The Hughes administration has won the support of Republican Senate leaders for an anti-loan shark bill which York enacted one into law. carries the same prison term as second degree murder. said in his annual message

The bill, introduced yesterday, makes it a special crime for a loan shark to kill, kidnap, injure or threaten harm to anyone to collect a debt.

The penalty for a first ofense now, whether or not the gun is loaded, is one to 10 years. The bill sent to the Senate fixes it a straight 10 years.

Instead of daily garbage collections, camps would be required to collect garbage "as often as necessary."

In addition to permitting the state to make hardship exceptions, as the law does already, the bill permits the commissioner to grant exceptions when "necessary to obtain a beneficial use of an existing camp" or "prevent a practical difficulty." It requires the commissone

to classify violations as to "seriousness" and set deadlines for compliance accordingly.
