

CAMDEN AT A GLANCE

From a description given by Samuel Loman, a Philadelphia pawnbroker, Detective Captain Schreiber, in Camden yesterday, had Harold Miller, aged 16, of 2742 Arthur avenue, arrested on the charge of taking bicycles at the Mount Holly Fair.

After escaping capture since last May, Antonio Di Giacomo, aged 26, of Easton, Pa., was taken into custody by Detective Troncone yesterday, accused of jumping his bail bond after being charged with stabbing an Austrian last May.

Known to thousands Charles Van Meter is dead at his home at 774 Moore street, Camden. He was the oldest trolleyman in point of continuous service, on the lines of the Public Service Corporation, having been in its employ forty years. He drove the old horse cars until the road became electrified.

In the monthly report made by Camden's Board of Health yesterday, it is shown that the number of contagious disease cases has increased from 45 to 77. The increase is largely due to measles and diphtheria, the latter tipping the list with twenty-four cases. There was also the unusual number of ten cases of typhoid fever.

As a result of an accident on June 29, on a moving staircase of the Rapid Transit Company, suit was begun yesterday in the United States District Court, by lawyers William and Samuel Freoch in behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Rilatt and Mr. and Mrs. Samuel T.
