled Ross to edge his rival. Ross set the record for the Camden run with a time of 21.49 in 1952, only to have the mark tied by John Barry, Shanahan C. C., the following year.

Unfortunately, Ross is not entered to defend his time title. Breckenridge, who is a student at Villanova University, is a citizen of Scotland where he won distance run championships.

Another highlight of the event is the 34th appearance of John Glazer, Camden YMCA, in the meet. Glazer has not missed a race and still stays in contention for the first Camden Y runner and the Old Timer's prize (first runner 38 years of age or older).

Last year's best runner, Steve Whelan, of Vesper Boat Club, is defending his title as he is entered with a handicap of 4 minutes. Last year he won the race in 25.45 minutes with a handicap of .30. Whelan is only 17 years of age.

For the first team prize, contributed and presented by the Courier-Post Newspaper, three teams are competing, Shanahan C. C. with 19 entries, Penn A. C. with 35 entries and Central Jersey Track and Field Club with 13 entries.

Ted Meredith, former world's record holder from 1912 to 1930, will be present to honor some of the winners. Meredith, middle distance Olympic runner, was a track star at the University of Pennsylvania from 1912 to 1916.

Besides the above mentioned awards, the second team will receive a trophy. Medals will be won by the harrier with the best time and the runners finishing second through 10th.

The following AAU track officials will be handling the meet: Albert Rosenheck, chairman; George Williams, Frank Fanrak, John St. Clair, Sid Jack Pyrah, Andy Foley, and Willard Shaner.

The planning committee for the run is as follows: Glazer, chairman; Robert Jacobs, Albert Rose, John Hesser, Charles Edwards, William White and Cecil Warren. Assisting the committee in supervision are members of the Mothers' Club, Hi Y Club, Boys' Physical Education Committee, Physical Council, Junior Leaders' and Junior Aquatic Clubs.

Vineland's Ruga Wins Y Run

Joshua Ruga, a Vineland High senior wearing the Penn AC colors, raced to a wide-margin triumph in the 34th annual Camden YMCA handicap street run of 4.7 miles yesterday.

The 16-year-old South Jersey interscholastic champion sprinted across the finish line in the elapsed time of 25 minutes and 59 seconds.

Handicapped at two minutes—that is setting out on the course that much time after Al Rosenheck, Middle Atlantic AAU cross-country chairman, sent the first batch of 40 runners away—Ruga went into the lead near the Airport Circle on Admiral Wilson blvd., just past the halfway marks, and no one caught the little speedster from there.

Coach John St. Clair's Penn AC beat Coach Jack Pyrah's Shanahan CC for team honors, 17-38.

The next in line of individual pursuit, William Stiles, Central Jersey TFC, barely standing off Giordano Reitano, an Army private, for second place, was blocks behind Ruga at the finish. Ruga scored the second best time of the meet, 23 minutes and 59 seconds. The first time prize went to Jim Sumner, Shanahan CC, caught in 23.36, which compares with the record of 21.49, held jointly by Browning Ross and John Joe Barry, neither of whom ran yesterday.

There was more than passing interest as the last man came home in 40th place, 53-year-old John Glazer, Camden YMCA. As he trotted across the line in 34.26, Glazer's record of finishing in all 34 Camden YMCA runs since their start in 1923 was preserved.

In this age of the automobile, few people think anything of driving to Atlantic City.

If the starting point is Camden, it is about 60 miles to the seashore resort and a leisurely two-hour drive at the best providing one doesn't become a victim of the frequent traffic jams that often mar such a jaunt.

Toss in the return trip and one has covered a little over 100 miles for a day of pleasure.

But how many people would consider running the distance to Atlantic City and back?

There is at least a handful of men living in the Camden area. They are members of the Camden Central YMCA Multi-mile Club and each has run more than 100 miles.

Cecil Warren, physical director at the YMCA, started the club a year ago after having heard of a similar organization at the Philadelphia Central YMCA.

"If you recall," Warren states in explaining the organization of Multimilers, "last year was when President Eisenhower first began stressing a national physical fitness program and we thought the club would fit in well. In addition it was thought the club would stimulate the use of the gymnasium's track for exercising and conditioning."

So that the club would offer a challenge to everyone, there are five categories for membership based on age. If a runner wishes to become a full-fledged member of the club he must complete the required distance in the eight months period starting Oct. 1 and ending May 31.

The categories and the required distances in each are: 15-25 years, 175 miles; 25-35, 175 miles; 35-45, 150 miles; 45-55, 125 miles; and 55 and over, 100 miles.

Additional aims of the club are: to develop and increase muscle tones, gain in body efficiency, develop coordination necessary for good running, and to learn endurance.

Last year five men completed required distances while five others came reasonably close.

The leader of them all was John Glaser, a Camden businessman who resides in Gloucester.

Glaser, who is past 50 years of age, is well known in local running circles. He has been in every one of the 35 Camden YMCA street runs, staged annually every fall.

Glaser, who usually runs two or three times a week, logged 244 miles last year. When one considers it takes 27 laps around the YMCA track for one mile, it means Glaser pounded a lot of shoe leather over the wooden

This season Glaser already has bettered that distance. He has gone 250 miles and has his sights set on the 300 mark.

"It is the best way in the world I know to keep in good physical shape," states Glaser who has three grandchildren. "Why I would be afraid to stop running—might put on too much weight."

Glaser started running when he was 19, shortly after he had to quit school to help support a family which included nine brothers and sisters.

"I played several other sports too, but running was always my favorite," he states. "Now I do six or seven miles every time I go to the YMCA to work out and I have never felt better in my life."

Another runner with plenty of durability is Al Foulkes, of Princeton rd., Audubon. Foulkes, who is in his late 40s, turned in 177 miles last year and already has completed 250 this year.

Like Glaser, Foulkes finds running a great conditioner. "I find running a good health practice," he reports. "It is great exercise and it really keeps you in shape."

Foulkes, who never was active in high school sports save as a manager, also runs two or three times a week and does five or six miles at each stint along with a few calisthenics as a warmup.

Jerry Gooch, Maple Shade; William Oliver and Richard Power, both Camden, also became Multimilers last year by covering more than 100 miles.

Gooch, who is in his late 20s, did 241 miles but has not been active in the club this year. Oliver covered 169 miles and Power did 104 last season.

Power, who is over 60, probably is the most remarkable of the lot. A former Camden policeman, he has logged 145 miles this year and is active in other YMCA sports activity as well.

He finds running has a lot to do with his excellent physical condition.

Others who came close to becoming full-fledged Multimilers last year and the miles they covered are: George Morris, Camden (86); Frank Fuz, Camden (75); Robert Bates, Camden (68); Harry Berkowitz, Camden (77); William Franke, Haddonfield (61).

Fifteen other runners did less than 50 miles.

Aside from a great deal of personal satisfaction, the Multi-miler gets little reward.

The runner who successfully completes the required distance gets a trophy at the annual all-sports dinner of the YMCA held in June. For 90 percent of the distance, he gets a medal and for 80 percent a pin.

The biggest reward each runner receives, however, is better health.

Albert Rosenheck will be in charge of the AAU officials. The street run committee, headed by Glaser, consists of members of the Multi-Mile Track Club, Physical Council, Mathers Club, Junior Leaders Club and other YMCA lay groups.

Ealey, Shanahan Harrier, Takes YMCA Street Run

Edgar Ealey, of Shanahan Catholic Club, finished 60 yards ahead of Browning Ross, Penn AC, to cop first-place honors in the 35th annual Camden YMCA handicap street run over a 4.7-mile course on Saturday afternoon.

Ealey's elapsed time was 26 minutes and 48 seconds, while Ross, former Olympic distance runner and presently cross-country coach at Woodrow Wilson High, finished after 27.02. Ealey's handicap was 1.50.

Ross, the only runner to start from scratch, 5.20 after the first men were sent out by Middle Atlantic AAU official Al Rosenheck, was awarded the time prize, since his actual time was 21.42. This breaks the course record of 21.49 set by Ross in 1951 and tied by Jack Barry the following year. Changes made in the course due to snow in Farnham Park prevented the new record time from being entered into the books.

Jared Hoch, Penn AC, man-4 aged to grab the Old-Timers trophy by beating out two other men who are above 38, in a very close race. The two who challenged him for the prize were Frank Kelly, Shanahan, who won it last year, and Mike Kovalczyk. Another old-timer who finished was John Glazer of the host organization. It was the 35th consecutive appearance of Glazer in the race.

Glazer to Race for 37th Time; Penn AC Enters 67 in Grind

The granddaddy of street runners, Johnny Glazer, who was a star trackman at Camden High School in the mid-20's, will be on the starting line once again Saturday for the word "go" in Camden YMCA's 37th annual classic for thinclads.

Glazer has competed in all the street runs through the highways and byways of Camden. More important, he has finished every time in the cold, gruelling test of 4.7 miles, starting at the Y and finishing at 8th and Federal sts.

Because of his vast contribution to street running and YMCA work in general, Glazer this year has been named chairman of the street run committee. Serving with him are such track notables as Browning Ross, former Olympic champion and now the AAU cross-country chairman; Al Rosenheck, "Mr. Track" in local AAU competition, and Cecil Warren, physical director of the local Y.

Because of Glazer's popularity and the all-star committee, a record field of 129 runners will take off in Saturday's grind, starting from in front of the Y at 2 o'clock. Penn AC, winner of The Courier-Post Trophy last year for taking the team prize, again will be favored for the award with 67 entries.

Central Jersey Track has 16 runners. Phila. Pioneer Club, 15; Shanahan, 14, and West Chester AC, 8.

Leaving the Y, the runners will go down Haddon ave. to Park blvd., past Camden High School to Kaighns ave.; left on Kaighns to the Airport Circle, then left on Admiral Wilson blvd., past Sears Roebuck, Best Market and up Magin st. to Federal st., finishing at 8th st.

Three runners will start from scratch, starting off 5 minutes and 30 seconds after the "go" runners. They are Earl Jefferson, the 1958 senior Middle Atlantic AAU cross country champion; Berry Crawford, former Kansas University star who finished fourth in last year's National AAU steeplechase, and Morrie Cannon, former Roman Catholic High star miler and cross country champion.

Low Burdelle, former junior National 10,000 meter cross country champion, and Verb Morgan, Ursinus College one and two-mile star, also are in the field and among the late starters.

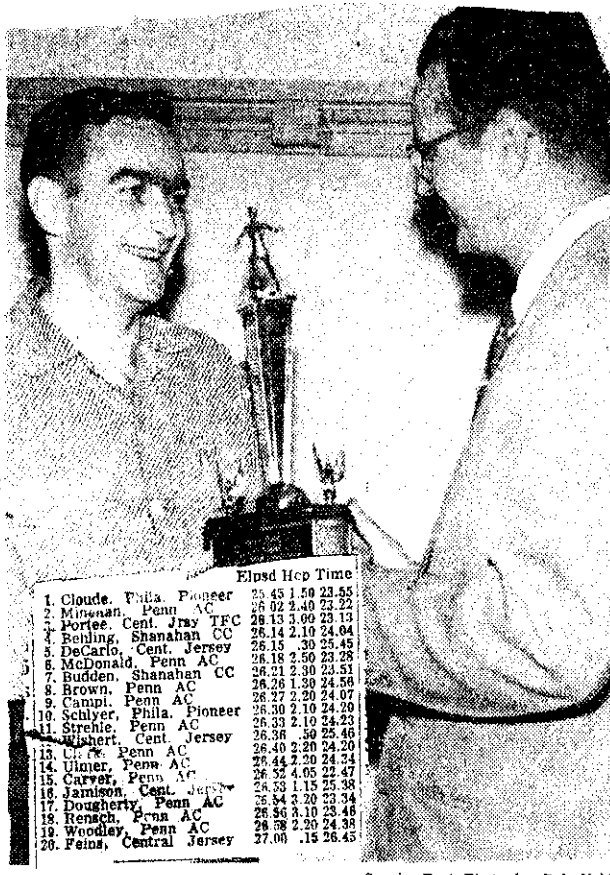

John Glazer, Camden YMCA, ran last. He has competed in every race.

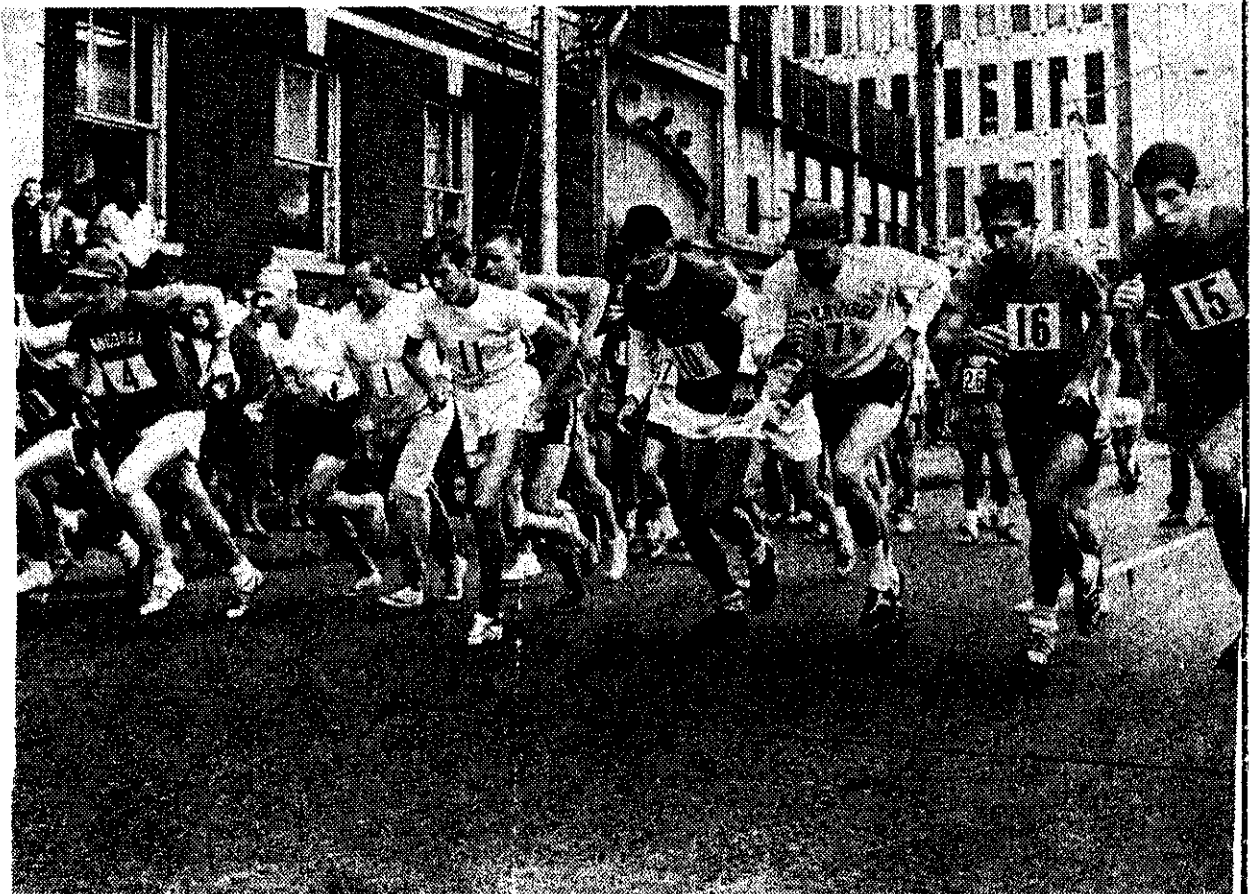

Grandpa always finishes

At 62 He Runs



LAST December, in the 43d annual Camden YMCA open handicap street run, over a course of nearly 4½ miles, 59 runners finished the race. The runner who finished 59th, with a time nearly 17 minutes slower than the winner's, was John Glazer. Far from being crestfallen, Glazer was pleased. He had accomplished what he had set out to do—namely, finish.

By so doing, Glazer extended his record as the only contestant to compete—and finish—in each of the annual Camden YMCA street runs, begun in 1923. He finished seventh in 1923 and in 1928 won the race. Glazer is five-feet-eight, and in 1928 weighed 145 pounds. Now he weighs 180. "For the last 10 years," he says, "I've finished last. In an odd sort of way, I've felt like a winner every time. At this stage, just finishing is somewhat like winning to me."

Born and reared in Camden, Glazer lives with his wife, Cecilia, in Gloucester Heights. The Glazers have two married daughters and nine grandchildren, assuring "Grandpa" of a sizable cheering section when he runs. Just why does Glazer, now 62 and owner of the Specialty Wire Works in Camden, continue to run? "For one thing," he says, "I like it. Also, my doctor, who puts me through a thorough physical examination every six months, tells me that, while my heart is sound, I've been running too long to stop now."

This means that Glazer must maintain a year-round training regimen. He says: "I take stiff workouts two days a week at the Camden 'Y.' Each time, I run four miles on the banked track on the fourth floor. In between workouts I do a lot of exercising, especially sit-ups and weight-lifting."

Larry Simmons, a 24-year-old teacher's aide at Dobbins High School in Philadelphia, won the 45th annual Camden YMCA handicap street run Saturday in an elapsed time of 22:38.

Simmons, a Cheyney State College graduate, covered the 3.9 snow-covered course in Farnham Park in an actual time of 21:38, since he was handicapped one minute. He didn't seem to mind the dampness of the course or the brisk weather.

"It wasn't too cold," Simmons said. "If the snow wasn't on the ground, it would have been a good day for running."

First Victory

It was the first time Simmons had won the race, although he competed in it in 1965 and won third best time.

Lenape High School junior Pat Grady finished second, six seconds later than Simmons, and Bruce Hafemeister of the South Jersey TC came in third in an elapsed time of 22:58.

Leon Dreher of the South Jersey TC, who won the race last year, finished fifth in 23:30.

In previous years, the race was held in the streets of central Camden, but this year's race was moved to Farnham Park. The 30 entrants, some of whom ran last year, were generally pleased with the change of site.

Glazer Age Winner

John Glazer, 64-year-old Camden YMCA runner who has missed only two of the 45 races and finished last this year, said: "The course was much better. There was less traffic."

Despite his age, Glazer also ran in the 1.3 mile first annual Camden YMCA age handicap race for Central Branch YMCA members only and won in Class E for runners 55 and over.

Why does Glazer run when he could be sitting home in a warm room watching television?

"To keep in health," he replied, "to keep the ticker operating."

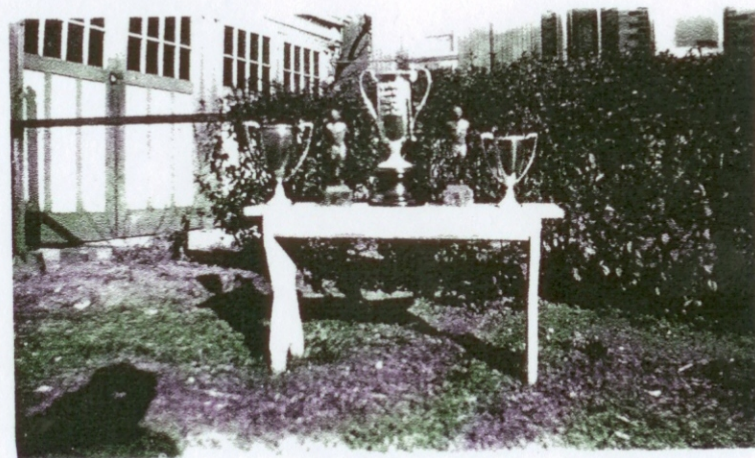

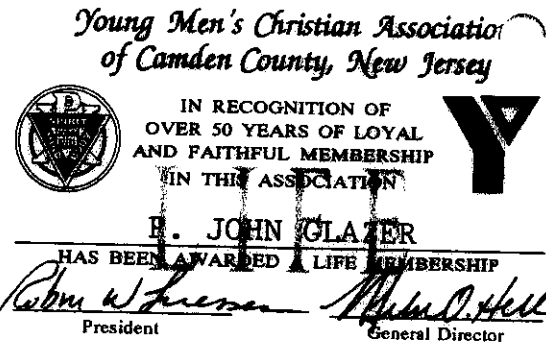

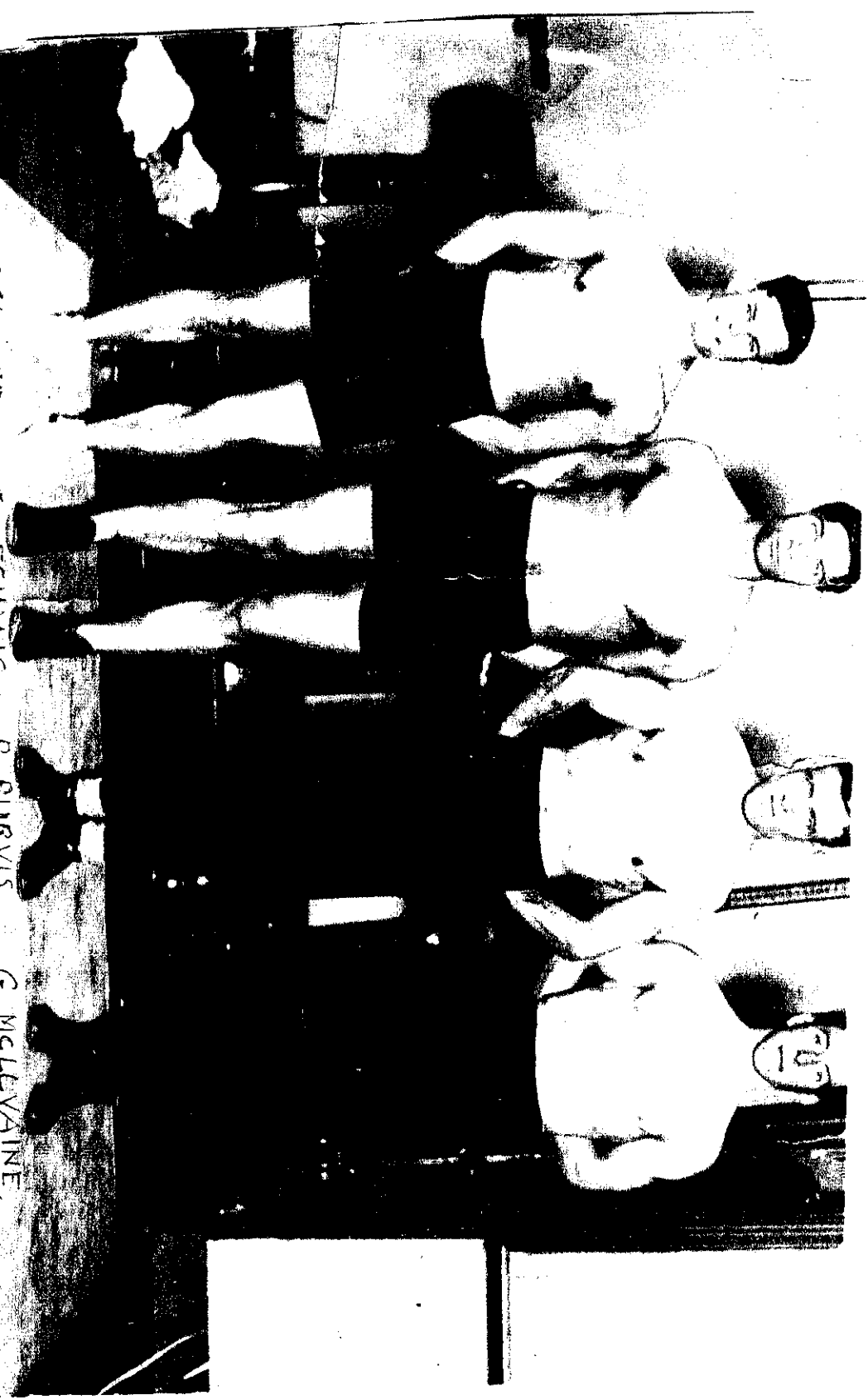

7. He ran against Browning Ross, a member of two U.S. Olympic teams for many years. Drew had Mr. Ross at Gloucester Catholic as his running coach in later years.
8. He donated a trophy for approximately 20 years to present to first runner to finish or first "Y" Runner to cross the finish line.
9. He became Chairman of the YMCA Street Run from 1955 to 1967. He may have been Chairman for many more years but as he had stopped running, there were no more news clippings to confirm that he did. *SEE 12 HIP SURGERY*
10. A. In 1957, the YMCA had a club to promote men to exercise. It was for a period of eight months. Age 45 to 55 years - goal was 125 miles. John, 53 years old ran 244 miles. (Quota for 15-25 years old was 175 miles).
B. In 1958, he ran 374 1/3 miles.
C. In 1959, he ran 197 miles.
11. He ran in the YMCA Annual Races from 1st run - Dec 1923 (age 20) to 45th run - Dec 1967 (age 64). He did not run in the 41st and 44th races in 1963 and 1966.

Newark Physician Gets Bronze Star

The Bronze Star Medal has been awarded Capt. Jesse T. Glazier of 670 Sandford avenue for meritorious achievement. He interned at Irvington General Hospital and practiced in Newark before entering service in October, 1942.

The citation, covering the period

from August 14, 1943, to May 7, 1945, reads:

"Capt. Glazier was assistant surgeon in charge of professional services of the First Strategic Air Depot (in England.) Through his tireless effort and initiative full cooperation of all medical personnel was obtained and improvement was made in the health level of the depot.

"During the Normandy invasion, May 25 to June 23, 1944, Capt. Glazier volunteered his services to serve aboard LST 325 as chief Army

surgeon in evacuating wounded. Under arduous and precarious working conditions, he successfully operated on over 500 seriously wounded patients with only three fatalities."

The doctor wrote his wife, Mrs. Marion Glazier, that he did more surgery during the first few days of the Normandy invasion than he would in a year at home. He is now base surgeon at the last Eighth Air Force base in England, at Honington, Suffolk. He expects to be home by Christmas.

Shanahan Runners Gain Sweep in Camden Race

CAMDEN, N. J., Dec. 6—The Shanahan Catholic Club's cross-country squad scored a clean sweep of the nineteenth annual Camden Y. M. C. A. street run today, taking both individual awards and the team prize.

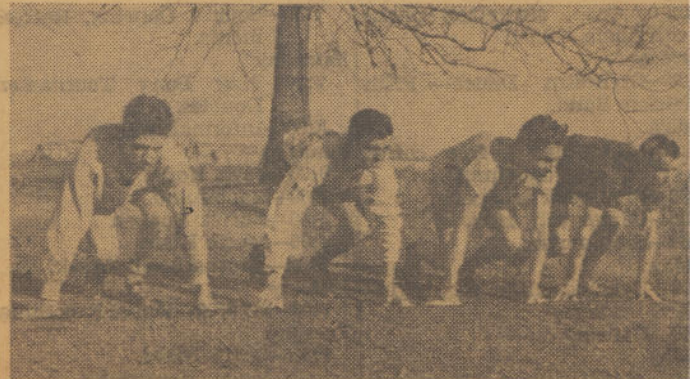
Tom Convoy, Shanahan, finished sixth in 39.46, while Joe McIlhenny, who had a 20-second handicap, led in the early stages.

STIRRING COMPETITION

The "polar bear" meet, sponsored by the Collegiate Track and Field Club of Swarthmore, provided stirring competition in most of the 14 events, eight in the open class and six in the novice division.

Lone double winner during the afternoon was Penn's football captain-elect Cleo Calcagni, who took both open weight events. Cleo threw the 16 pound shot 41 feet, 5 1/2 inches which surpassed the tosses of Emmanuel Taylor, of Haddington Recreation, and Seymour Cohen, of Osteopathy. Later he annexed the 35 pound weight throw with a heave of 41 feet, 5 inches, Taylor again being the runnerup.

KIRK, SULLIVAN SCORE

Two teammates of Calcagni also scored thrilling victories for the Red and Blue. Jeff Kirk, competing in his second race since his recent appendectomy, nosed out Bill Diebler, Penn State star, at the tape in the open 600 yards run, and Gene Sullivan, breasted the string only a few steps in front of Lou Nicastra, Temple luminary, in the open 1000 yards race.

Sullivan, after taking an early lead, was passed by Nicastra on the third lap, but stayed at the heels of fast moving Owl runner, and then spurted in the homestretch to triumph.

NEWARK, N. J., April 17—Back in the great outdoors, where he has the room he needs to get the full benefit from those long legs of his, Reginald Pearman of New York University twice cut loose his vaunted stretch drive to give the Violets record-breaking victories in the second annual Seton Hall College Relay Carnival today.

With a 1:56 anchor half-mile, big Reggie soundly whipped Phil Thigpen of Seton Hall, who beat him two times out of three at 1,000 yards during the indoor season, in the sprint medley. An hour and a half later Pearman ripped off a 48.7-second quarter to outrace Frank Fox of Seton Hall and George Guida of Villanova in the thrilling mile relay finale.

John Nelson, Hugo Maiocco and Jim Gilholley ran with Pearman on both these N. Y. U. teams. To give the day a thoroughly Violet tinge, Coach Emil Von Elling's dash quartet of Homer Gillis, Warren Halliburton, Frank Svoboda and Ira Kaplan scored a double triumph in the 440 and 880 yard relays, breaking its own meet record in the former event.

Cub Mile to Georgetown

Thus N. Y. U. wound up with four of the seven major college titles at stake. The other winners were Fordham in the two-mile relay; Manhattan, in the four-mile relay, and Villanova, in the distance medley relay. N. Y. U. also captured the freshman one-and-seven-eighths-mile medley relay, the freshman mile title going to Georgetown.

In the other featured races of the twenty-two event program, Cardinal Hayes of the Bronx won the two-mile high school relay championship; Seton Hall Prep took the prep school mile relay title, and Tommy Quinn of the New York A. C. beat Jack Milne of North Carolina by three yards in 9:33.4 in a special two-mile run.

NYU's triumph in the sprint medley was directly attributable to Pearman. Seton Hall and Fordham led the way for the first three legs. Fox of the Pirates beat Harold McDonnell of the Rams and Gilhooley by two and five yards, respectively, on the opening quarter-mile.

Loses Another Yard

Ennis Gray put Fordham in front on the first 220 leg, racing past Phil Palese of Seton Hall as Maiocco lost another yard for N. Y. U. Then Seton Hall's Jack Tulp went by Bill Lane of Fordham on the second furlong to touch off Thigpen five yards in front of Jerry Connolly of the Rams.

When Pearman took the stick from Nelson, he was a long step behind Connolly and a full seven yards in back of Thigpen.

The bounding Seton Hall star ran a fast first lap, as Pearman and Connolly shuttled back and forth in second place.

In the middle of the backstretch, Thigpen swung wide to get out of the chopped up inside line. Taking

advantage of the opening, Pearman spurted and bolted through on the inside. Thigpen sought to stay with him around the last turn but, in the final straightaway, Reggie lengthened his stride and pulled away to win by seven yards.

N. Y. U. was clocked in 3:31.1, two and seven-tenths of a second faster than the time that won for Seton Hall in the inaugural carnival a year ago.

Comes From Behind

In the mile relay, the Violets were clocked in 3:19.3 as against Manhattan's 3:20.5 of last year. Pearman took off in first place, a step ahead of Fox and seven yards in front of Guida, but still had to come from behind to win.

Villanova's intercollegiate quarter-mile champion, putting on a tremendous burst of speed, shot ahead of Reggie at the 220-yard mark and was still in front at the final turn.

There Pearman swept by him and also had enough speed to hold off a swift-closing rush by Fox, who collared Guida in the stretch and finished just a yard back.

This was an N. Y. U.-Seton Hall battle all the way. The Violets and the Pirates never were separated by more than a yard or two. Reggie Marshall beat Nelson by two yards on the lead-off leg but Maiocco overtook George Stafurik and Gilhooley held off Tulp. Browning Ross and Ed Fitzgerald brought Villanova into the running on the middle legs.

A smart bit of running by Kaplan enabled N. Y. U. to beat Manhattan, last year's winner, in the 880. Touched off a step behind Joe Cianciabella, the Violet anchor man spurted past the stock little Jasper flyer, cut in sharply and thus picked up a three-yard edge that he held.

Win by Seven Yards

Manhattan's combination of Bill Kent, Johnny Quigley, John Gorman and Cianciabella also was runner-up to N. Y. U. in the 440. However, this was not close, as the Violets won by seven yards in 0:42.6, one-tenth under their own 1947 clocking.

The chief surprise was Fordham's conclusive victory over Manhattan's favored team in the two-mile relay. With John Lynch, Ed Carney, Connolly and Jack O'Hare running in that order, the Rams won by nearly thirty yards, although their time was a pedestrian 8:04. Carney piled up twenty yards on Jim Cavanaugh to break up the race.

In the absence of Syracuse, the pre-meet choice, Manhattan had a 120-yard walkaway over Army and Villanova in the four-mile relay. John Garibaldi, Arthur Sullivan, John Flinter and Ignatius Rienzo ran for the Jaspers, whose 18:26.4 was almost half a minute slower than their winning 1947 time.

N. Y. U. gave Villanova its chief competition in the distance medley, which the Wildcats took in 10:44.2, as against the meet record of 10:53.4, set by Army last year. Bill Cunningham put the Violets in front on the three-quarter-mile leg, but Armand Osterberg could not hold George Thompson.

Stepping his mile in 4:31, Thompson left Osterberg on the last lap to win by twenty yards, with Manhattan forty yards farther back in third place. Fitzgerald ran the opening quarter for Villanova, Browning Ross the half and Dave Williams the three-quarters.

Run in Three Heats

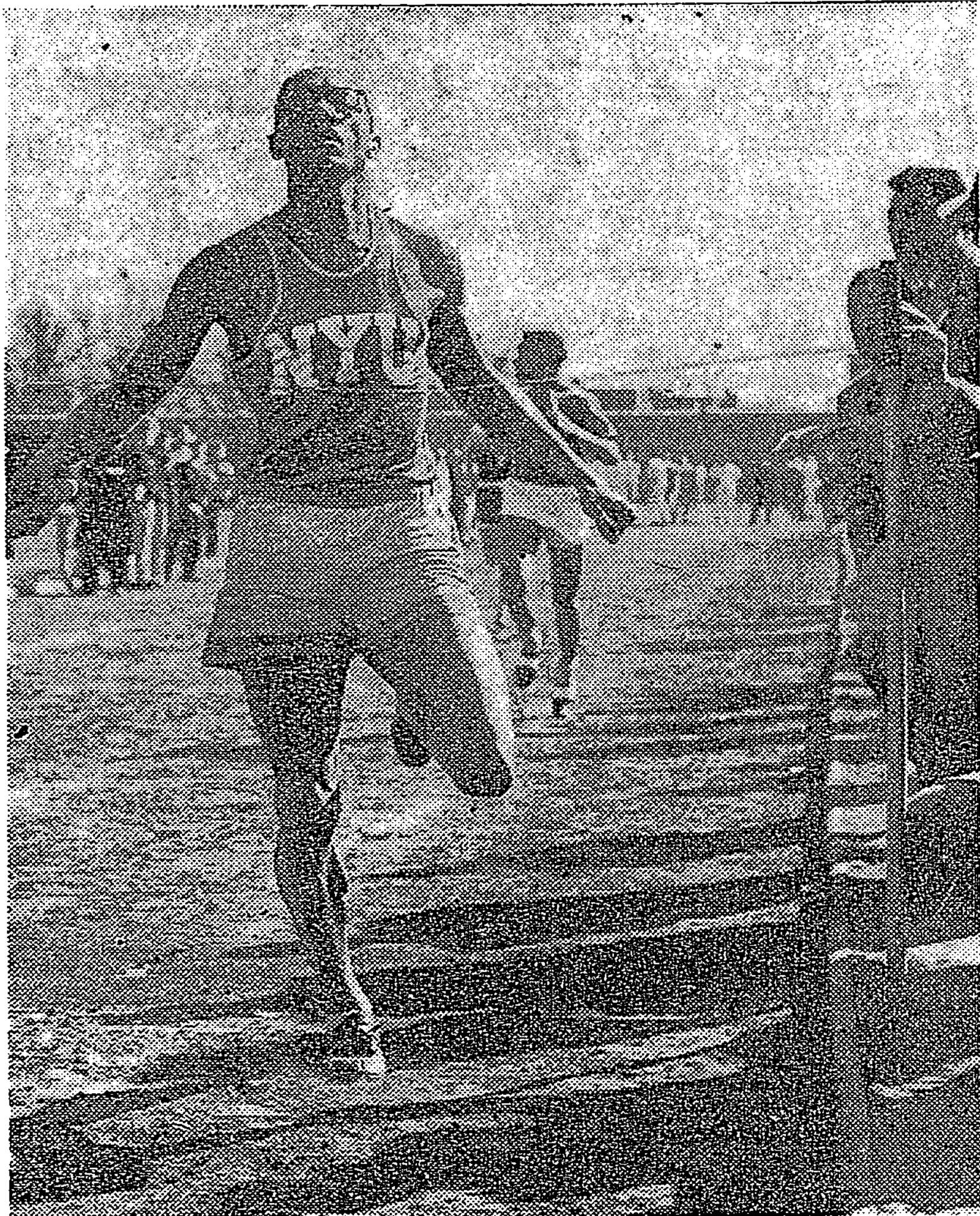
A 2:02.6 anchor half mile by Tom Lindgren gave Cardinal Hayes its two-mile victory by ten yards over Lincoln of Jersey City. St. Augustine and Xavier were next in line in this test, which was run in three heats and decided on time. Seton Hall Prep won the prep school mile title by sixty yards from Blair in 3:33.2.

Although the sun shone brightly, it was a bit too chilly and the track was too cuppy for major league times. However, the meet, which opened the outdoor season in these parts, served its purpose as a prep for next week end's Penn Relays at Philadelphia.

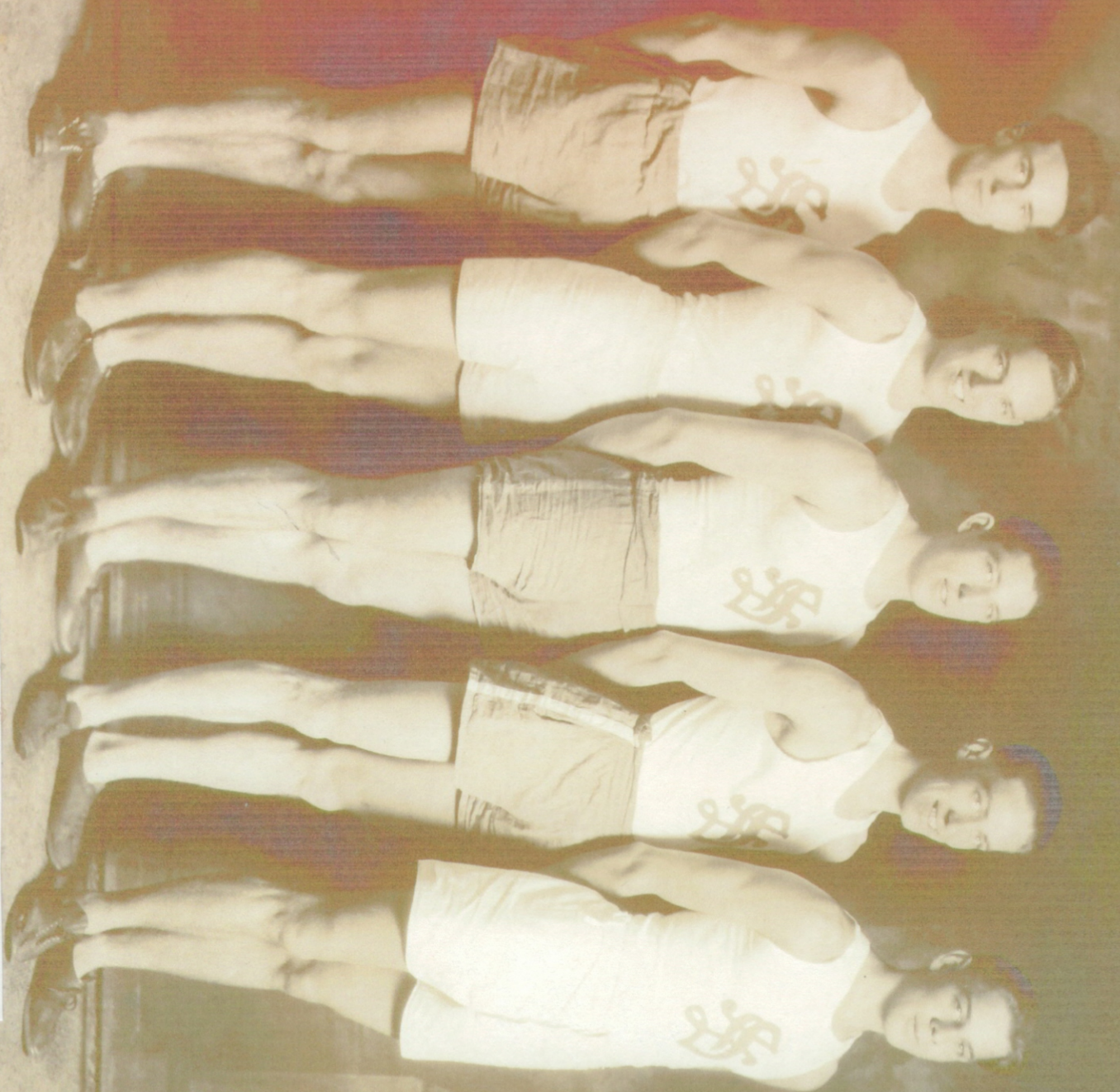

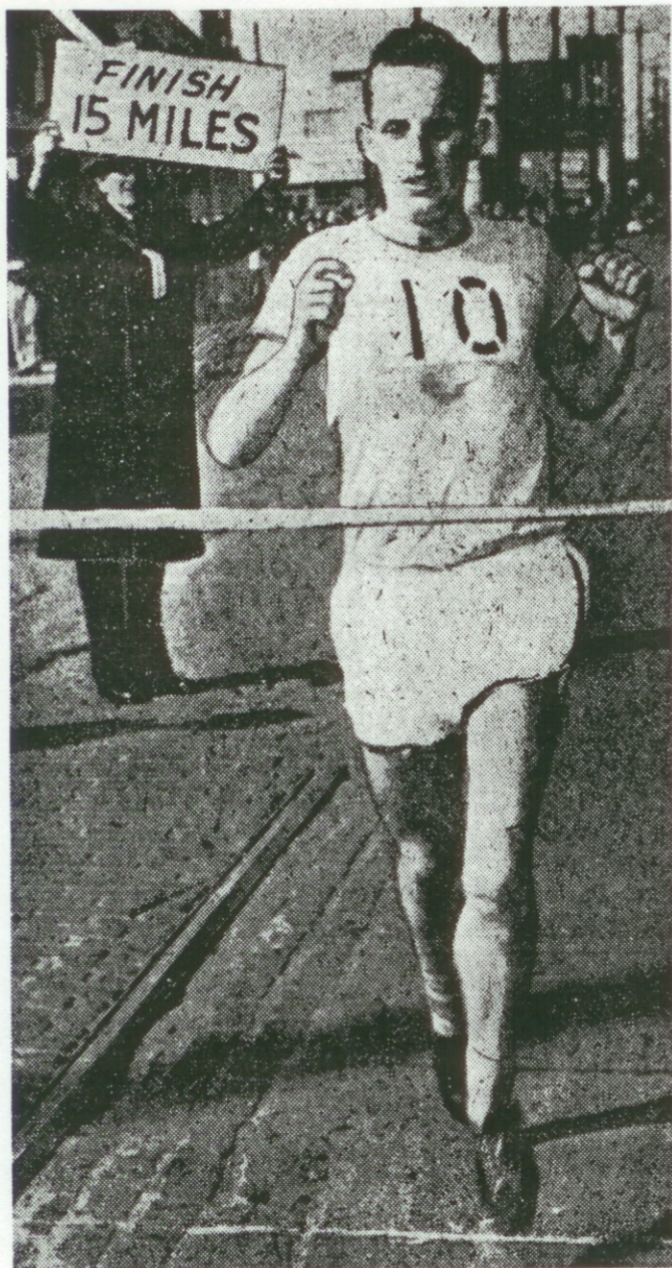


Browning Ross wins 1954 Senior National AAU 30 Kilometers Championship at Atlantic City

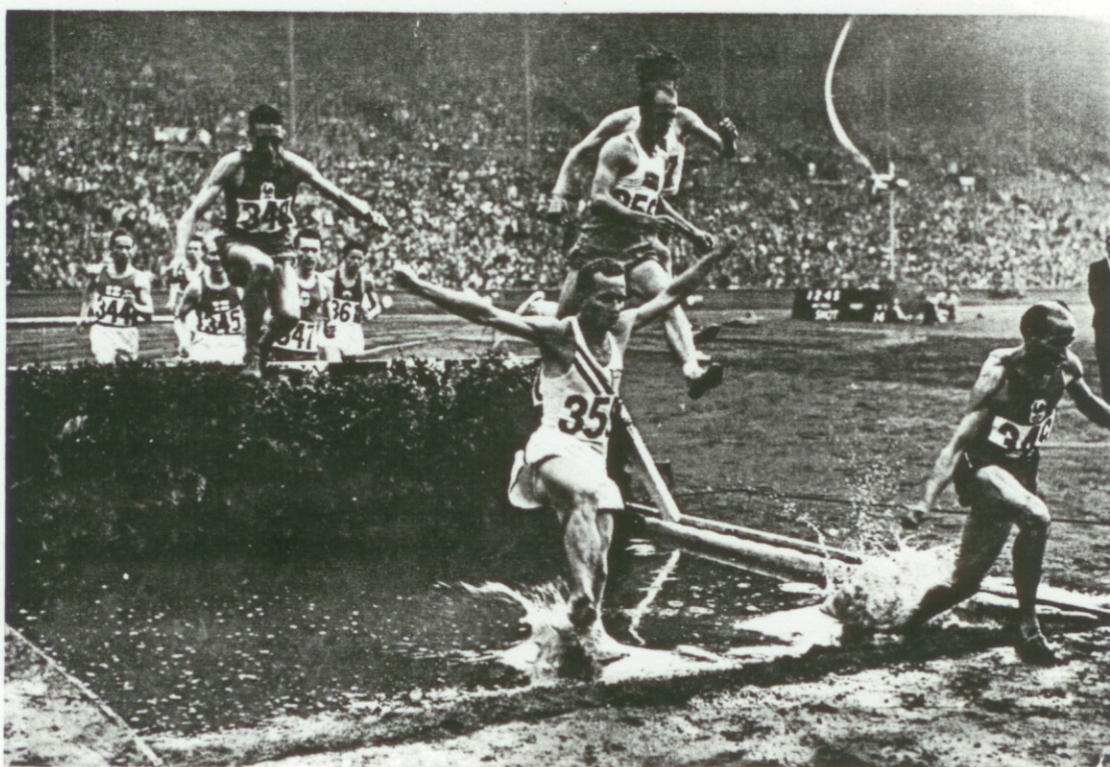


Browning Ross at Finish of Firestone Road Race

Memories of Two Olympic Games . . .

by Browning Ross

The 14th Olympiad at London in 1948 was significant in that the Games were being renewed after a 12 year absence due to World War II.

The British organized the Games in style; they had trained officials, they understood the principals of management, and they utilized 7 different centers to conduct the events.

Most of the competition was held at Empire Stadium, Wembley, in a northwest suburb of London. The stadium contained a newly installed 400 meter cinder track. The stadium accommodated some 83,000 spectators and was jammed for the eight days of track and field competition.

The U.S. track team was selected only two days before our departure from New York. It was hard to realize that we had made the team even while enroute to London. (One athlete managed to get leave papers from his job signed only minutes before he was to be processed for passage.)

Managers of the team were going crazy trying to get passports in order. However, we climbed aboard the S.S. America on July 14th and the U.S. Olympic Team was on its way to London town.

P.T. Barnum must have traveled with an American Olympic Team since our crossing was so much like a circus. Literally everywhere on the ship the athletes were tuning up. Hildegard, Salvador Dali, female members of the Kennedy Clan (Father Joseph P. Kennedy had been U.S. Ambassador to England before the war) and hundreds of other passengers took a back seat to the athletes at their shipboard training sessions. Jim Fuchs put the shot right over the net onto the promenade deck below, just missing me running by.

Bingo, horse races, movies, fantastic food, dancing and deck chairs all filled the extra hours on the "floating hotel." The climax of the trip came two nights before we docked: the athletes gave an amateur show. These athletes could draw a crowd to the theater as well as the sports arena.

While the athletes ran, or lifted or swam the newspaper reporters sulked. Even then it was all too common for the sports page back home to feature temper tantrums or rule breaking. No such stories broke as everyone bent over backward to deflect criticism. At 21 cents a cabled word from aboard ship you'd want a hot story too. They were rewarded later when they could send back such stories as Olympic records by Bill Porter (100m hurdles), Ray Cochran (400m hurdles) and the fantastic feats of the immortal Emil Zotopek.

The hospitality of the English people was apparent as soon as we docked at Southampton. They knocked themselves out to make us welcome and comfortable. Passes for transportation on buses and trains in London and badges to take us inside Wembley arenas were given to everyone.

My event was the 3000 meter steeplechase. I was fortunate enough to make the finals where I led with two laps remaining and then faded to 7th in the 12 man field. Probably our best distance runner was Californian Bob McMillen. He was running a beautiful race in his heat of the steeplechase when he took a header into the water and had to take kidding the rest of the trip about the diving team having missed a good bet! (Pictures showed him completely submerged.)

In 1952, he came back at Helsinki and finished second in the 1500 meters by inches. After the London Olympics we competed in meets in Prague, Berlin, Norway, Sweden, Holland, Paris and Ireland before boarding the S.S. Washington on August 27th for a pleasant trip home.

The weight lifters continued to lift weights, the gymnasts continued to work on the bars, and the runners continued to run. They were simply beginning their training for the Pan American Games in 1951 and the 1952 Olympics games in Helsinki.

Helsinki . . . a whole new ball game by then. We flew through the air with consummate ease via Pan American World Air Ways . . . things were better organized at the U.S. and . . . a spectacular nationwide telethon started by Bob Hope and Bing Crosby (131 1/2) hours raised \$310,000.00.

Before the team left there was a rousing demonstration arranged by the Mayor of New York which included a Broadway parade and an elaborate luncheon.

In Finland there were thousands of competitors from 69 different countries and officials started thinking of fixed standards to be met by the entrants in future games. Somehow looking back I cannot help but think the London Games brought back finer memories.

Editors Note: Ross feels that the U.S. team felt closer on the London trip because of the time spent on the ship compared to the plane travel for Helsinki. Since flying is the way to go now, perhaps something is missing in team spirit.

judges made him run extra distance,
because of a mixup, while his actual

12-mile time was 72:31. It was sort
of comical, as Osler stopped at the
end of his 48th lap, argued with the
judges who waved him on, ran the
49th lap, stopped and talked with
the officials again, then ran a 50th
lap! Finally the judges let him
quit. They eventually did give him 61
th place in the hour run and 5th in
the 12-mile, which was correct.

Higdon covered more ground in one
hour than any American before him
despite being quite tired from his
trip to California the weekend previ-
ously, where he placed in both the
6-mile & steeplechase in the Nat. AAU
Championships at Bakersfield.

The real heroes of the race must
have been Tom Osler and Hugh Jascourt
who drove from Philadelphia to Chic-
ago and back in a little Nash Metro-
politan, no less! They should get a
medal of merit or something.
